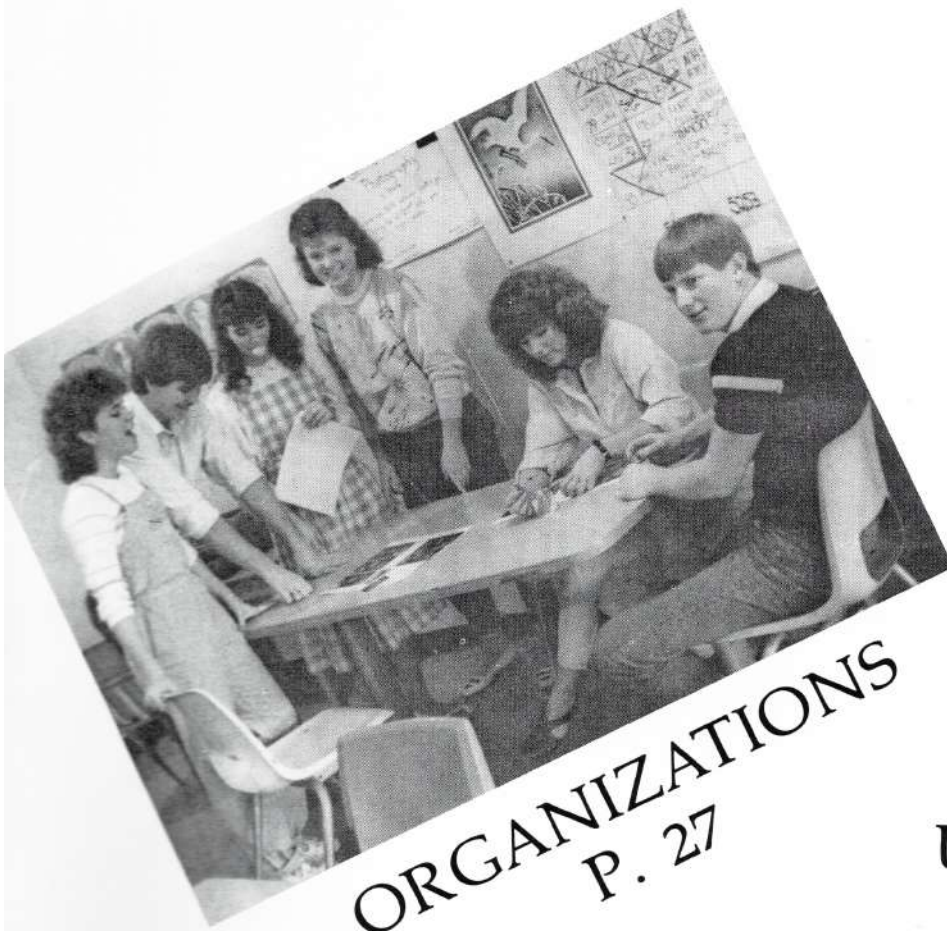

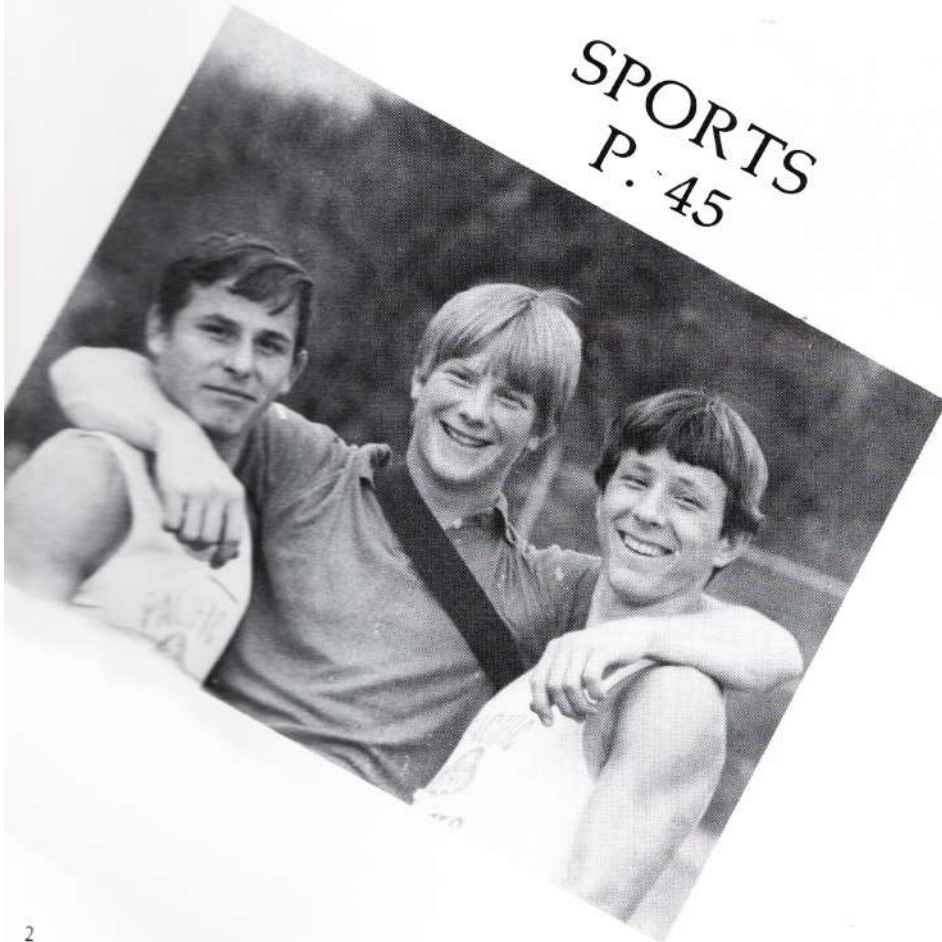




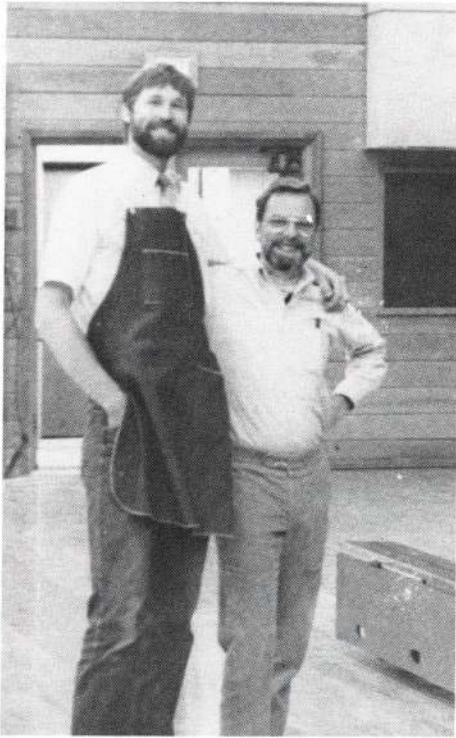

On September 3, 1985, once again school began. Students came after their summer break to begin their high school studies. They talked of summer vacations, new relationships, summer tans, and days spent lazily lounging around at the river.

Students came to get back into the flow of school life once again. In the air there was talk of possible school closure. In the years past there was always possibilities of schools closing, but the budget always seemed to pass. This year we faced the same problem, leaving the question to be answered on October 11, 1985.

On October 11, 1985, in a special election, the question was answered, by a vote of 700 no to 616 yes. Schools closing was complicated by the issue of the Langlois Elementary School students moving to the Port Orford Schools. Schools were now making plans of closure.

Students, parents, and teachers had mixed feelings. They wanted to see all their schools open, but it was a matter for the school board to make the possible cuts.

On October 24, 1985, school was officially dismissed with the accompaniment of lights, cameras, reporters, etc. Students left their schools not knowing if schools were going to open again.

During this time there were questions of "When are we going back?" and "Will we go back?" Seniors faced the problem of not graduating.

During this time there were parades, rallies, and posters put up in support of schools.

As the days passed, there were many feelings told. On November 5, 1985, the levy was passed by a vote of 845 to 706, and students began shuffling to school again on November 6.

Students now began their studies uninterrupted by the uncertainty of their school closing for another year.

On October 24, the school district 2-CJ put marks in the history book making for the first time school has been closed for this district and making it only the sixth time in the state's history.

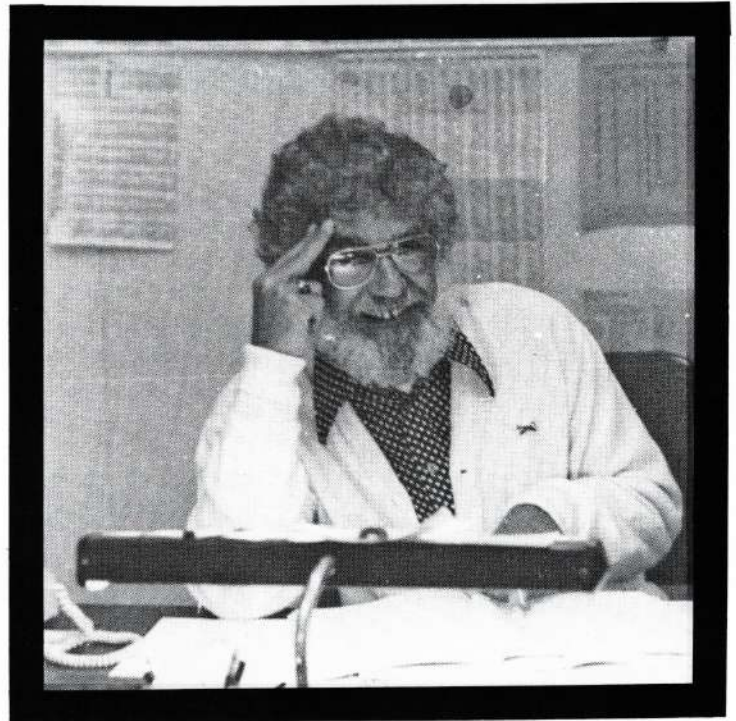
LEADS THE LINE!!!

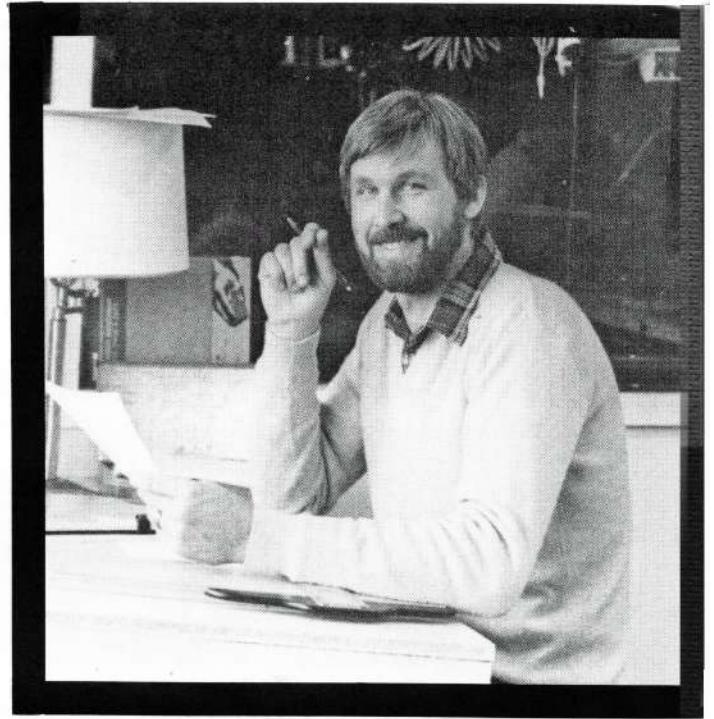


LAST BUT NOT LEAST!

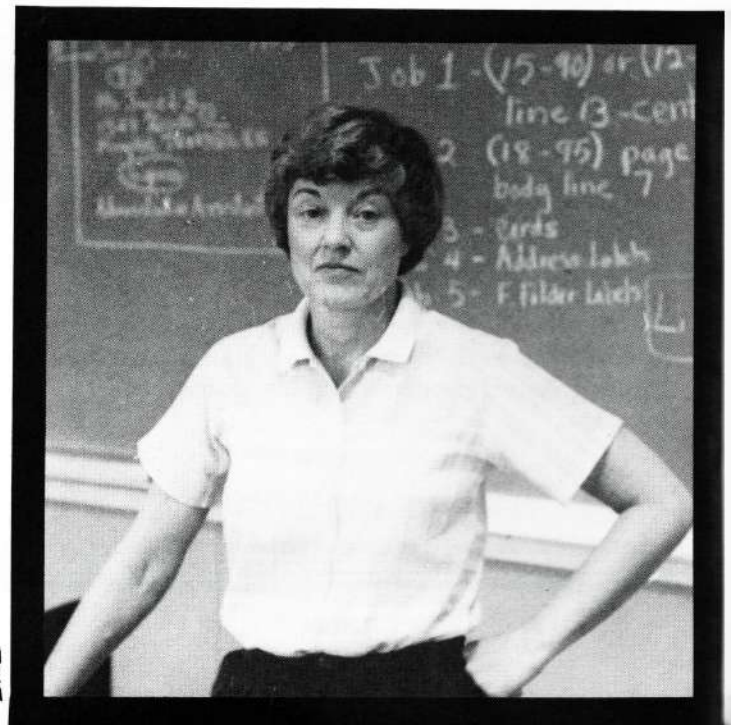

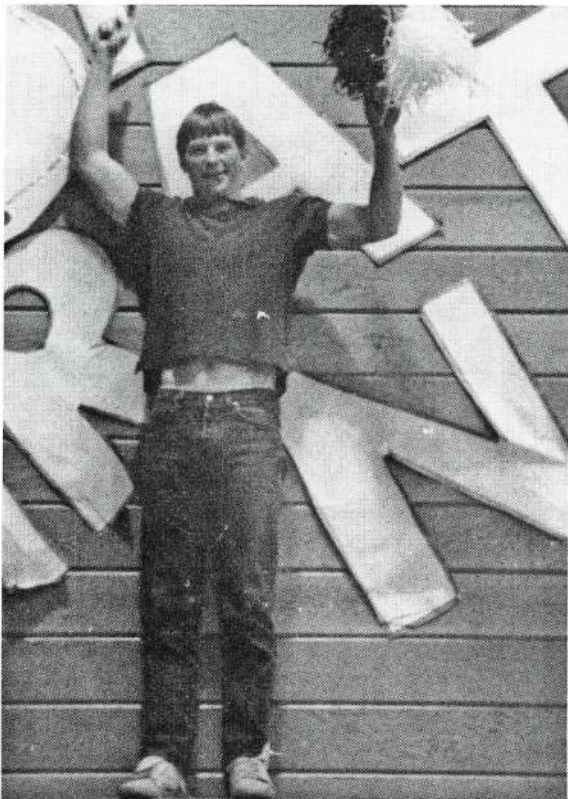

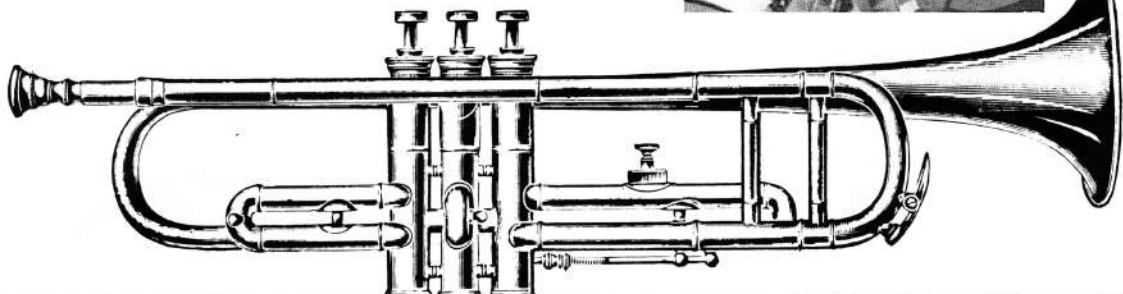
HERE IS A LOOK AT THE BAND

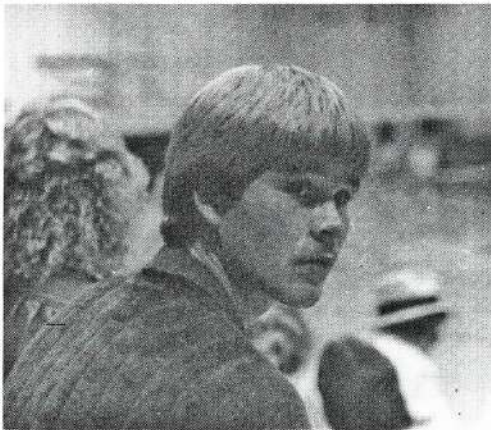
The high school and junior high bands planned to put on a talent show in May. Another end of the year activity that the band scheduled was a Spring concert in May.

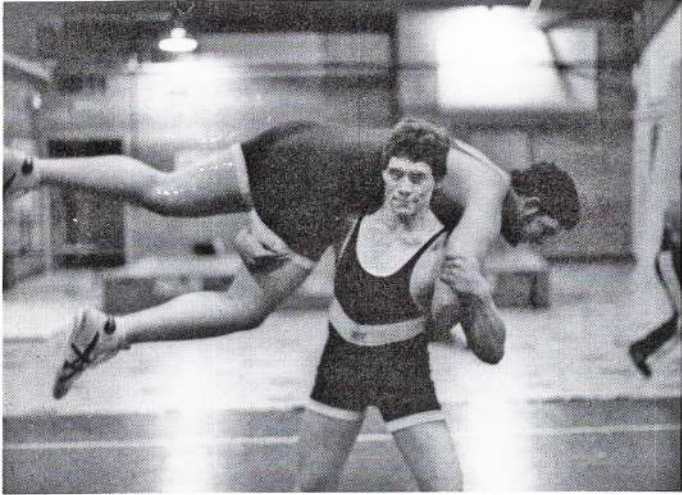
They've done several things to make money. One thing was the sale of carnations for Valentines Day. They have also sold posters and they have had several sales at lunch, like chili sales.

In many ways we are at a crossroads, and one of the jobs of the school board is to decide which way we should go. In the summer of '85 they decided to close

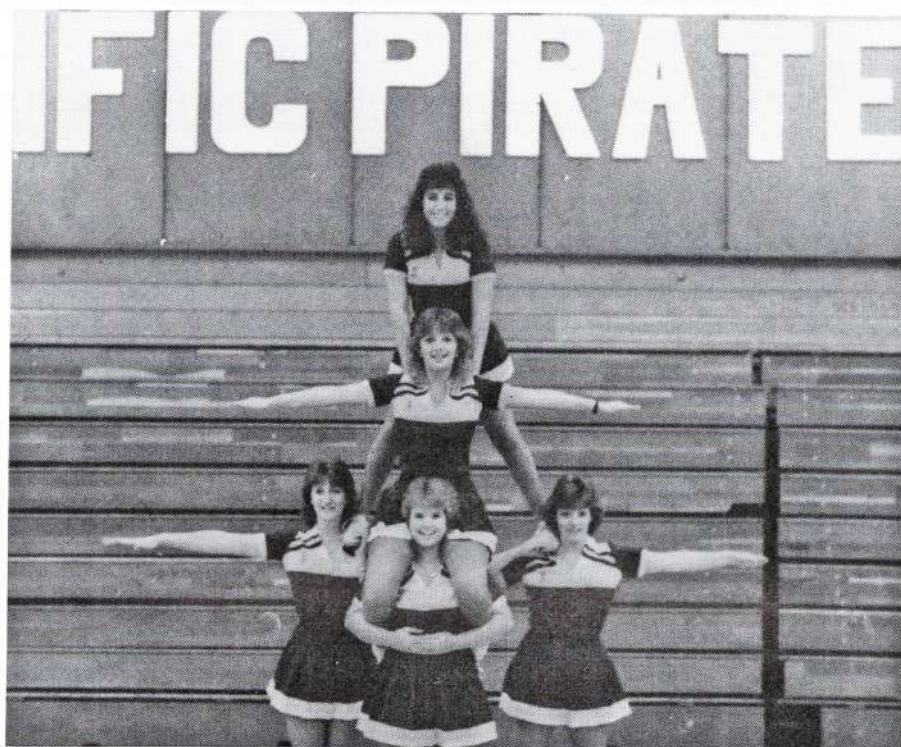
Blanco Jr. High in Langlois. In the Fall they decided to close Langlois Elementary.

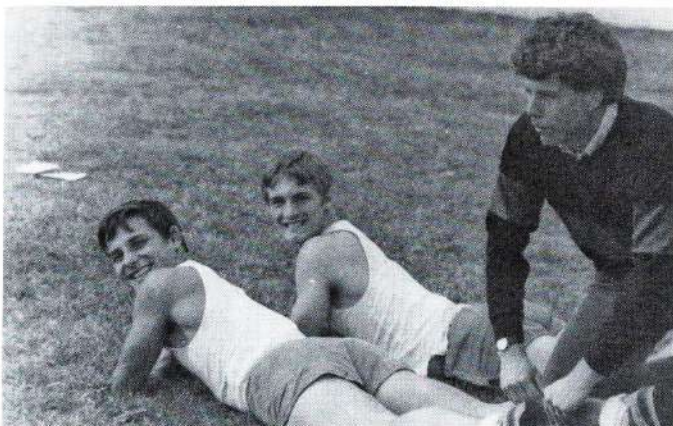


SHORT SEASON, GREAT PERFORMANCE.

The team had an outstanding season but they were never given the opportunity to fulfill their goal of bringing home a state trophy.

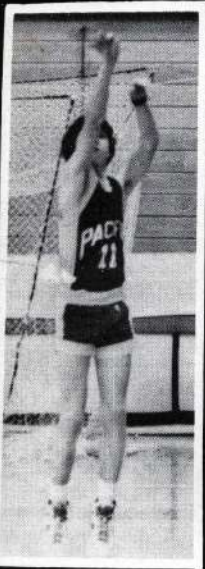
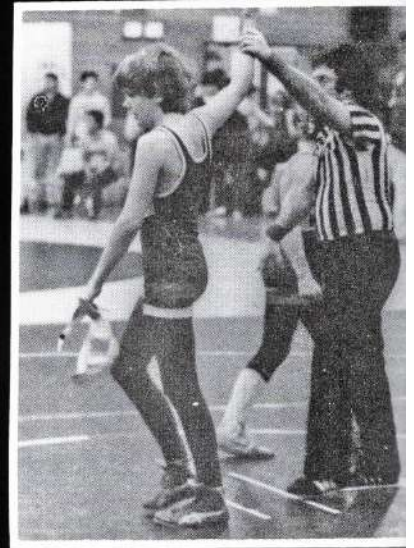

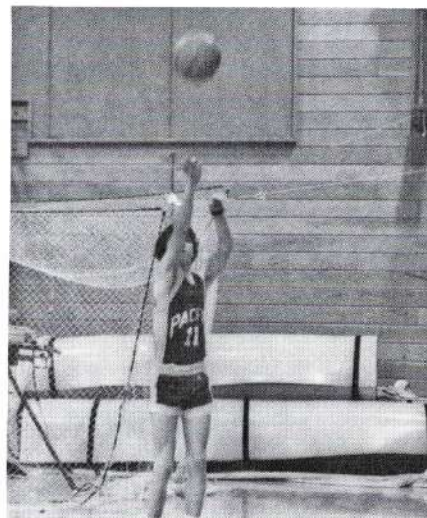
This year's J.V. basketball team was coached by Mr. Renius. They played 13 games and had a won-lost record of 5-8.

The 1986 homecoming week was a true success in the eyes of the students at Pacific High School.



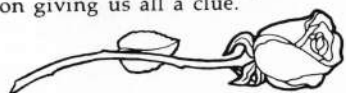

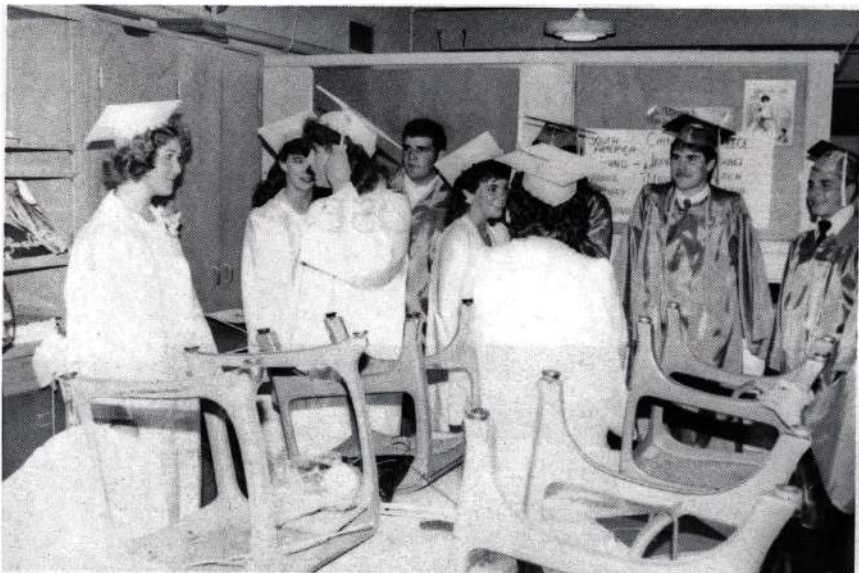
THE FINAL LINEUP!
