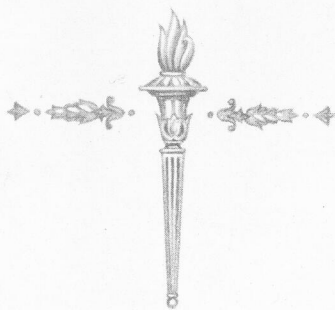

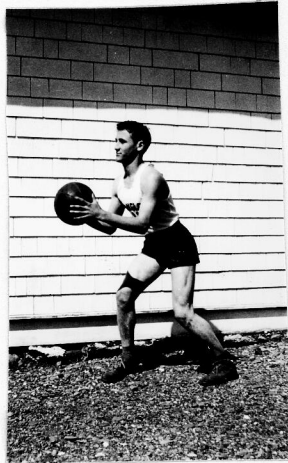

TRACK

Although handicapped in training by a lack of good weather, the boy's track team was able to score 25 points for third place in the county track meet. Ted Cadman earned a letter by being the high point man.
