
### Band and Chorus











### FOOTBALL: The beginning of a new tradition



















The 69-70 Varsity basketball team surpassed all previous season records with a 15-7 win loss record. They broke many records, their first being a 5 win - 5 loss conference record. Others included: a consecutive 5 win victory streak, the defeat of Powers and Myrtle Point for the first time in the history of PHS, and six team members being in double figures in one game was yet another record-breaker credited to this junior dominated team. Adding their share to outstanding performance were David Bjerg who made 13. 9 points per game; Darrell Bjerg who had the highest field goal percentage with . 430 per game; Carl Johnson with the highest free throw percentage and leading rebounder; and the two playmakers - Scott McKenzie and Bob Valet, who, added all together sent this first rate team onto record breaking heights. Excitement ran high in many games, but two Pirate victories will remain most memorable. The first being against the Powers Cruisers. Both teams were scoring evenly until Pacific broke Powers under the strain of a man to man full court press which held the Cruisers scoreless while the Pirates chalked up 14 points, earning another victory, with the final score being 68-59. The second game was against the Gold Beach Panthers. During this game six team members were in double figures: Scott McKenzie-11; Mike Woodruff-11; Darrell Bjerg-12; David Bjerg-11; Bob Valet -14; Carl Johnson-12. 









### Baseball











### Girls in Motion




#### Our Girl From Norway
