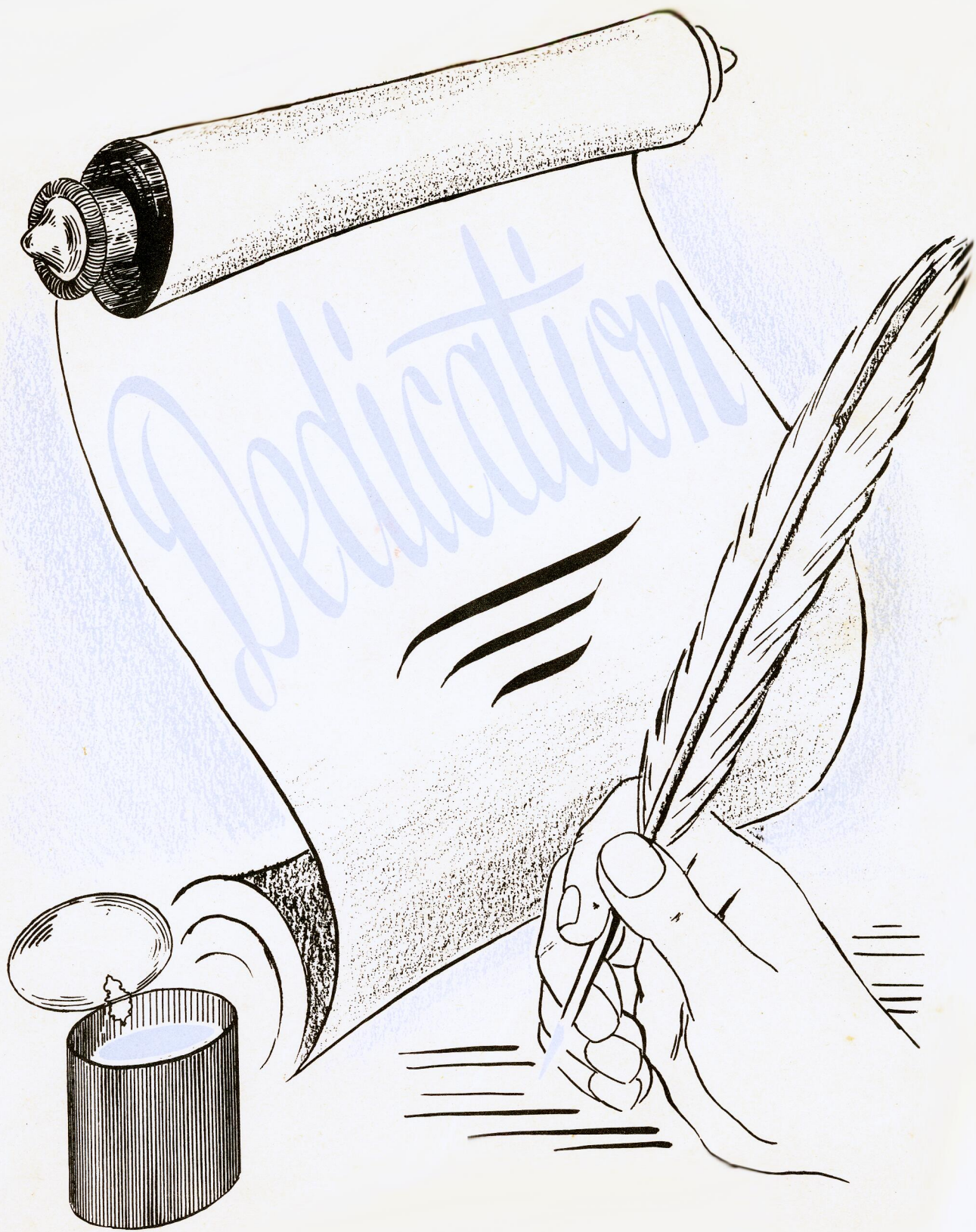

I, Jerry, leave my ability to have more than one boy on the string to Billie Lee, so that she will be more able to understand the old adage, "Vanity is the spice of life."


I, Ruth Marie, leave my winning ways to La Vera in hopes that she will follow in my footsteps and become the Cranberry Queen of Curry Co.

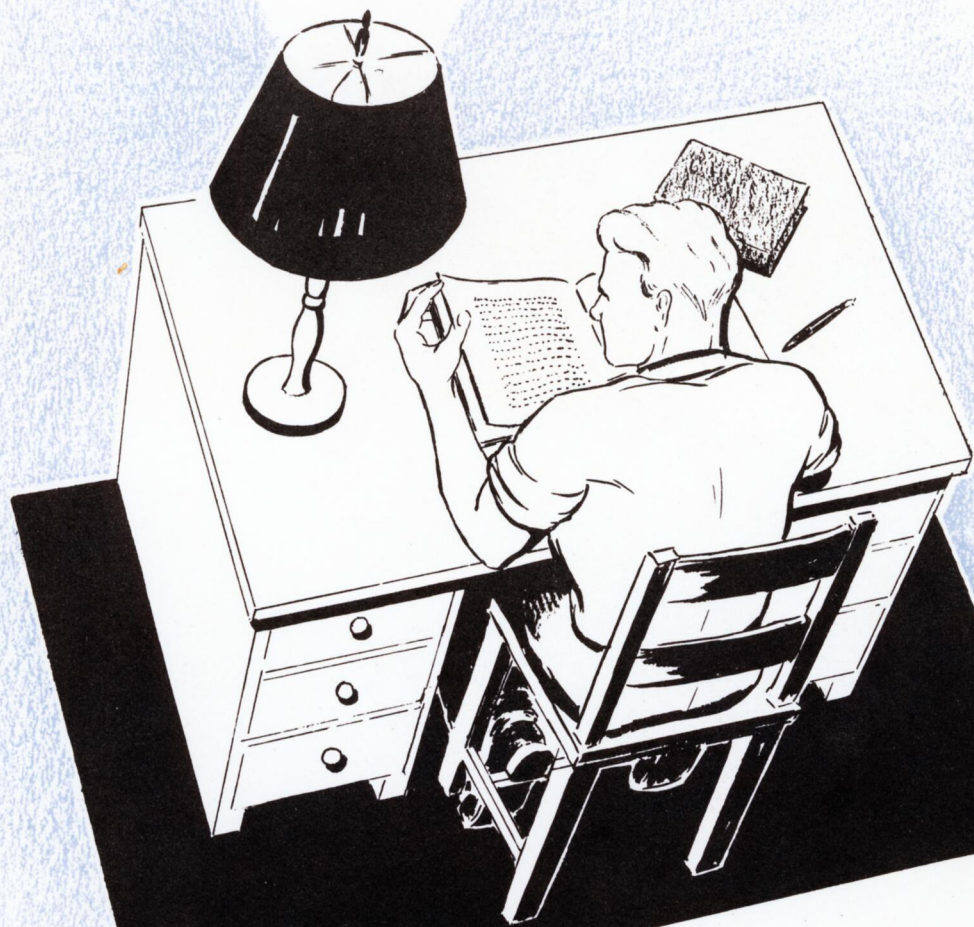

SOPHOMORE CLASS

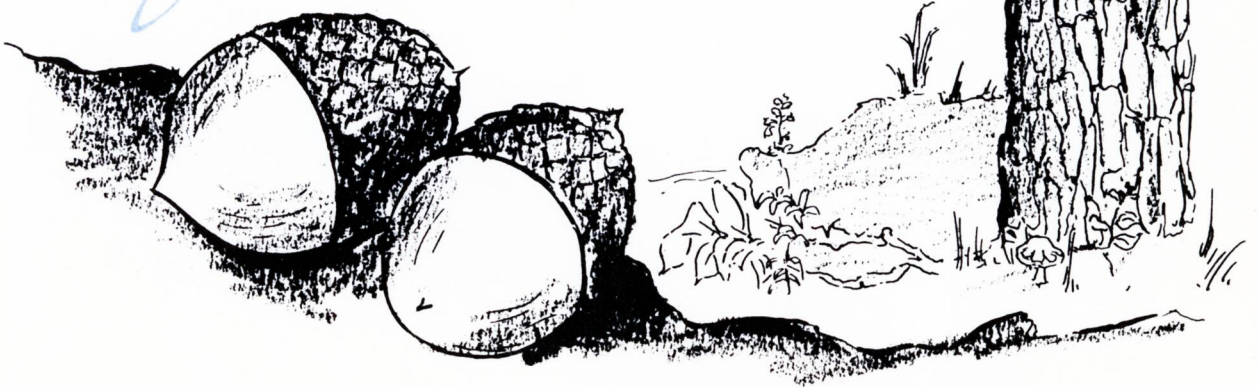
We, the sophomore class of 1947-48, started the year with fifteen members, but during the first semester one moved away leaving only fourteen.

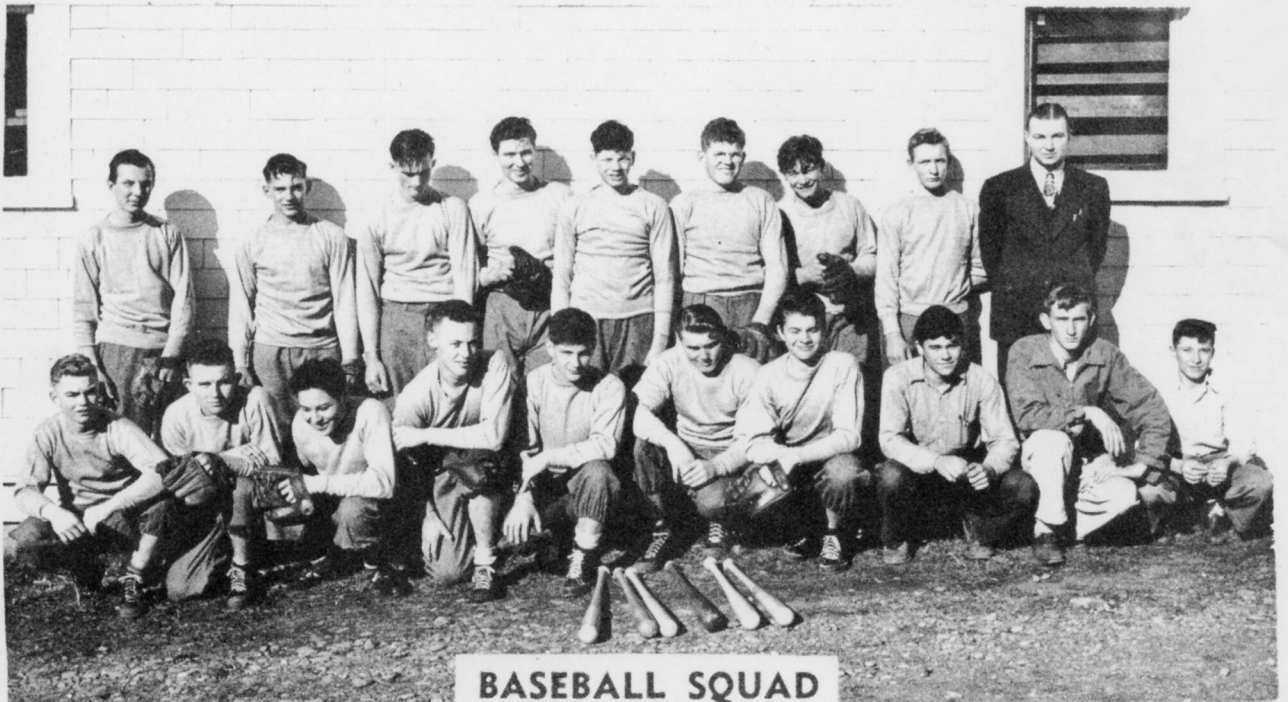
Appointed as yell queens were Beverly Mermilliod and Barbara Seeber. Both of them were new to the school and to yell leading so they tried very hard to do well.



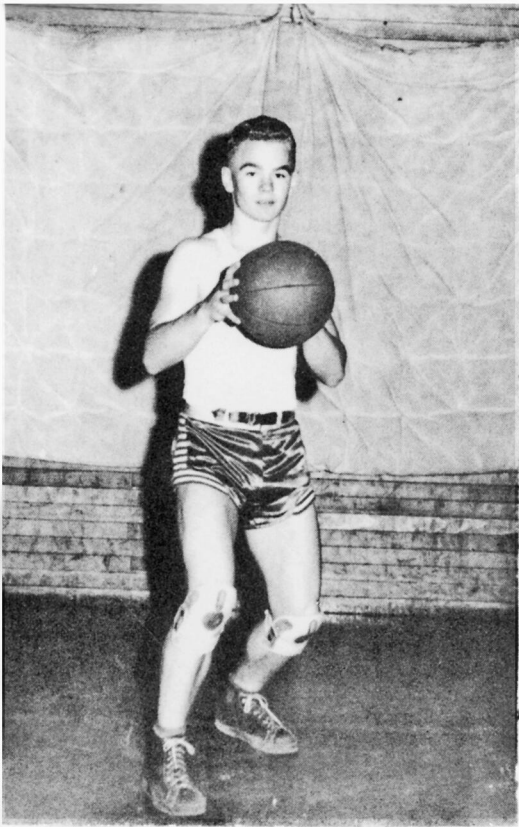

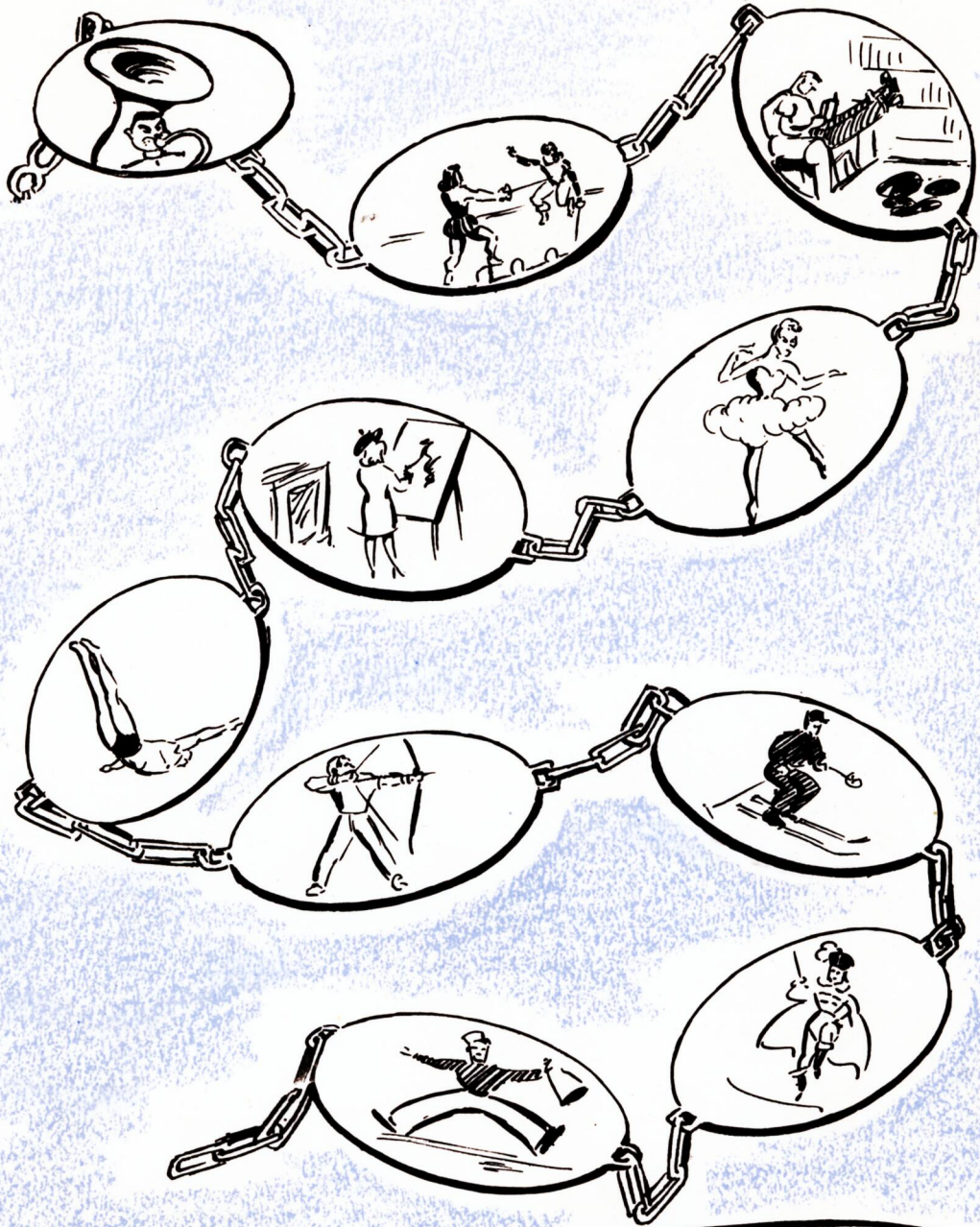


