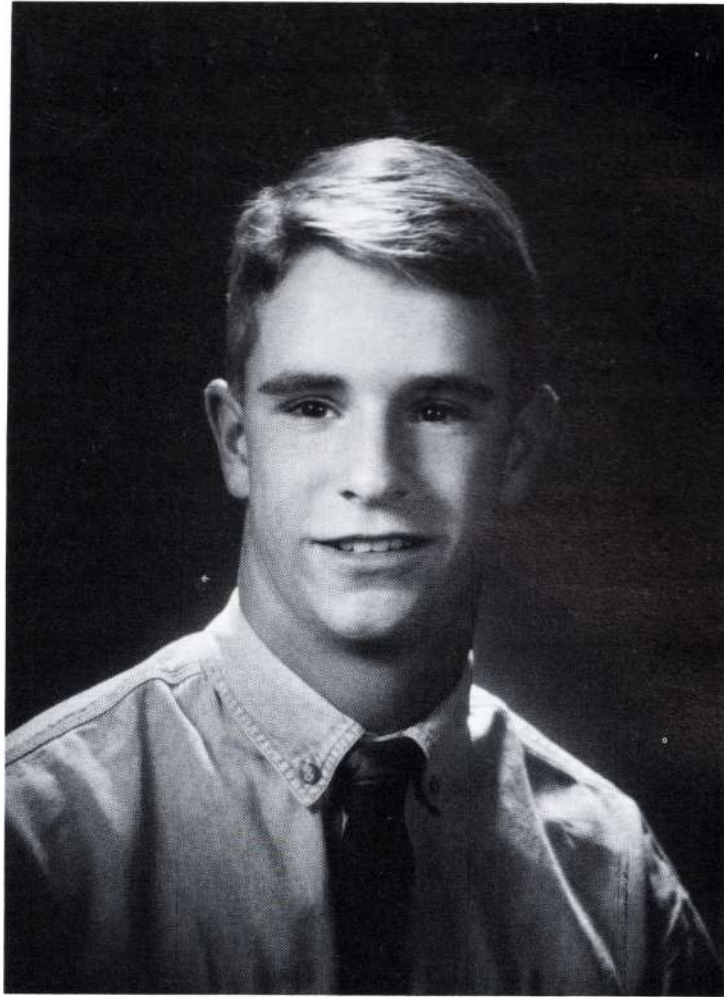

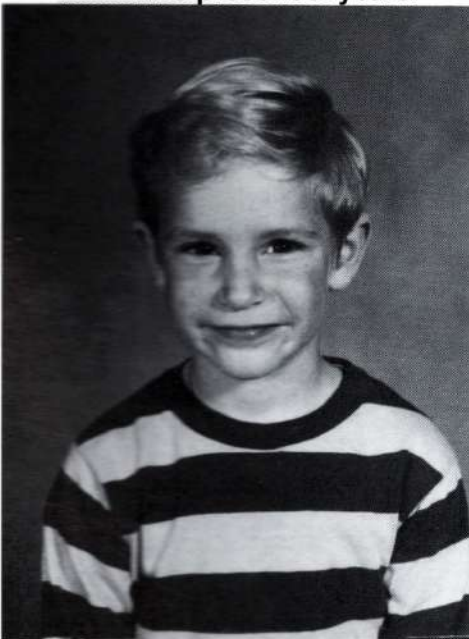


# In Memoriam

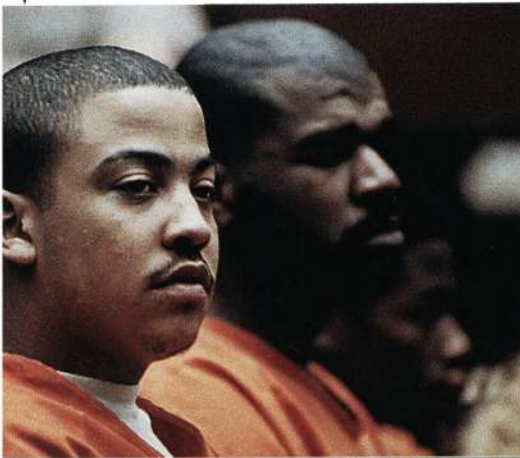

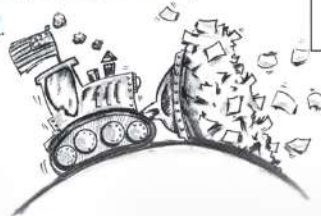

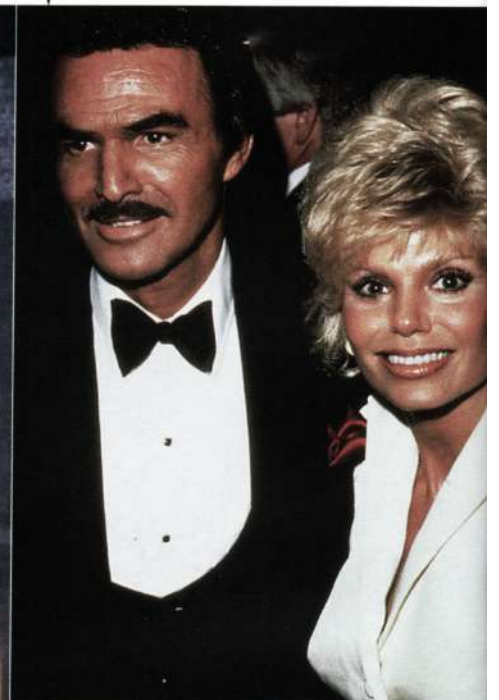

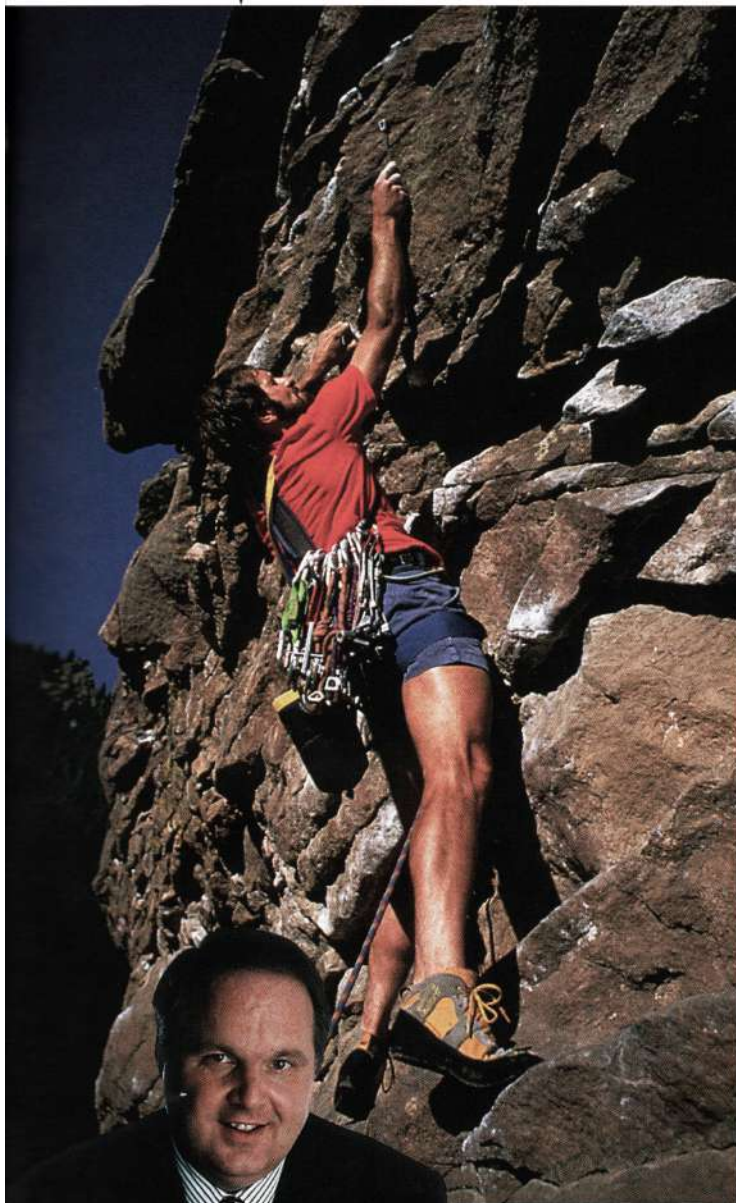

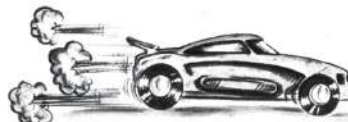

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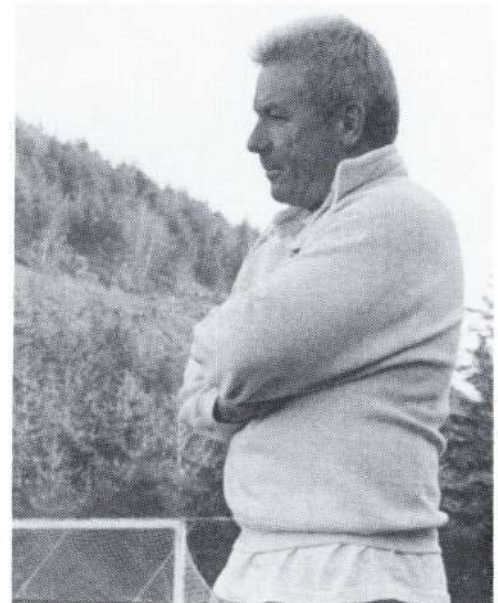

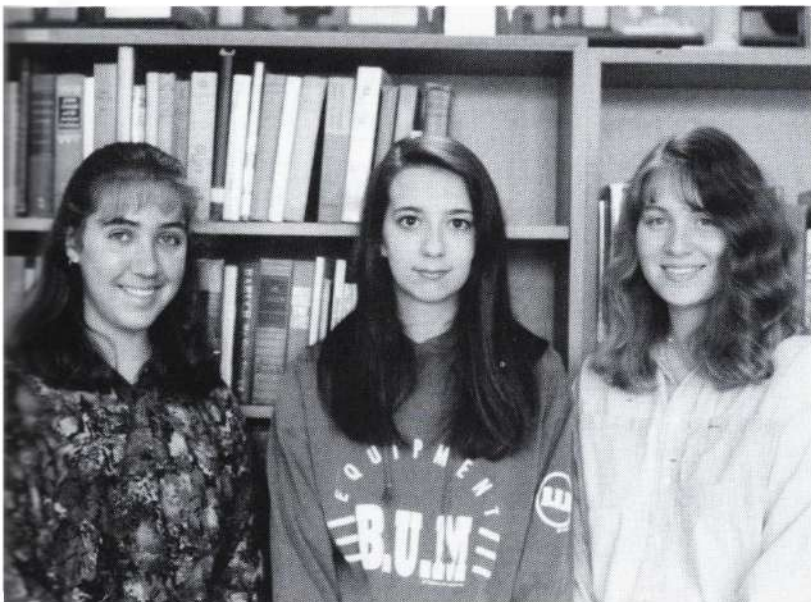

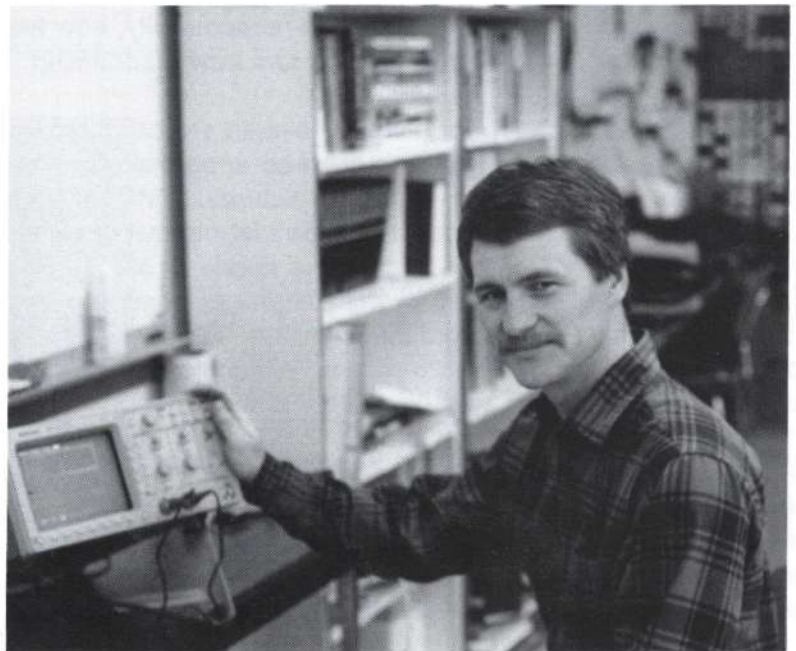

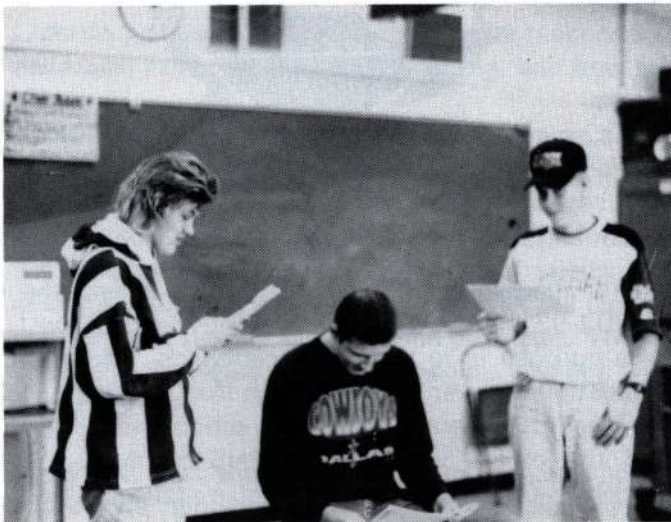


# Pacific Players Present

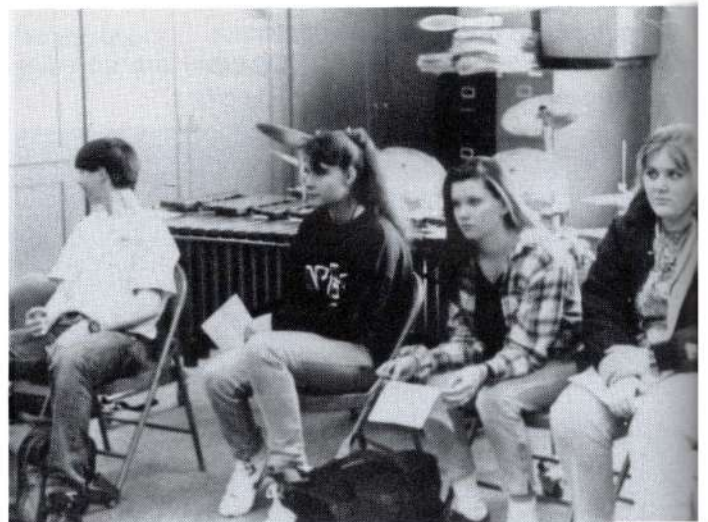

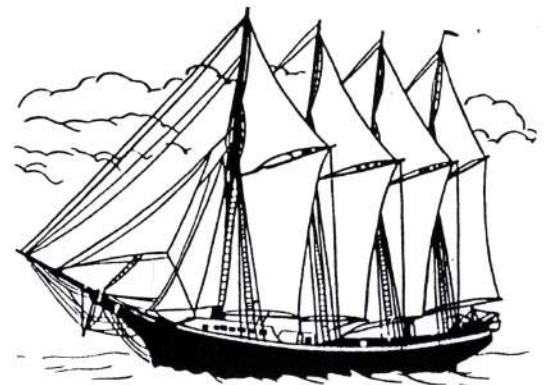

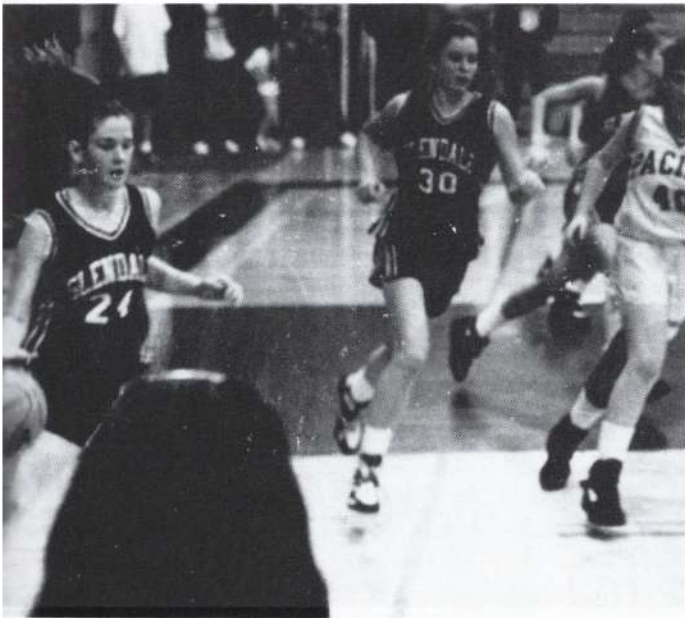

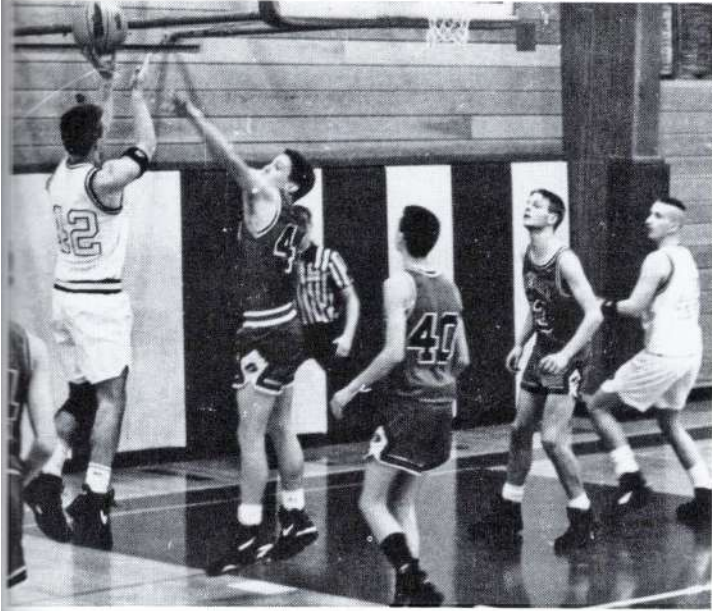

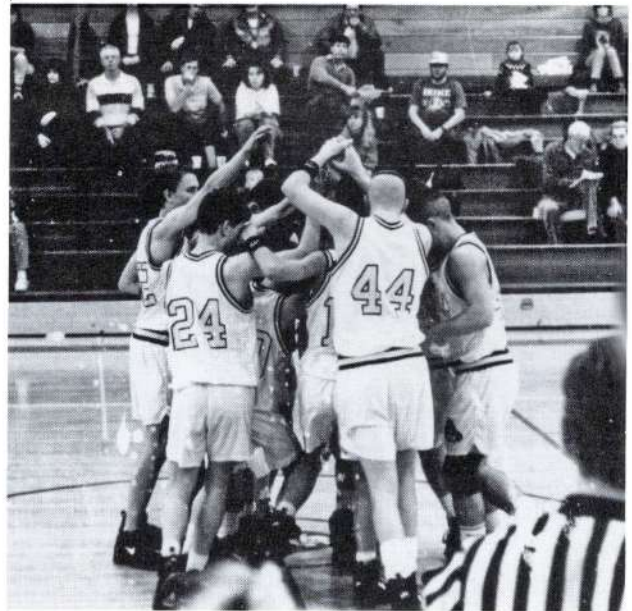

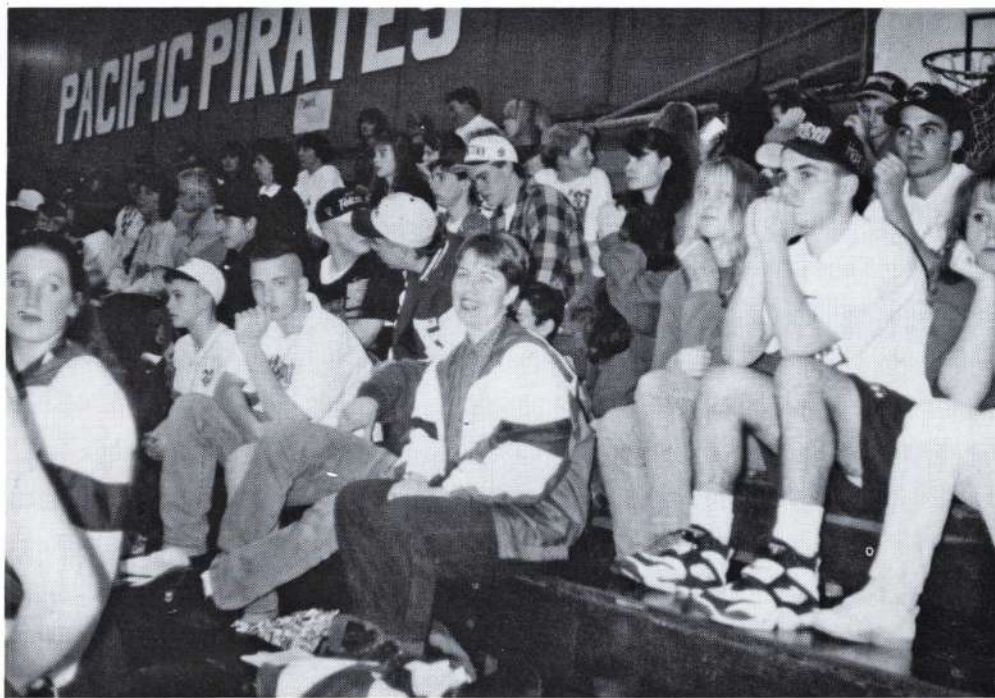

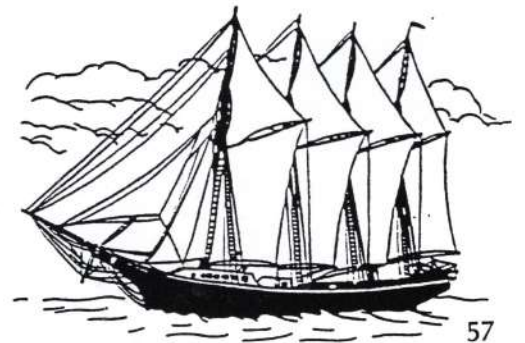

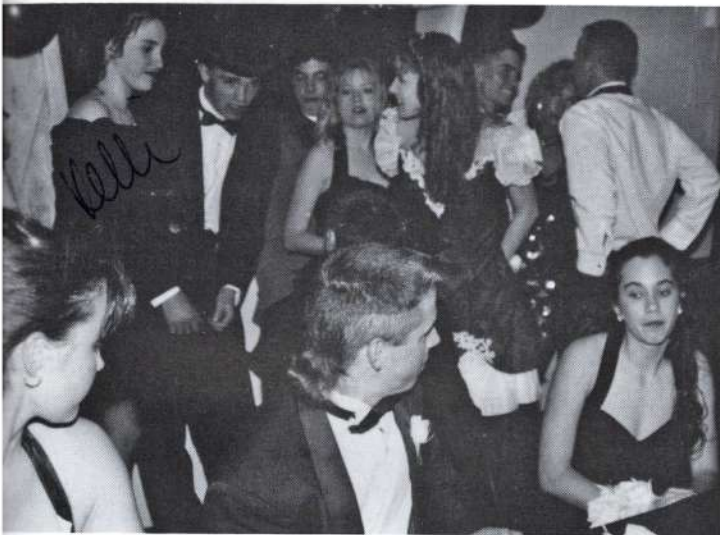

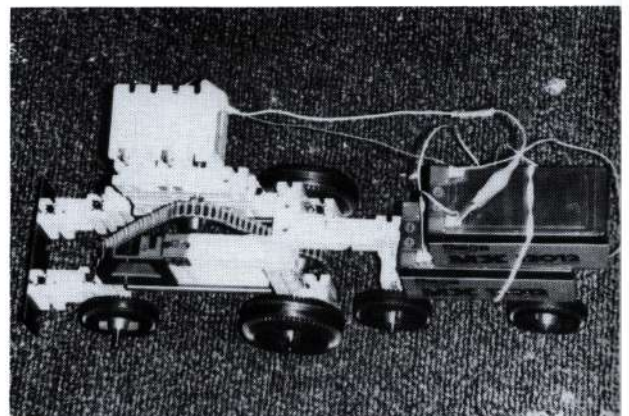

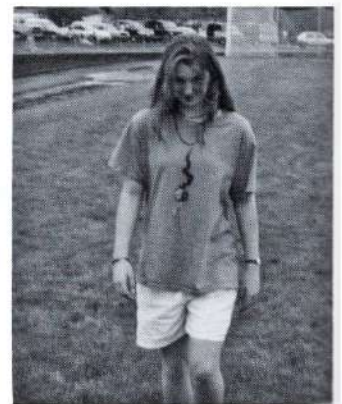

The boys' team did particularly well at district for the number of boys participating. The team had only seven members, and they managed to place fourth overall.

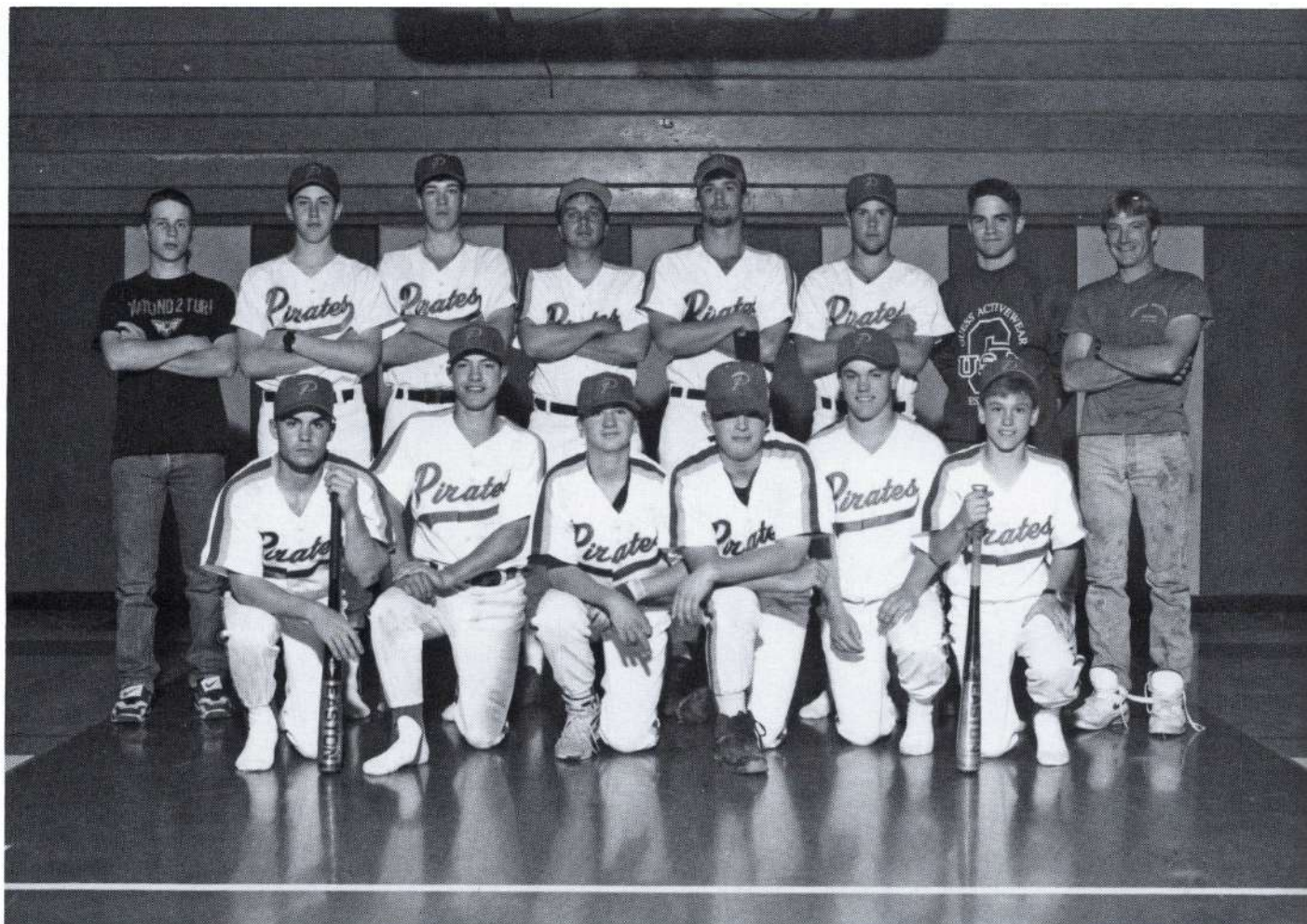

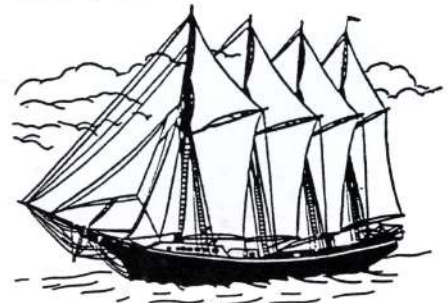




The PHS Commencement exercises for the Class of '94 were held Friday, June 10.
