




Nancy Roberta Fox




Jeffrey Allen Moore


James E. Kistner






Donald C. Brent




William Johnson


Odell Flake Jr.


Lisa A. Hellemn




Marshall Dean Davis


Michael R. Gordon

This year's school board had three new members. Mrs. Cuthbert and Mrs. Haga took office in July and Mr. Sapp was appointed to fill Shirley VanLoo's seat in September.

This was Mr. Romney's first year as chief administrator and Mrs. Burns first year as Deputy clerk of the district. They also hired Alan Heagle for transportation Supervisor.

Our school budget levy passed in September; so that eliminated the uncertainty we've experienced in recent year's.

Driver training was added as an extra-curricular class on Saturdays and during evenings. Students paid for the class themselves.

The board decided against letting the students have the Prom in Coos Bay.

There are seven board members and this year's chairman is Mary Yoder.

In District 2CJ this is the breakdown for the board: Port Orford is given two board members, Elk River is given one, Sixes is given one. Langlois is given one, Laural Grove is given one, and one is chosen for the district at large.


One of the most time-consuming jobs of the school board is to consider, revise, discuss, and eventually submit a budget for the voter's approval.

This year's legislature is expected to refer a proposal on school finance to the voters so that school districts will not be under the threat of closure every year.





SOPHIE EVARD SPENDS A YEAR AT PACIFIC





The team was made up of the eight girls above and Melissa Smith. They won a total of three games. Four members of the team are seniors. The team was coached by Dave Evans.



The members of the Prom Committee are to be commended for helping raise \$1500.00, doing the planning, and doing much of the work.









Dana ranks among her favorite things bow hunting, reading, writing and arithmatic. Dana is currently the President of N.H.S. and has lettered in academics the last two years.


The 1987 graduation ceremony was held on Friday, June 5, 1987 at 8:00 p.m.
