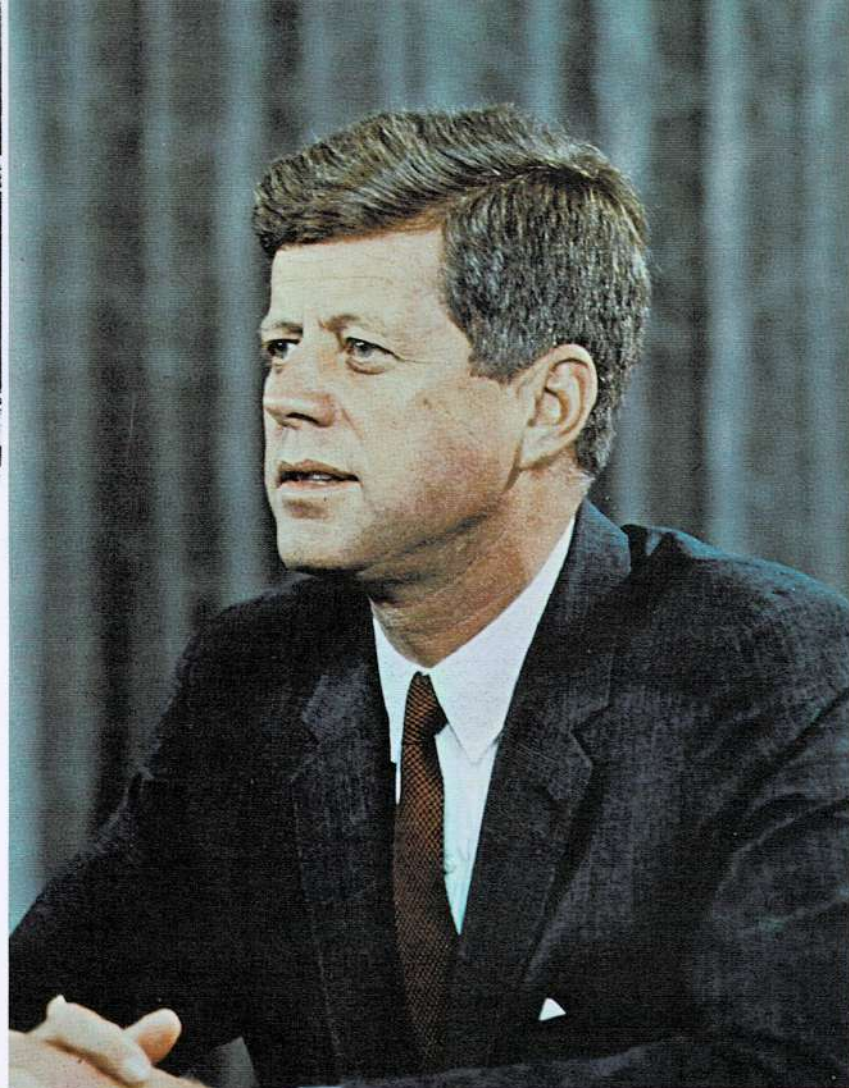

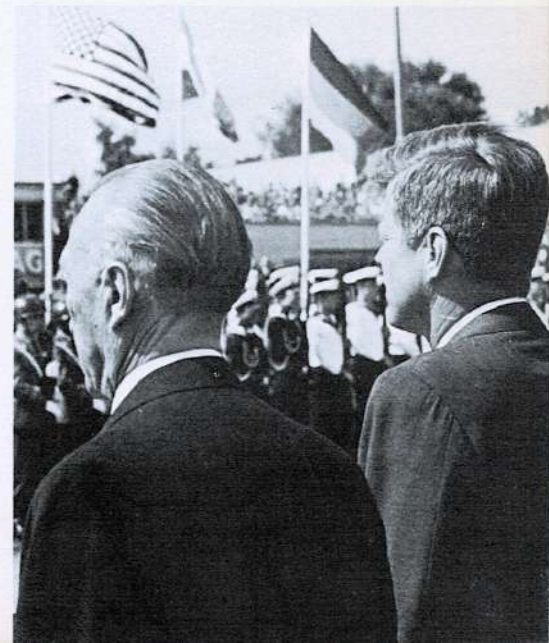

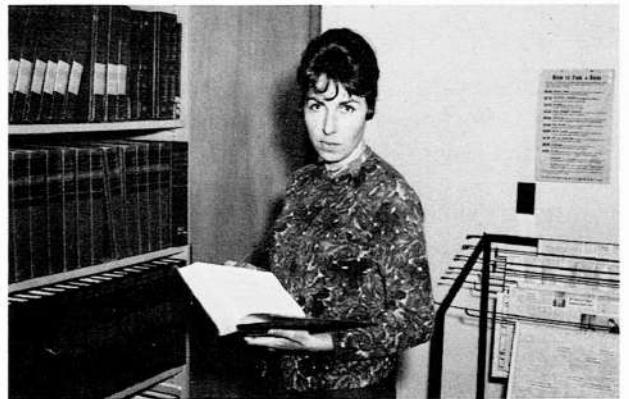
Mr. Charles Hindes directs the Vo-Ag and Shop classes.

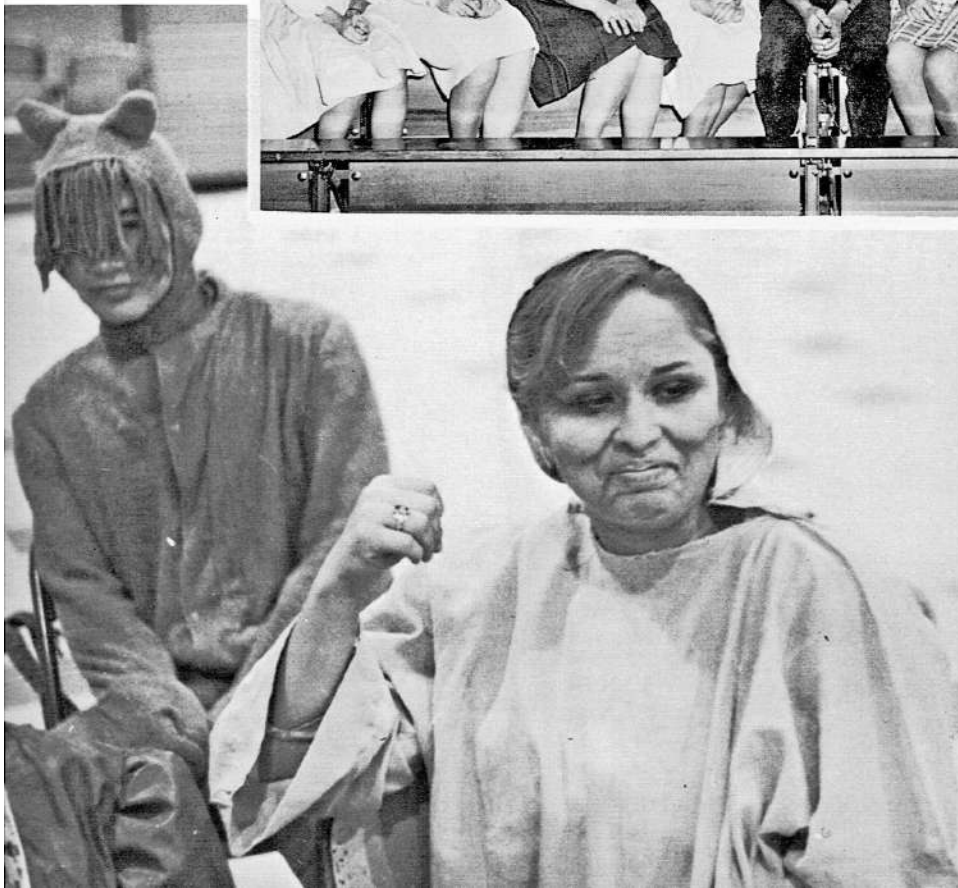

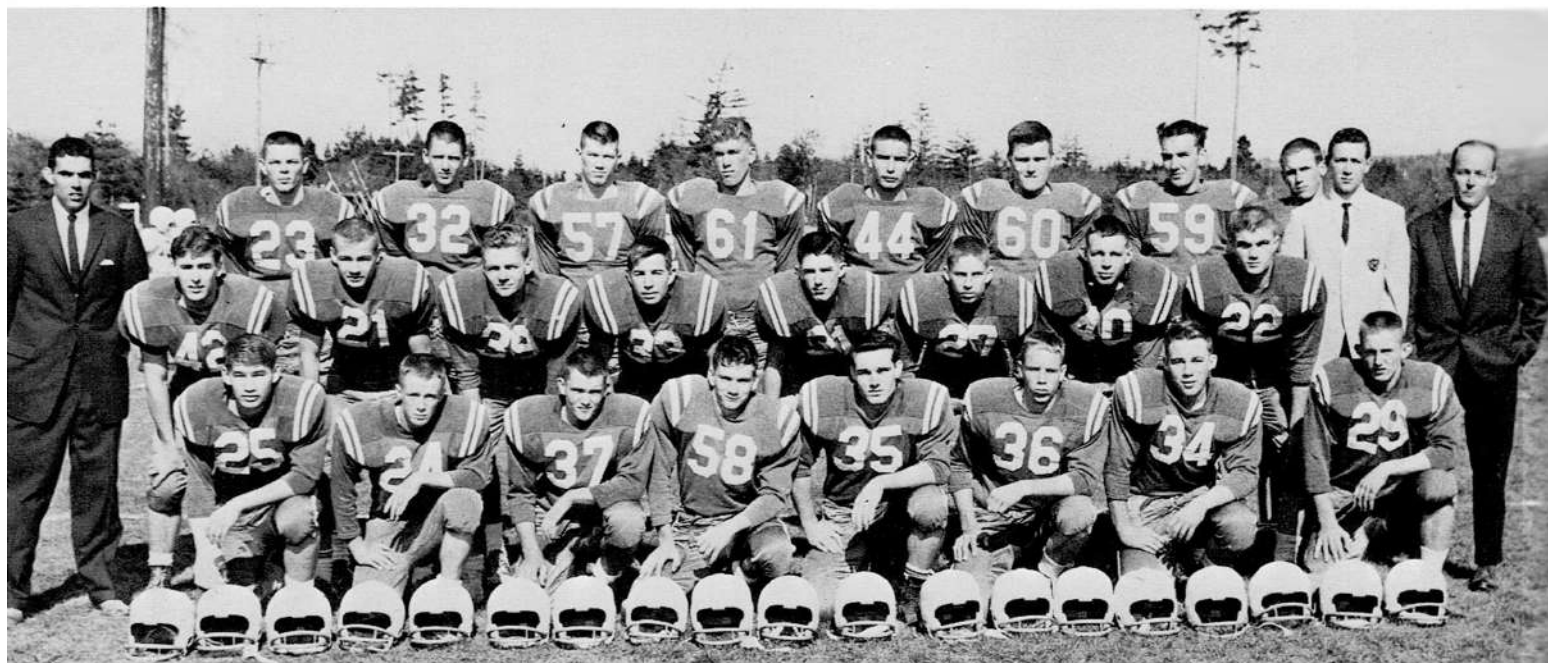
The Pep Club plays an important part in the functions of the school activities. They made their own outfits and attended all the football and basketball games, at home as well as away.

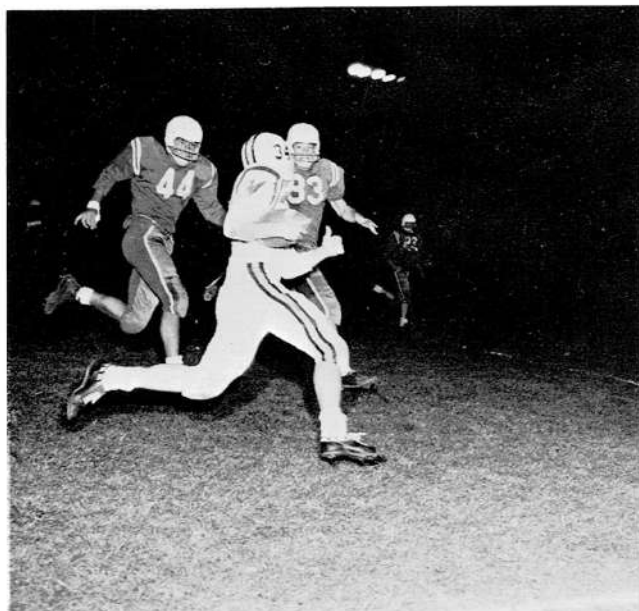

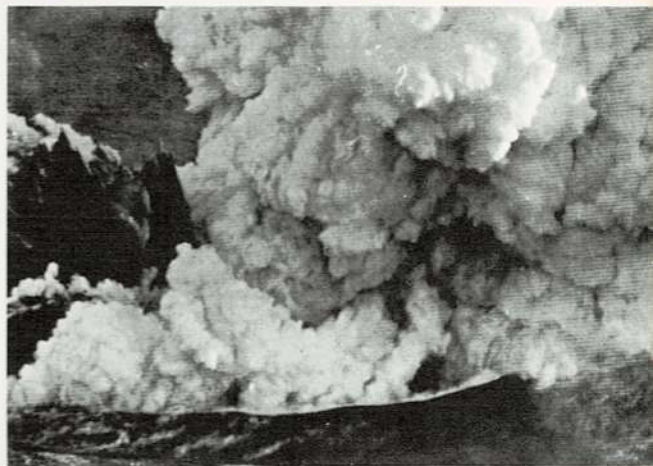
World Events in Review—1963
