


P.H.S. Faculty

English, Science, Math




For All





Classes Are Required



versity. She has also attended Lane Community College and the University of Oregon. Some of her



District 2CJ School Board





This year the board considered many controversial subjects, as well as the routine business of the school district. Among the things acted upon were the following items:


- They acted upon individual requests from Seniors to graduate outside the new requirements.


The organization of Future Homemakers of America is intended to promote ideas on homemaking and activities in the area of homemaking careers.




During this week the counselors had several field trips to study plants, animals, and waterrelated organisms. There were about eight students in each cabin and many new friendships





