Mr. Hagen teaches U.S. history-civics, world geography, typing, bookkeeping, and physical education.

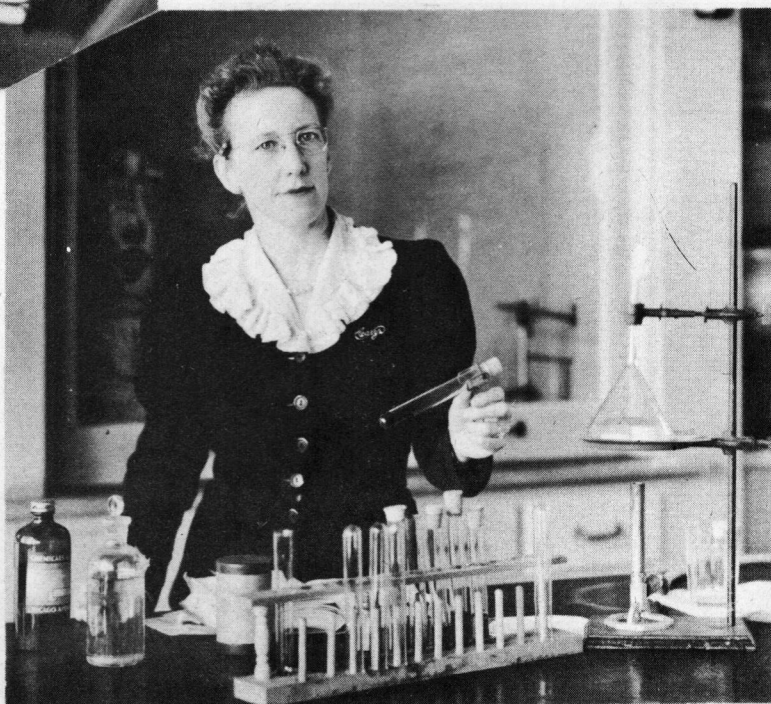


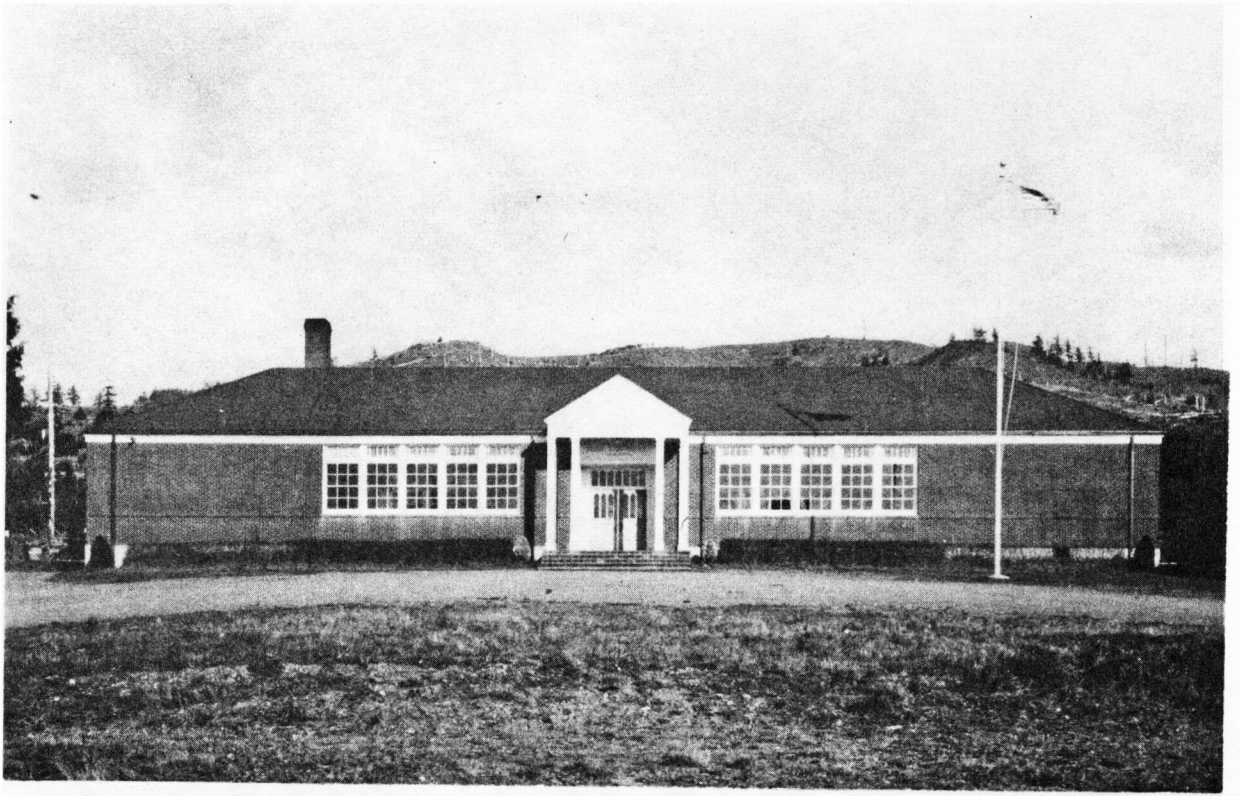

This year Miss Cary has taught general science, general mathematics, chemistry, and algebra.





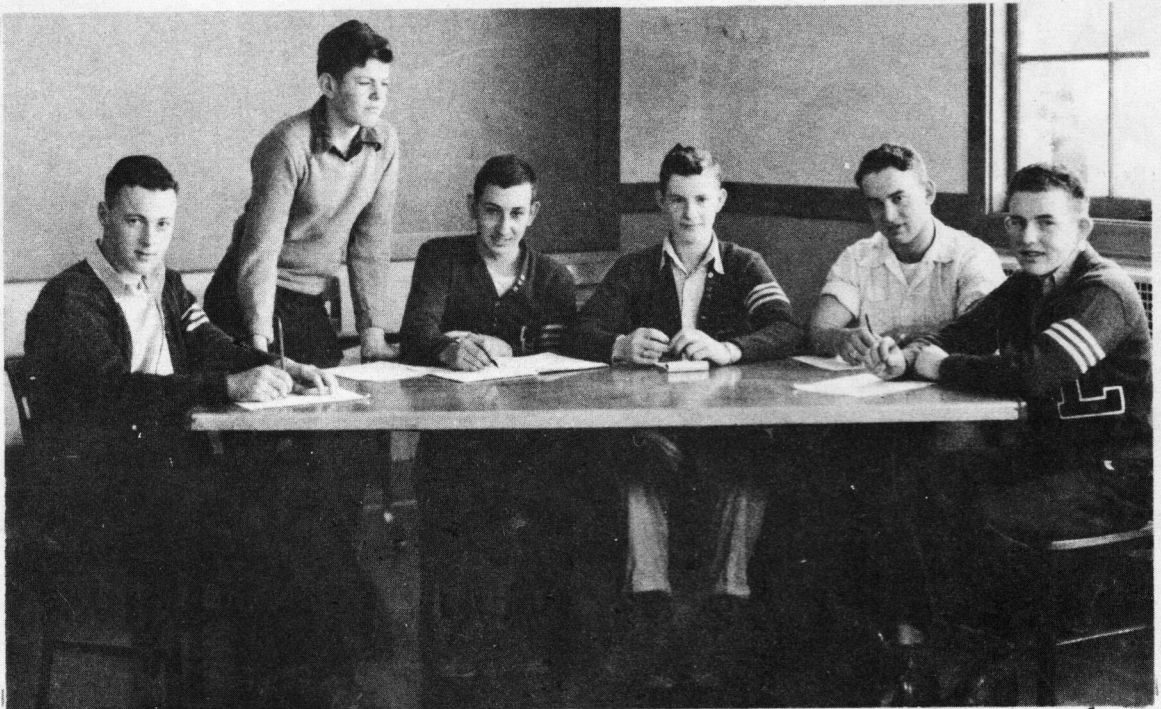

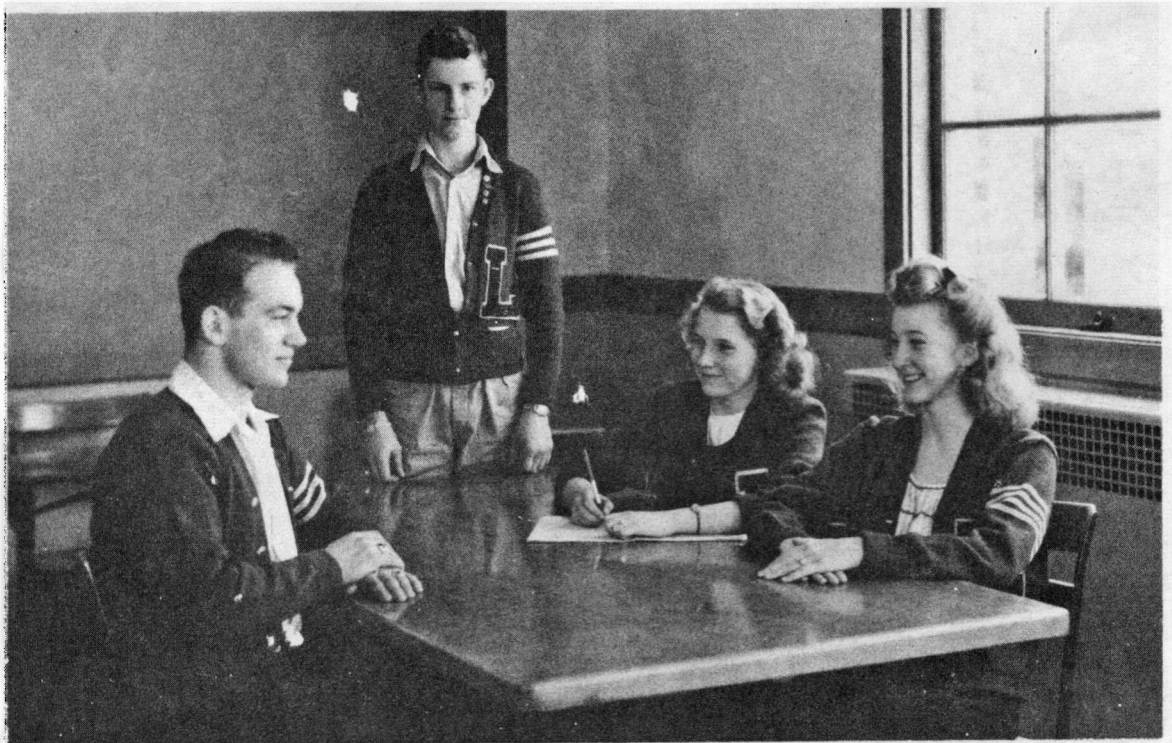

To Elaine, I leave, my ability to ask questions "out of turn" in English class. This often saves the class from many a tough assignment, and is an accomplishment that should be cultivated.

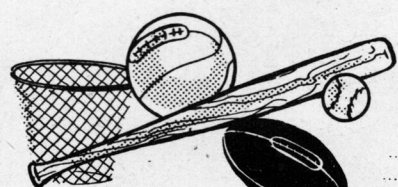
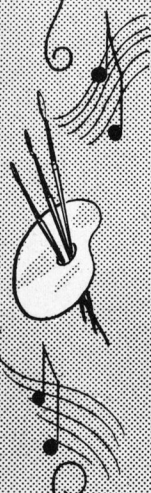
To Mahlon, I leave my ability to get along with the girls.

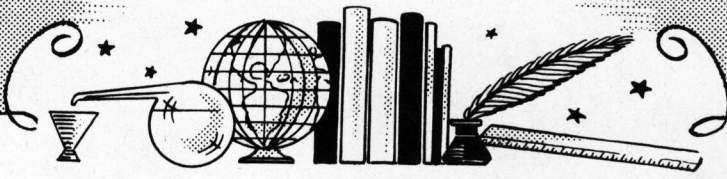

Several of the more expensive instruments and other equipment for the band were purchased by funds appropriated by the school board, together with funds raised from benefit dances and donations from individuals.

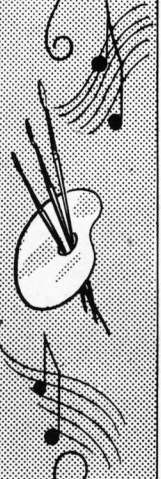
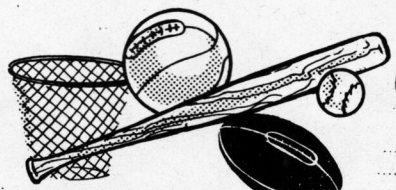
Our first Concert was held on April 13, 1946, and judging from the progress that has been made in the short period of a few months, the band will be an important organization of the school and community in the future.

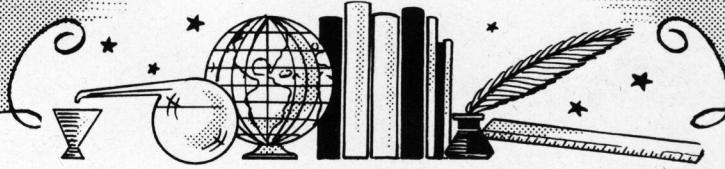
### PLAY DAY

### GRADUATION

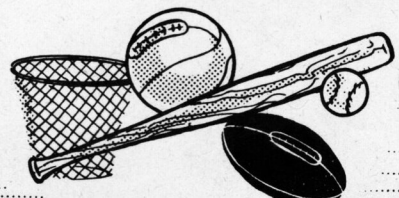
The graduation exercises of 1946 were held in the Langlois high school gymnasium, May 23, 1946, at 8:00 p.m.

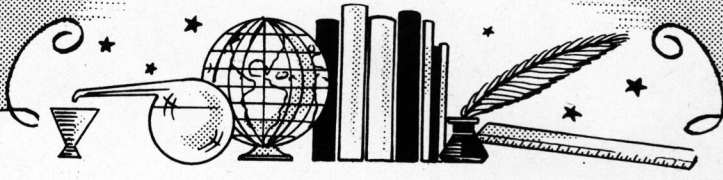

### Freshman Return Party

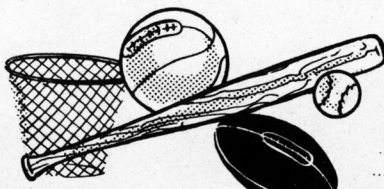
The Freshman return party was held April 19. Refreshments were served after the students had finished dancing. Everyone had an enjoyable time.

### BASKETBALL

At the outset the material appeared none too promising for the 1945-46 basketball season. There were no tall boys on the squad and the necessary speed to overcome this disadvantage seemed missing, also.

Mr. Hagen took the boys in hand and developed a good team that missed winning the county championship by a total of 4 points in the two games with the championship Gold Beach team.

Lloyd Kreutzer was selected by the boys to lead them and he proved to be an excellent captain. Good sportsmanship and clean living were the rules submitted by him to his team-mates.
