THE STORY OF THE YEAR



The story of the year has to be the elimination of transportation in our school district. After repeated budget failures, the school board decided to cut busing rather than other activities.

First responses to the cut included angry parents, bumper stickers and posters with slogans, and frustrations of getting children to and from school. Eventually people made adjustments and things settled down somewhat after several attempts to restore busing failed.

One such effort was made by a group of interested individuals who surveyed the community to determine an interest in a program of tuition busing. Lack of interest resulted in the proposal being dropped. As this story was being written, a movement was being made by initiative petition to force the district to restore busing.

The 1988-1989 school year is the first time in decades that busing has not been provided. This turn of events came from our schools being in the Safety Net for the second year.

Our school district in recent years has had difficulty passing budget levy requests and the future remains uncertain. Hopefully through cooperation between local taxpayers and state legislature, perhaps funding for busing and other school functions will be restored.

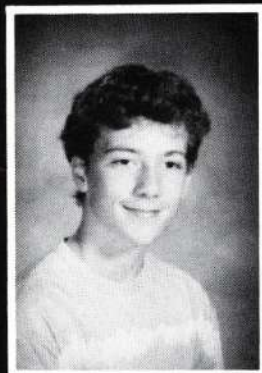
The year had finally come to an end with excitement and regret, but we'll all cherish our memories of the sports activities, the dances, and just "bumming around" in the halls with our friends.

MAKING THE GRADES



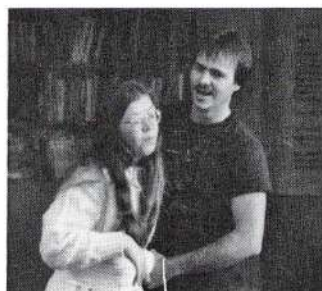

Even though we may not show it, we appreciate your friendship and hard work. Thanks for always being there!!

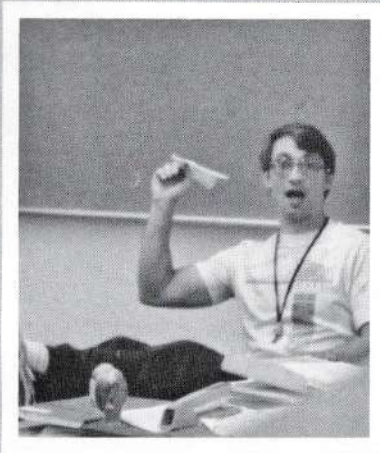

EIGHT SENIORS LEAD TEAM



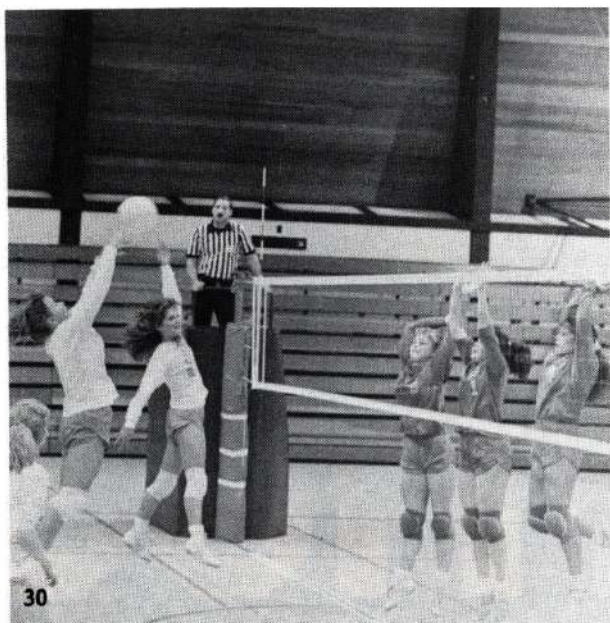

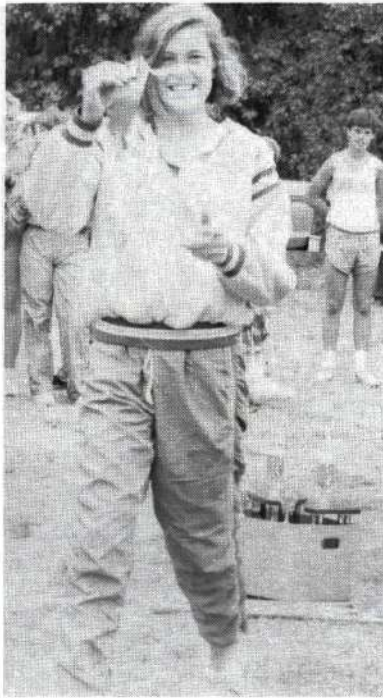

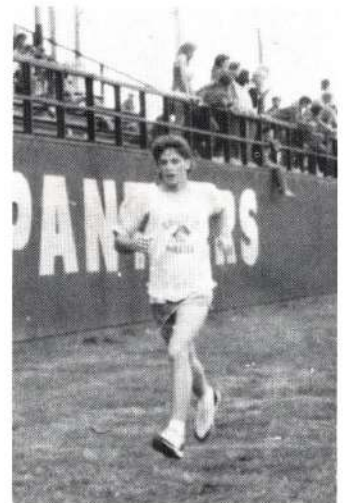
This years season started early for a few runners with the Hood to Coast Relay, a 168 mile run. Many of them were up for 44 hours. They all worked hard and came through to earn medals finishing just under 21 hours. Mr. Moore remembers "when John Owens ran an incredible time on his last leg (3rd) to pull us back to where we had a shot at 21 hours."

The season's highest achievement for both J.V. and Varsity boys was at District, when both teams came home with the title. Five runners on the varsity squad finished under 18 minutes, for the best team time of the season. Cody Neely led the squad with a third place finish.

The individual girls District Champion was Priscilla Thomas with a time of 12:18. She also set a new school record, breaking Stephanie Beckman's mark set in 1981.

The season ended with the participation from the athletes in the OSAA Cross Country State meet. Priscilla Thomas ran a dazzling race, placing third in a field of seventy. The varsity boys placed sixth. Cody Neely led the Pirates placing 22nd out of 153.

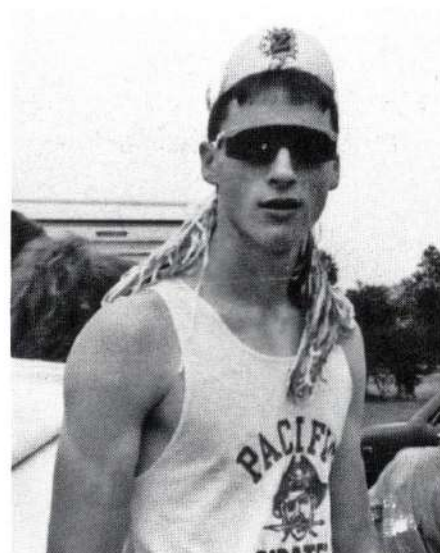

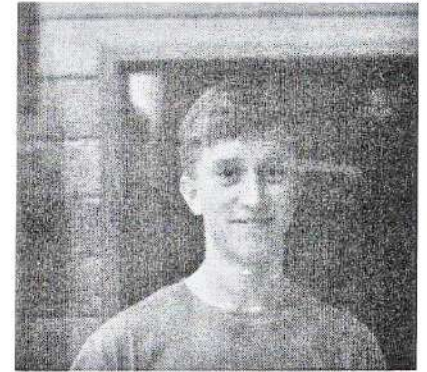
STUDENT COUNCIL TAKES CHARGE

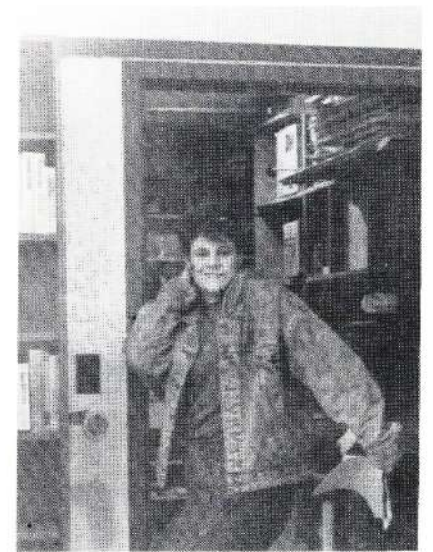

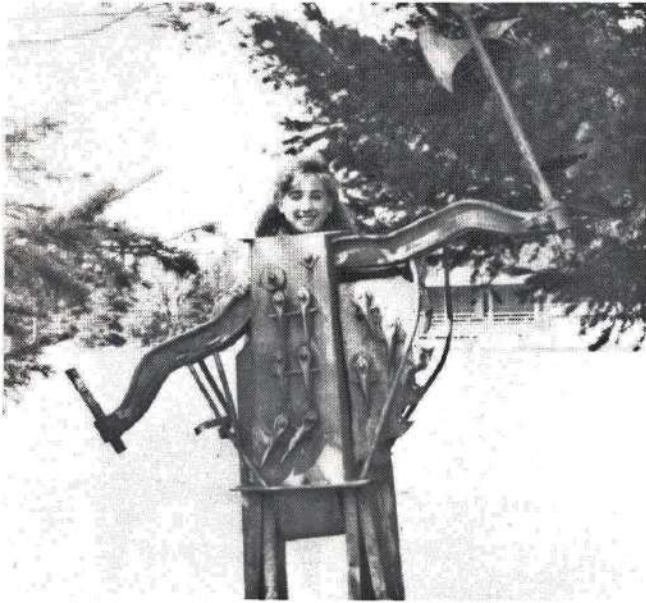

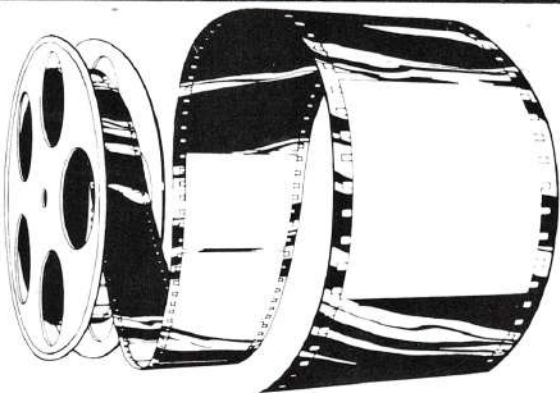
The second and third deadlines were much easier. We had gained experience and the problems that arose were handled with dispatch.

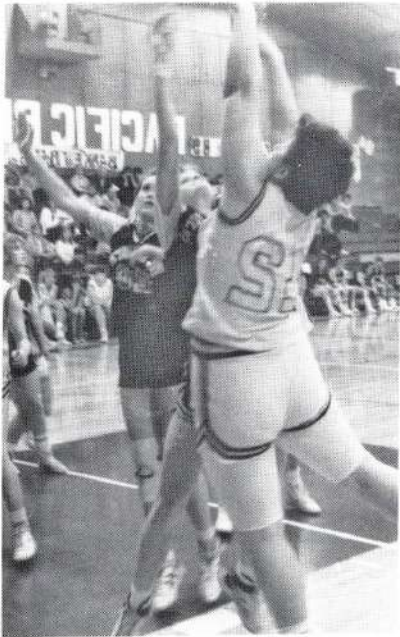
BEST TEAM IN 9 YEARS!

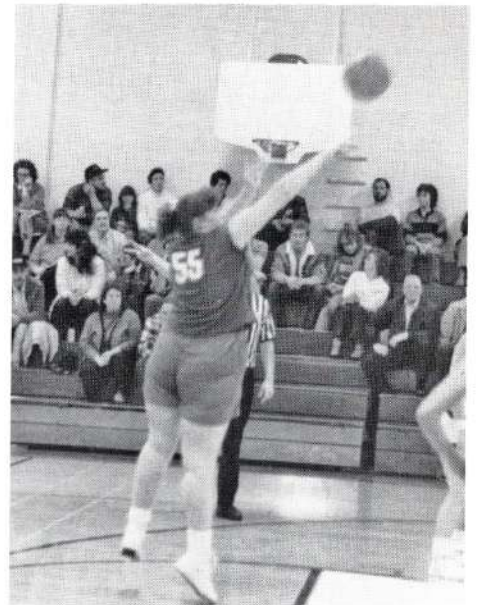

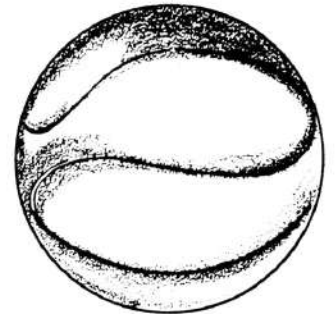

The JV team had a new coach this year, since Diana Neely, last year's coach, was moved up to Varsity coach. Mr. Norse was the JV coach this season.

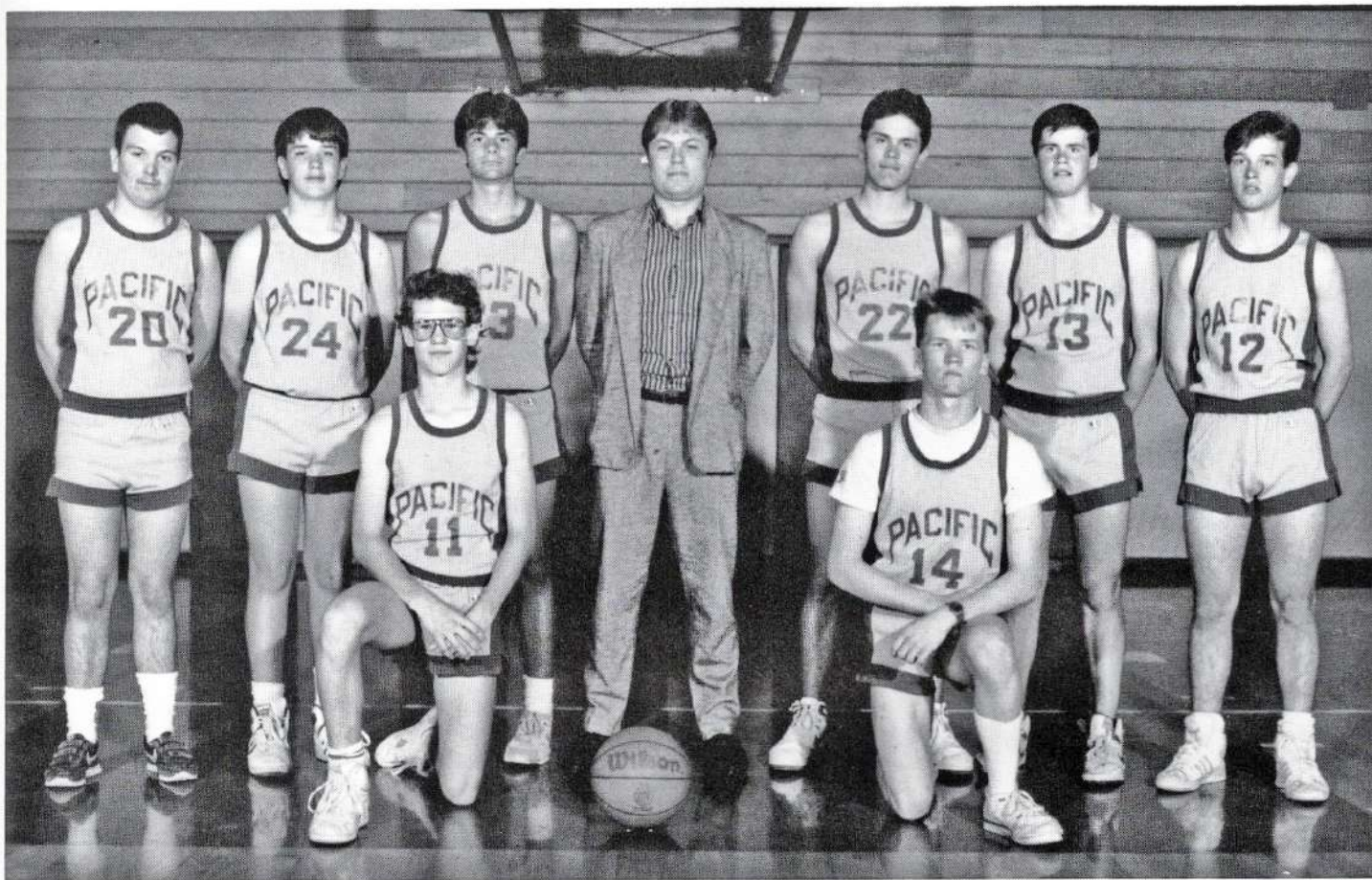

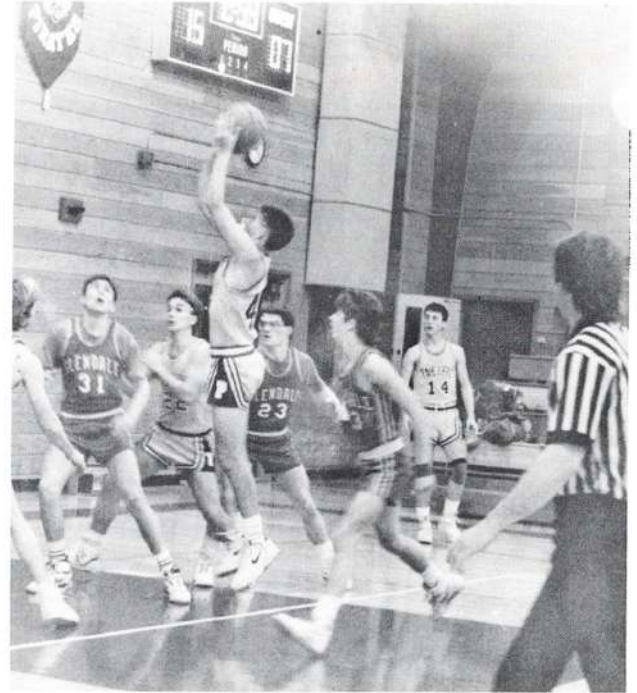


"THE HAQLES ARE BACK!"

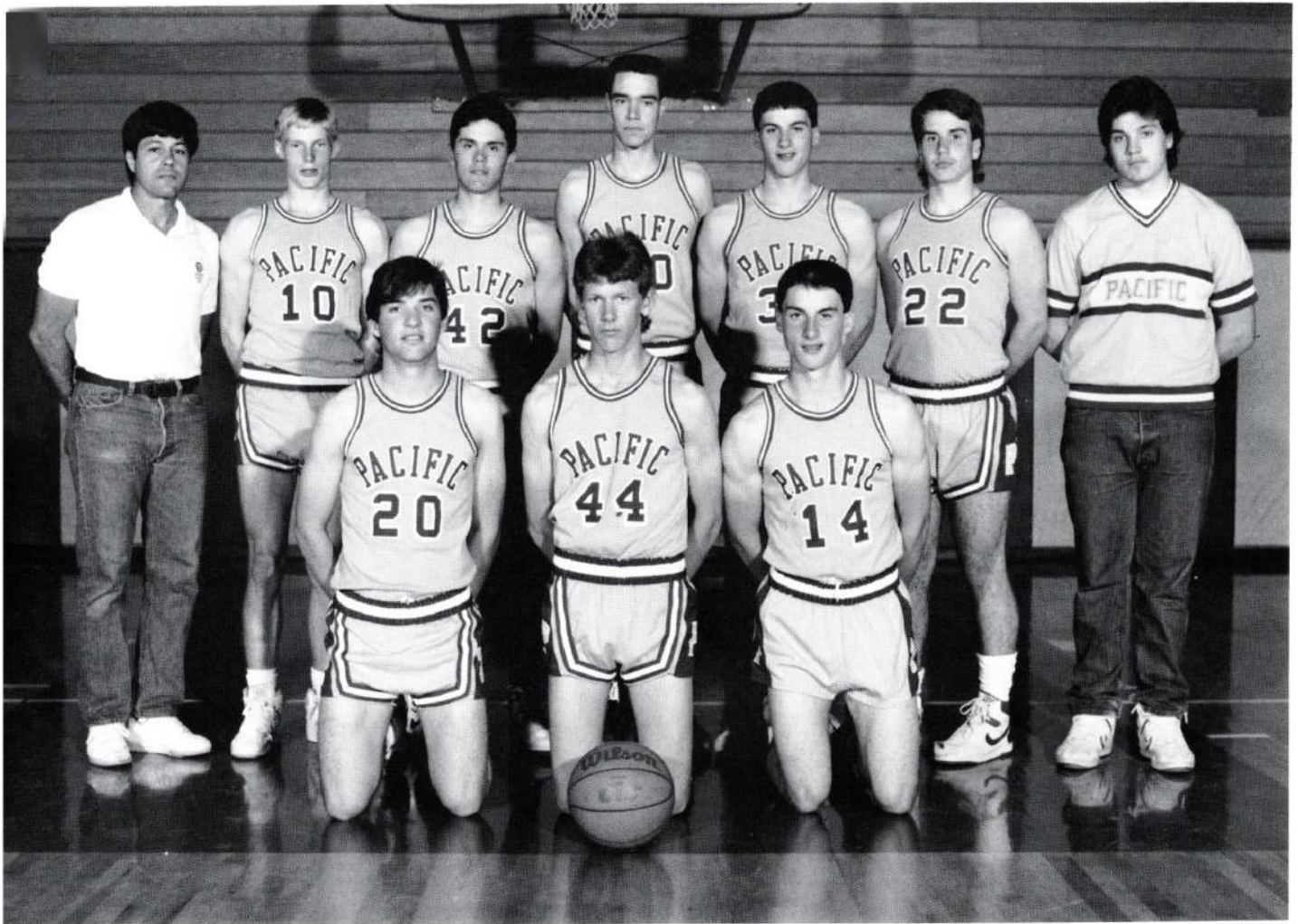

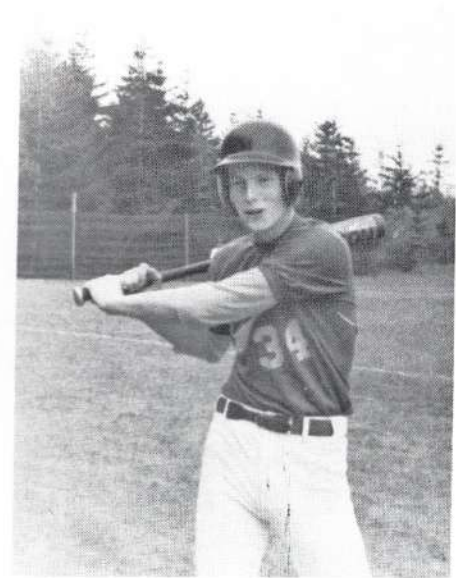
Steve Smith has the most runs batted in with 10; Cody Neely has 7 RBI's.

Cody Neely has two home runs at the present time, and James Buzzard has one. Pete Legg hit a "grand-slam" home run during the St. Mary's game at Medford.

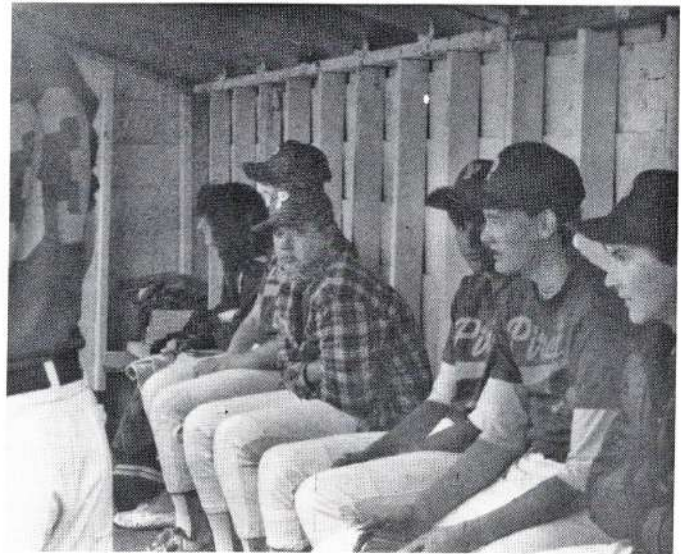
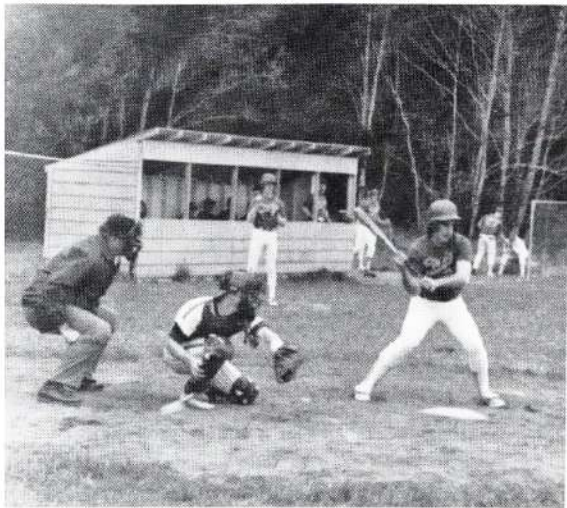

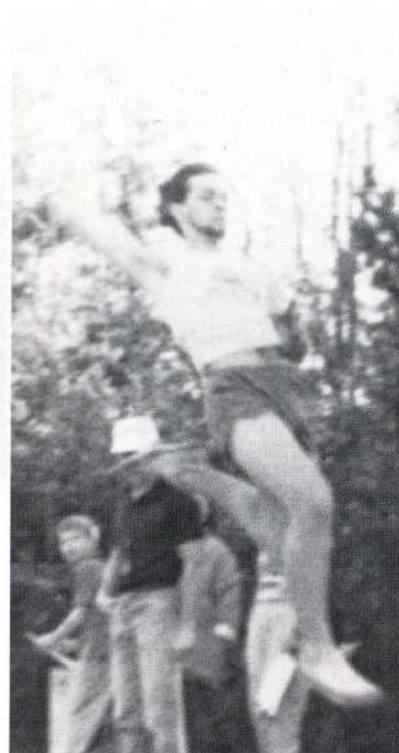

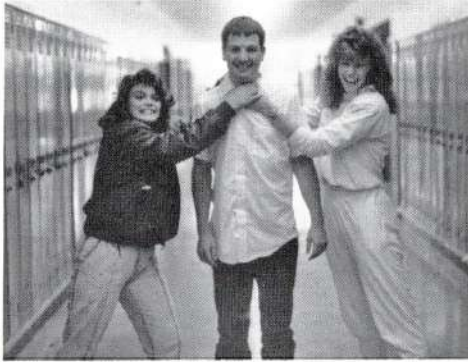
Ms. Thomas plans to attend Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon. She enjoys reading, mountain biking, hiking and writing poetry.
