On Tuesday, January 7, the school board decided to not change from the present three-school organization of the district.

In summary, the board voted to move the students from the Blanco Junior High to the former grade school building in Langlois. The elementary building in Port Orford will continue to house the first five grades plus kindergarten. Pacific High School will continue to house the upper four grades. The present junior high and the surrounding acreage will be sold.

The board has spent much time and energy in maphing the districts for the present in May will decide.





Two school records were broken during the season. Cheryl Shepherd and Junior Lisa Hensley set records for spikes and ace serves respectively.





2ND SEMESTER JOURNALISTS







They performed in Pep band at numerous games and in two concerts, the Christmas concert and the Spring concert. These concerts were a combination of band and chorus from all the schools.





















Nate has an unusual sense of humor, is never at a loss for words and is guaranteed to liven up any class. Congratulations on being valedictorian and good luck in the future.


SALUTATORIAN

for graduation and to spend time with friends and family.


After graduation, the seniors boarded a school bus and were taken to Coos
