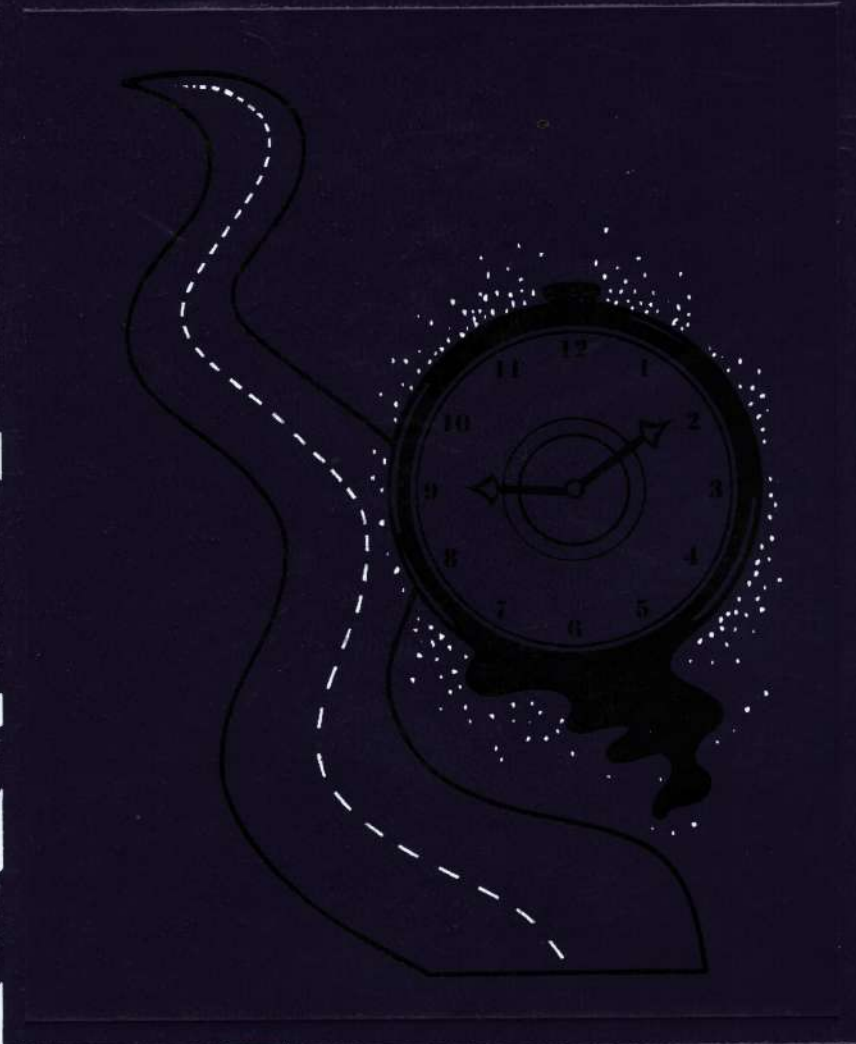

The yearbook class for the 1998-99 school year was a class full of beginners with only a few experienced staffers leading the way. The class this year was larger than any previous yearbook class with 18 students on staff, the class spent lots of time tripping over each other. The year's theme, "It's about time" was very fitting. There were many close calls with deadlines we didn't think we could meet. This was when we learned to deal with "time" shortages. This was also the first year that the yearbook staff tried having multiple editors. The class had a copy editor, layout editor, and photo editor, as well as one overall editor. "It's about time."

All of the fall sports teams made it to state playoffs. This was the first time ever for soccer to make the playoffs; the Pirate's successful season led them to the second playoff round. To add excitement to the beginning of the year, the boy's cross country team qualified for state competition. During the spring sport season, the baseball and track teams also had very successful seasons. The baseball players advanced to league playoffs. The track team had three district champions, Ryan Keeler, Kristin Lee, and Lane Neely. These members, as well as Kit Mohney, who placed second, all went on to compete at the state meet. Ryan Keeler also became the first male athlete to make it to state all four years of high school. "It's about time."

This was the first year that Pacific has ever had a state officer for the Future Business Leaders of America. Rachel Moskowitz campaigned for and won the position of 1998-1999 District V Vice President. With this responsibility came the challenge of hosting the District Skills Conference at PHS. This was a big event with 250 students from around the district attending and competing. Having a state officer connected Pacific FBLA with state projects, officers, and staff. The year's FBLA chapter also set another PHS first. Four members, the largest number ever, qualified to compete at the national level. "It's about time."

Pacific High School became a new member of the Future Farmers of America or FFA during the school year. The new Agro Biology teacher, Mr. Cooper, chartered and served as advisor for this chapter with 18 members. Chartering this chapter provided another way for students to get involved in extracurricular activities. "It's about time."

Another first that benefitted many students was the National Honor Society tutorial program. Several NHS members came to school 45 minutes early on Tuesdays and Thursdays to help other students with their homework questions. "It's about time."

A school improvement for the year was the installment of a new stall door in the boy's junior/senior bathroom. Thank you Student Council. "It's about time."

These events are just a part of what made the year unique. They offered many opportunities to reflect back through time. Then, of course, this was the last year before the millennium, so it's a time to think of the future. The year, the firsts, and the new student records have all given 1998-1999 its place in history. "It's about time."

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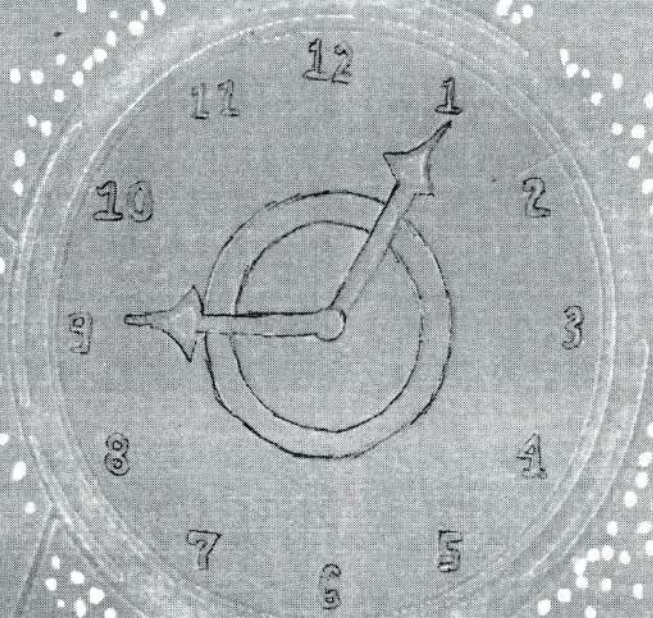

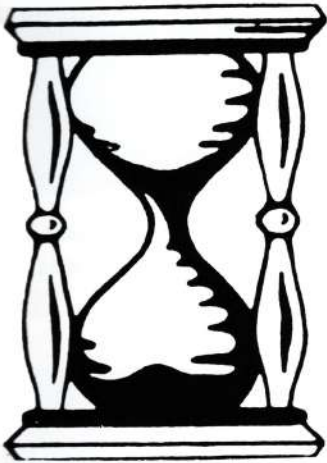

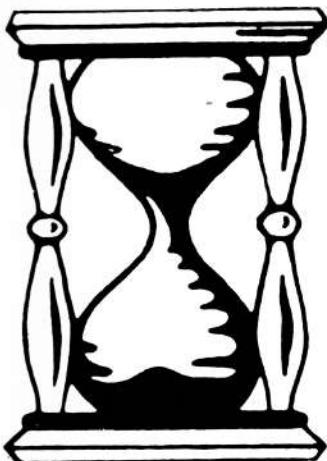

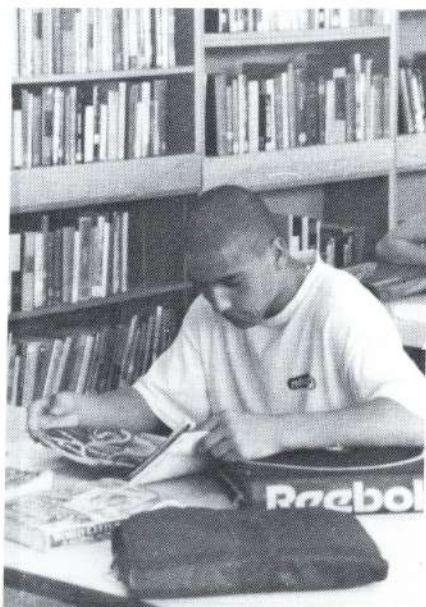


# Time Well Spent On

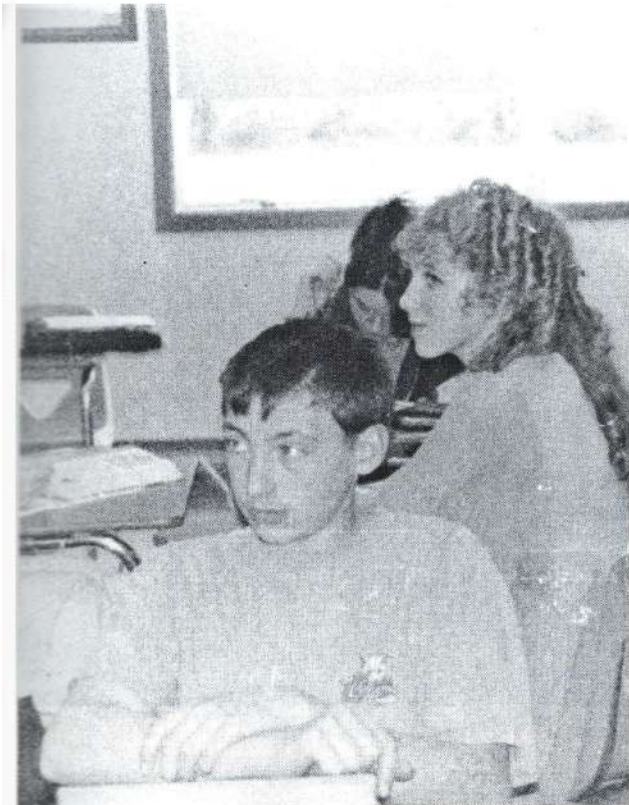

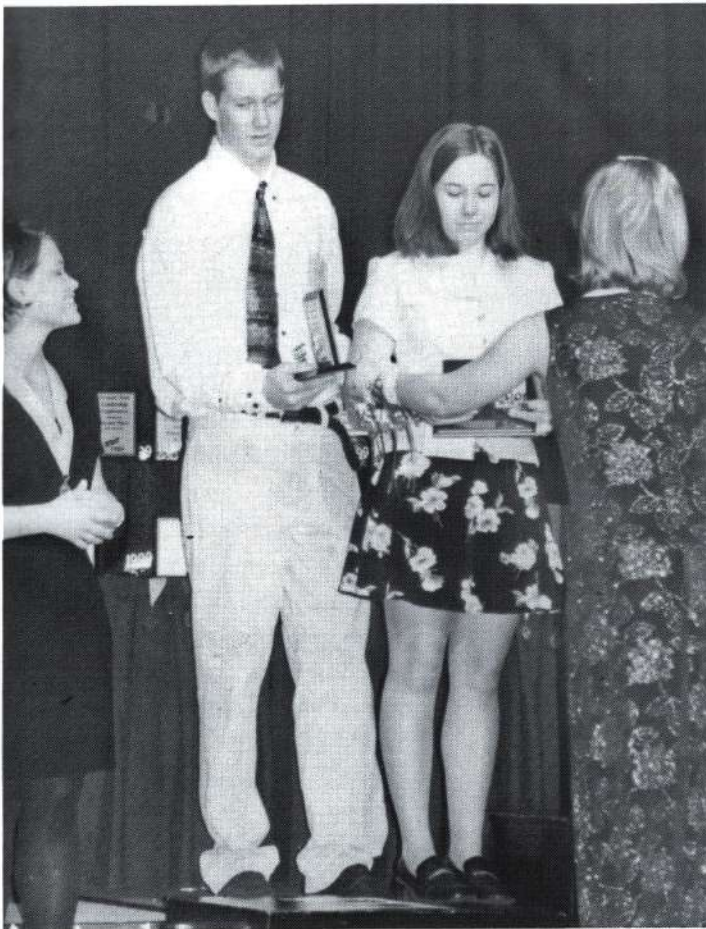

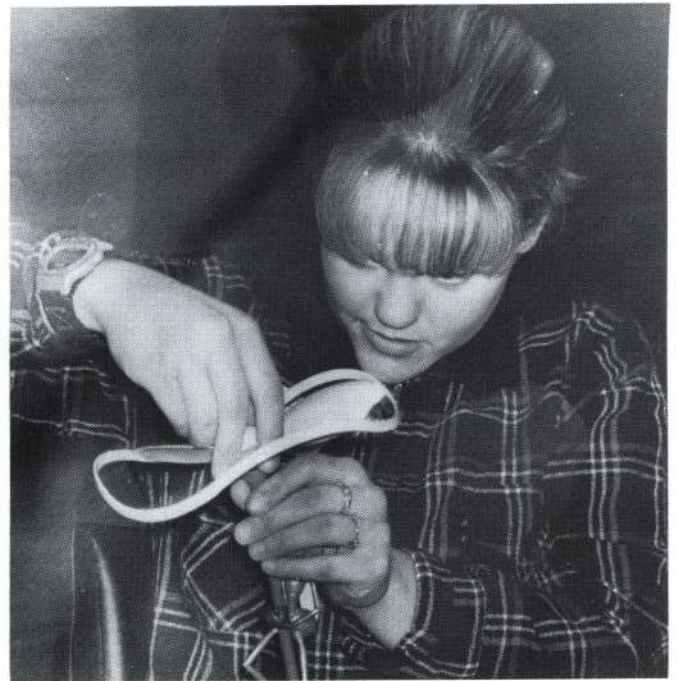

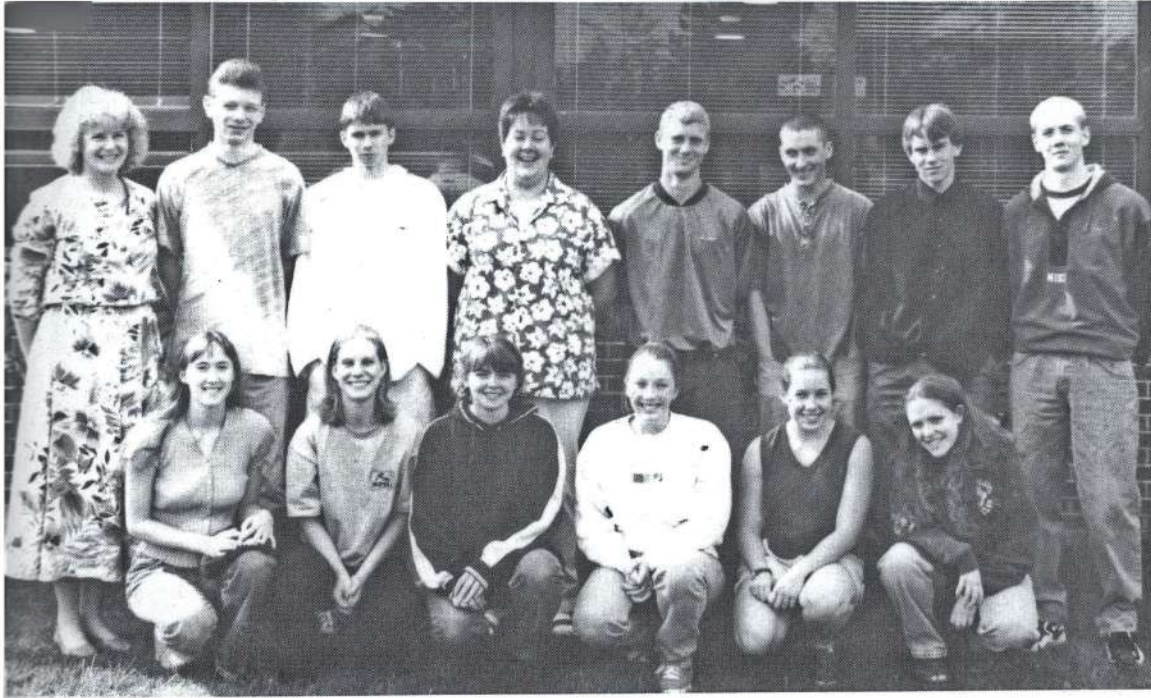

secretary/treasurer Rachel Swenson were both members last year and vice president Adam House was secretary/treasurer last year. There were six new members this year, all juniors.





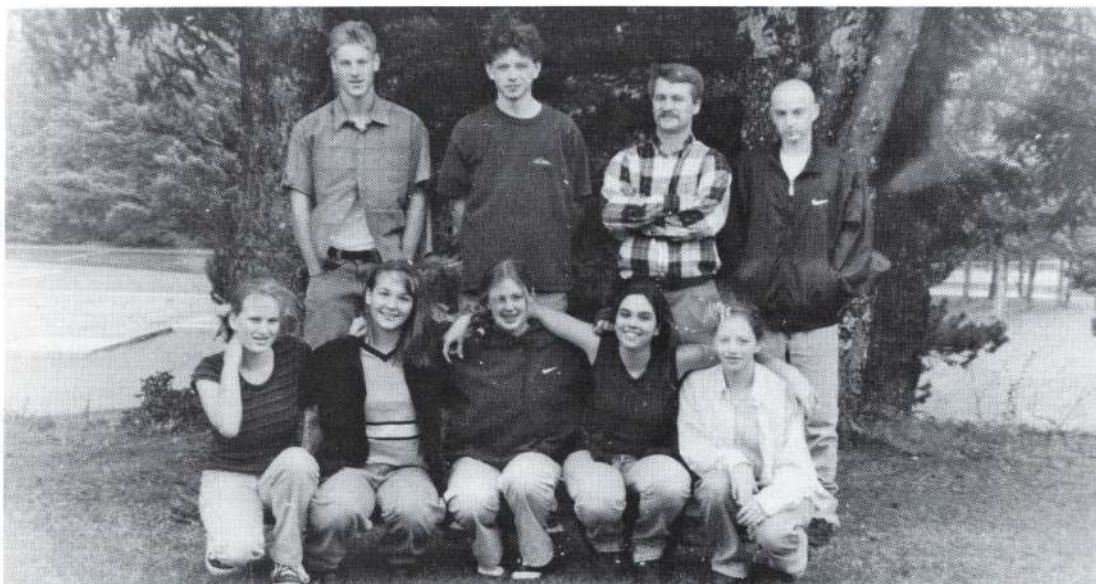

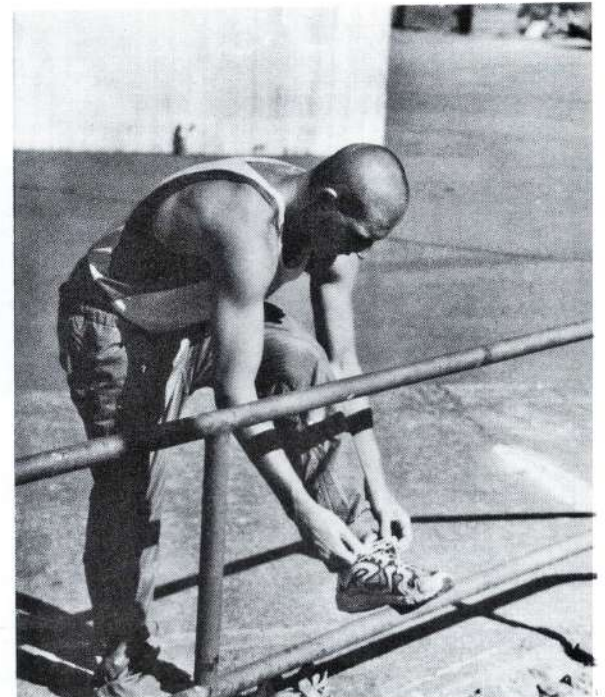

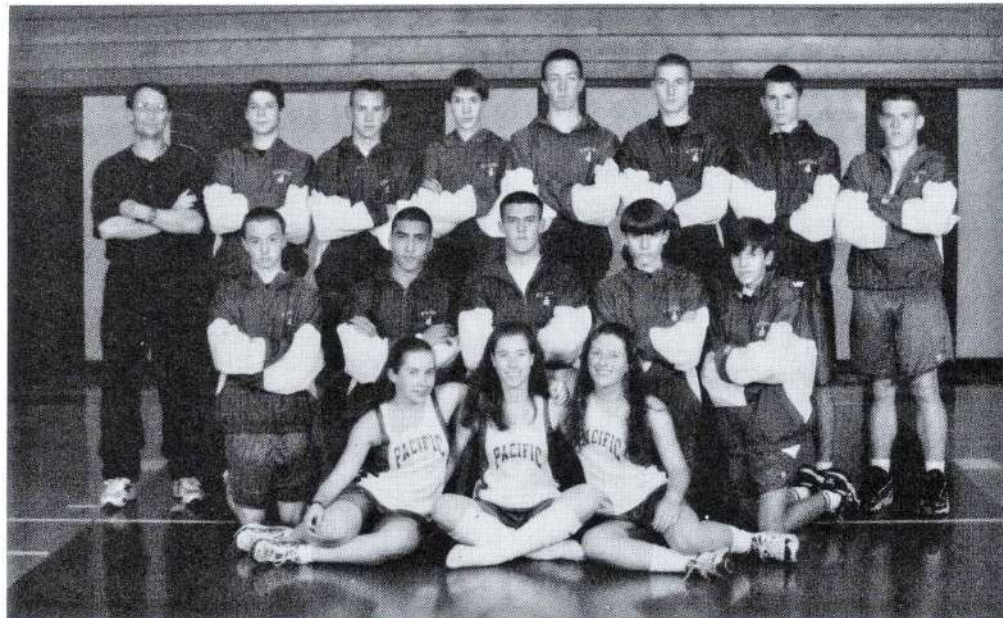

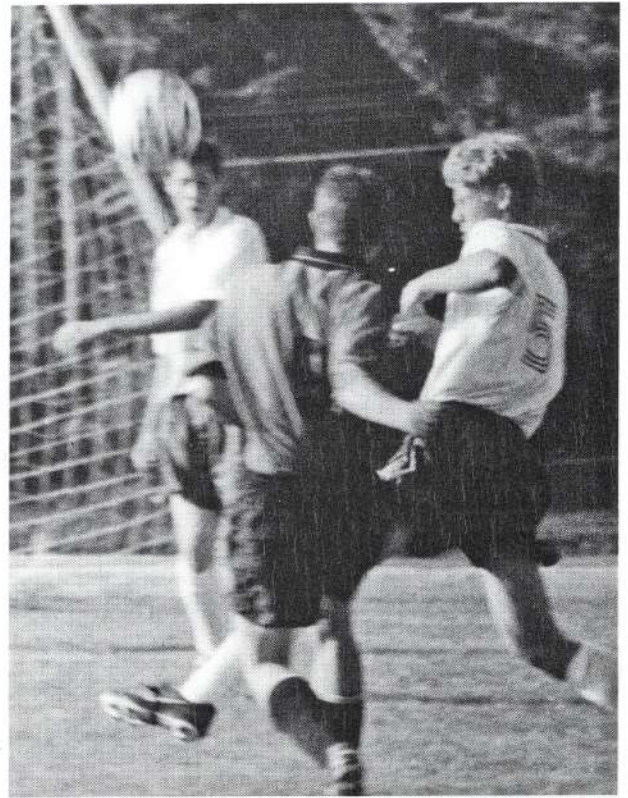

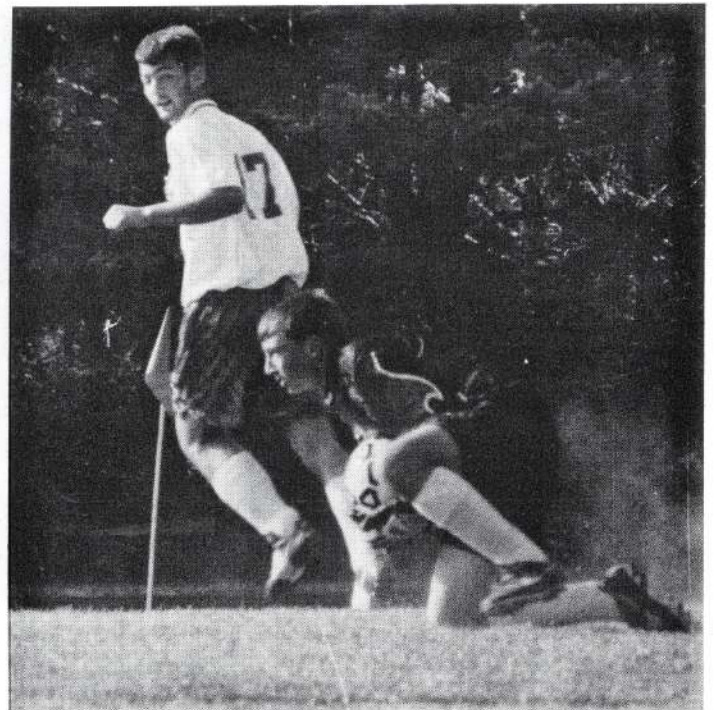


Above: While going for the ball, Shawn Lang gets tangled up with a Coquille player as Aaron McKenzie backs away to give him support.

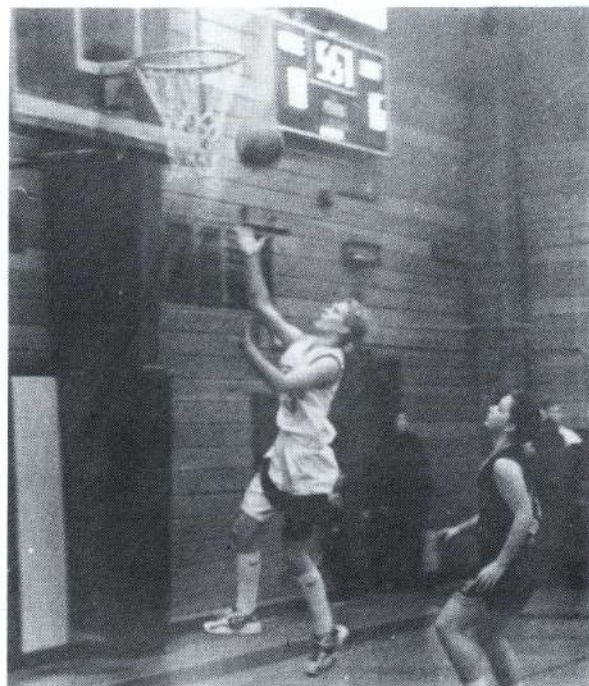


Above: Shilo McKenzie uses her skillful ball handling techniques to move the ball down the court.

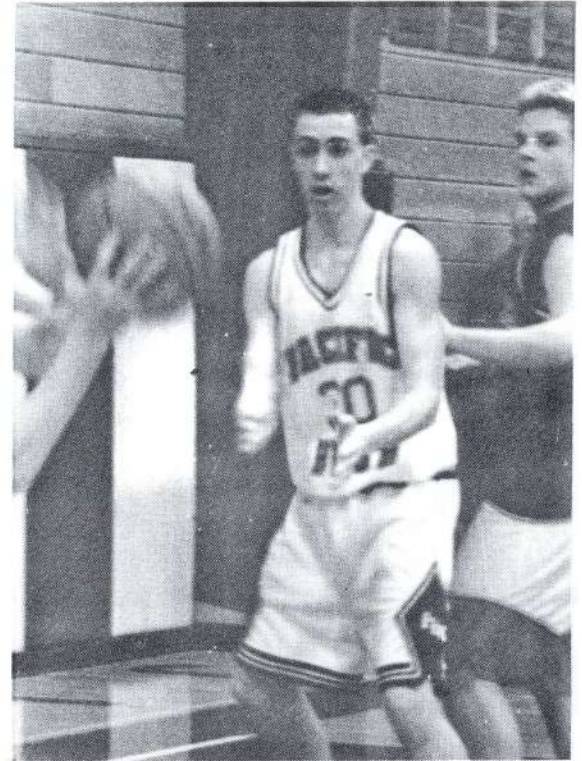

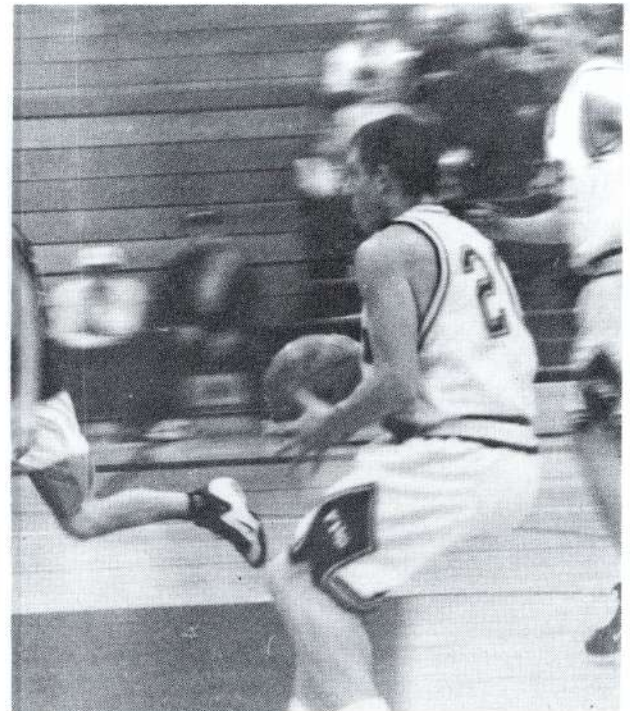

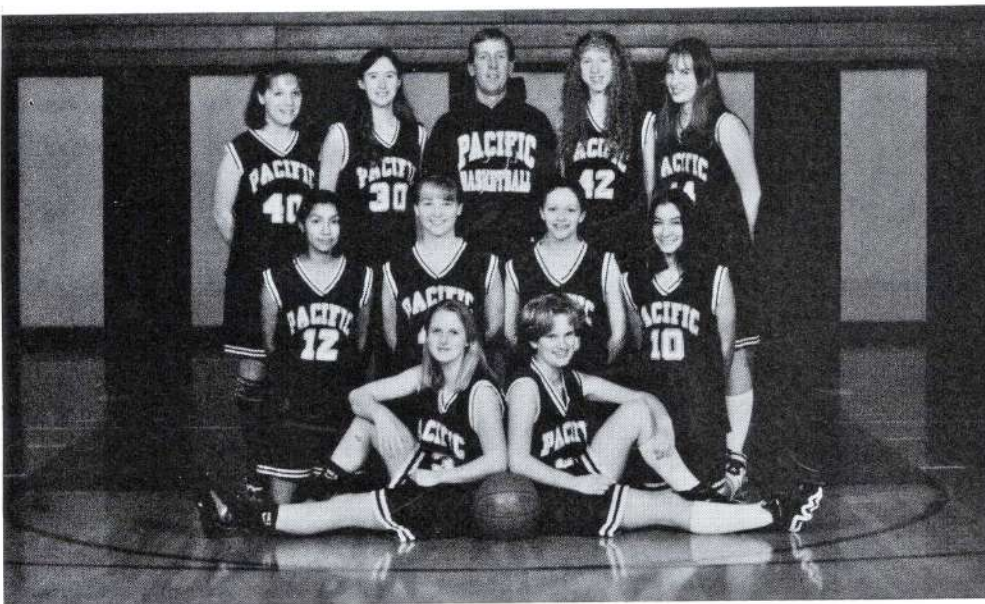

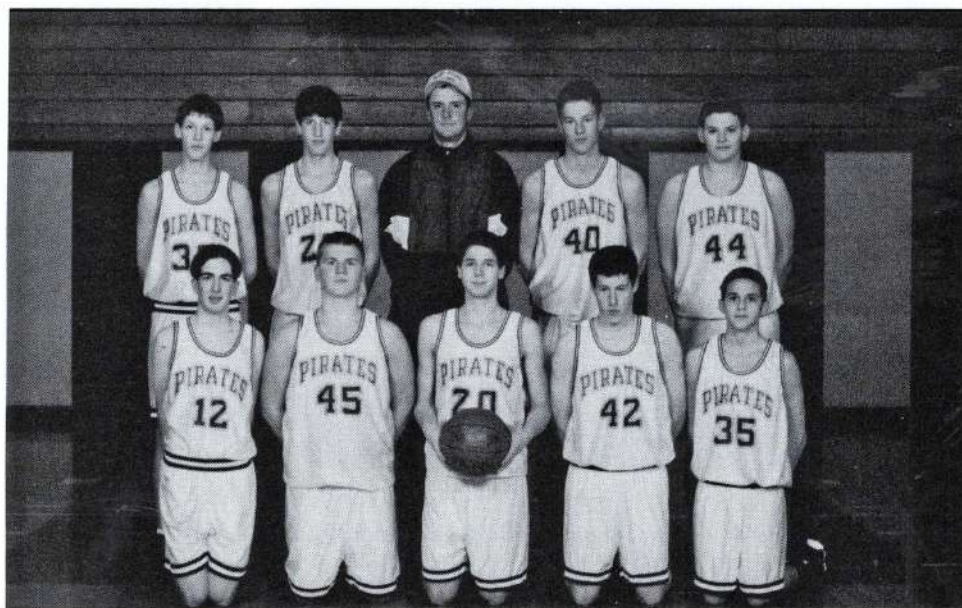

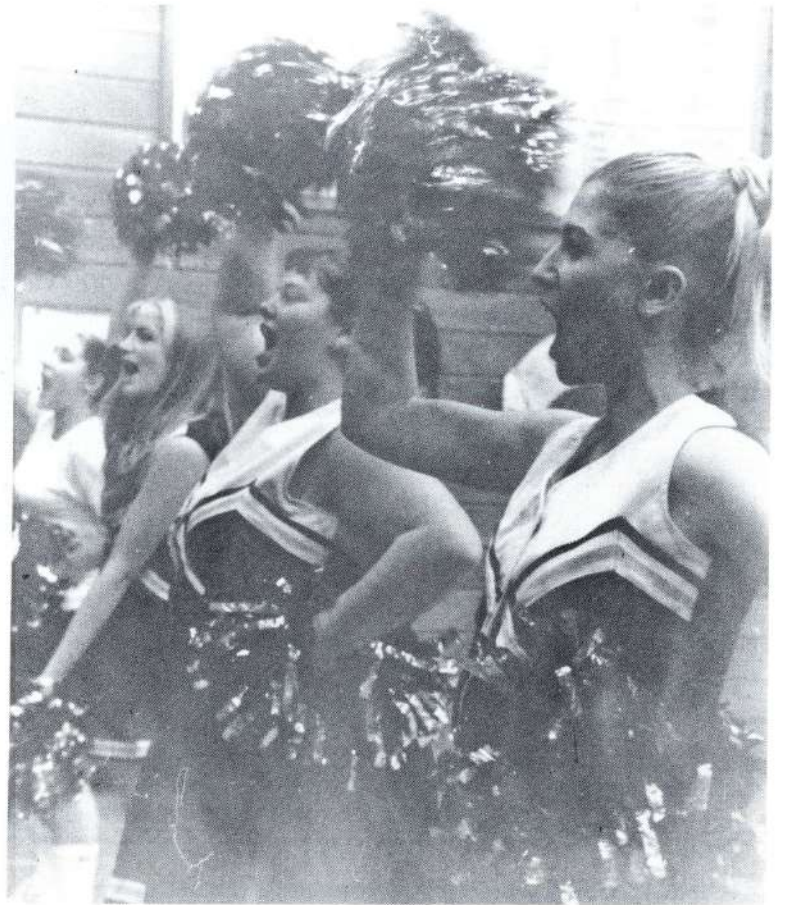

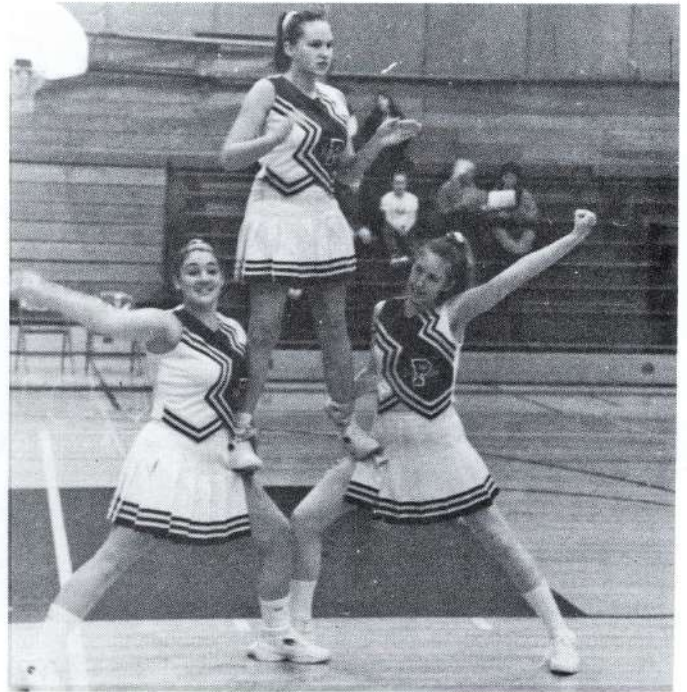

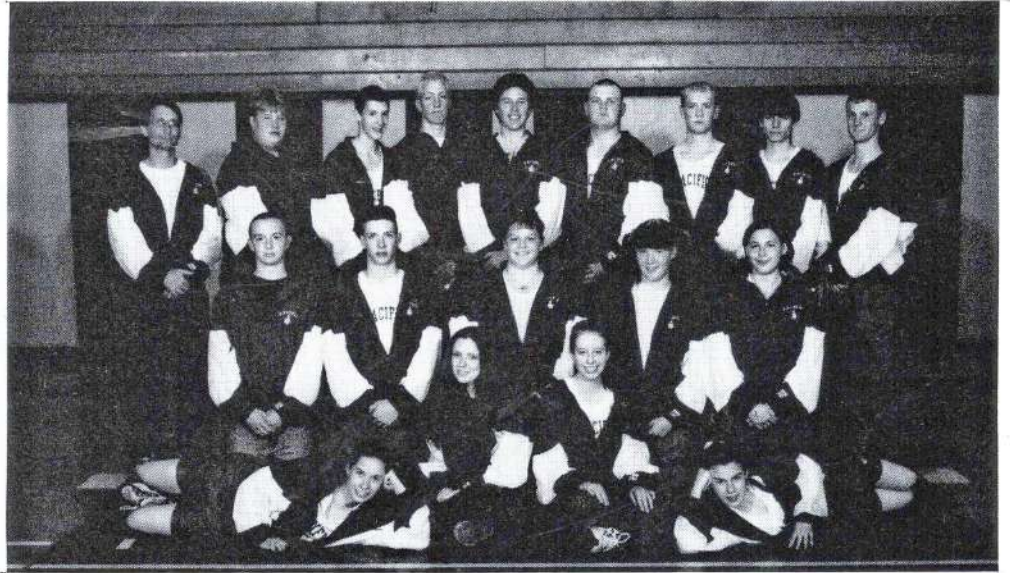

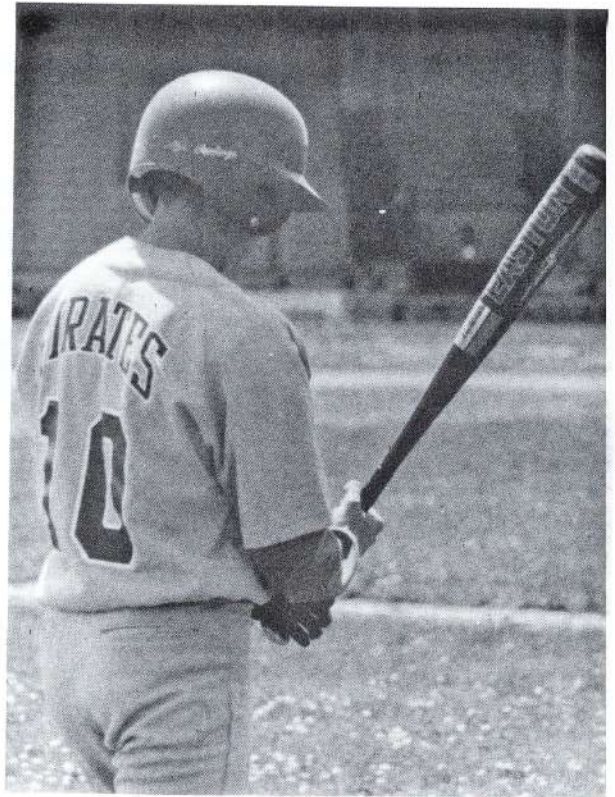

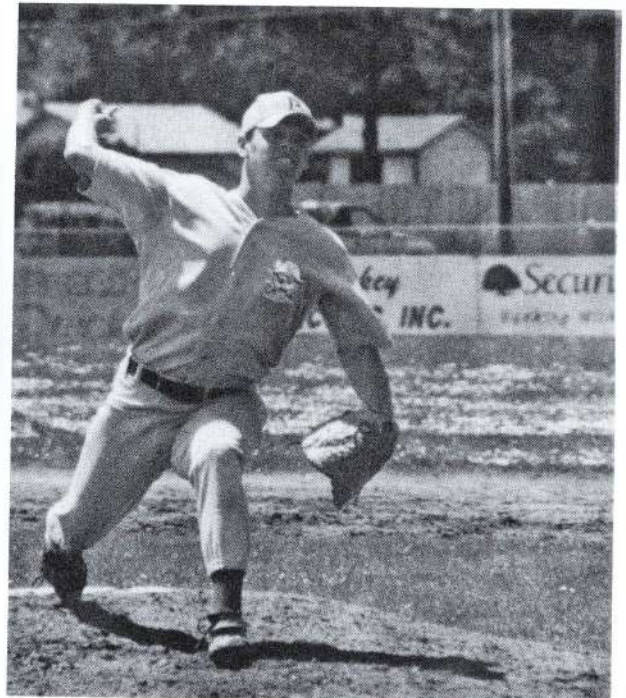


Above: Senior short stop Adam McKenzie steps up to the plate completely focused.



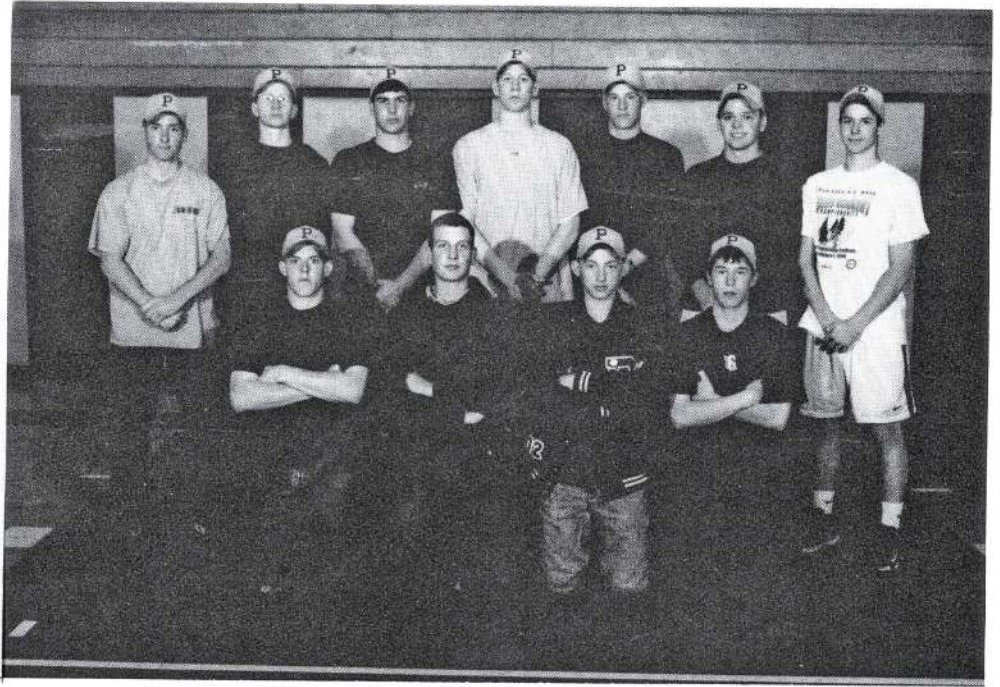
Above: Outfielder Casey Marsh and second base Garrett Heyl run the bases in Bandon during an accidental dress down practice.

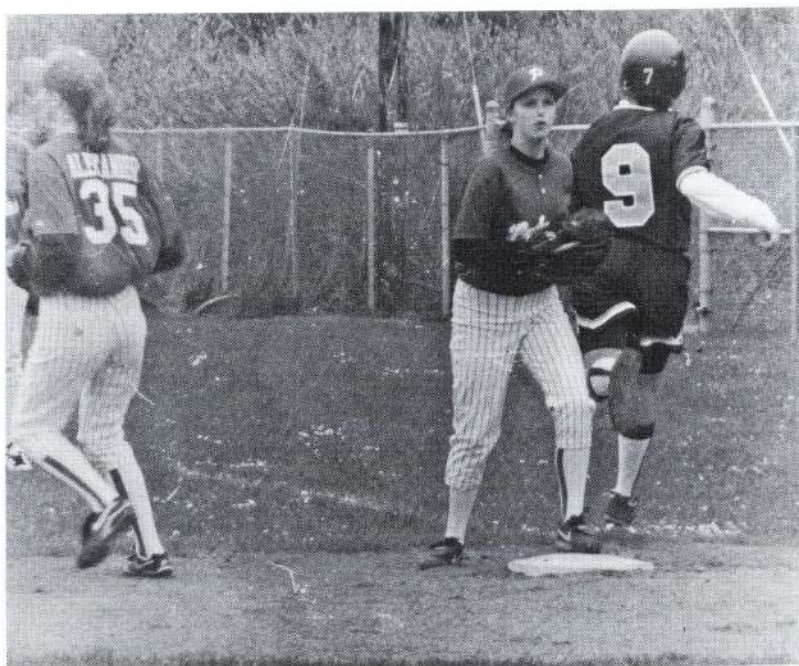

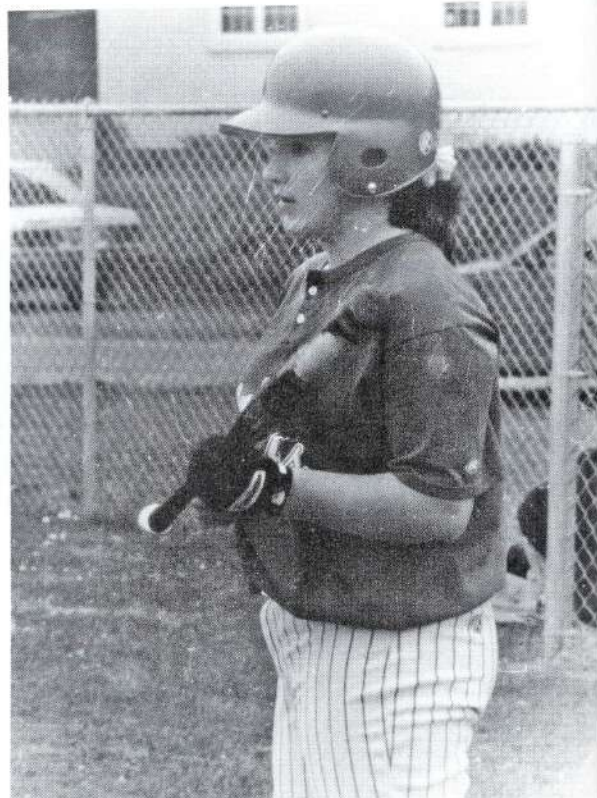
# Softball at Pacific

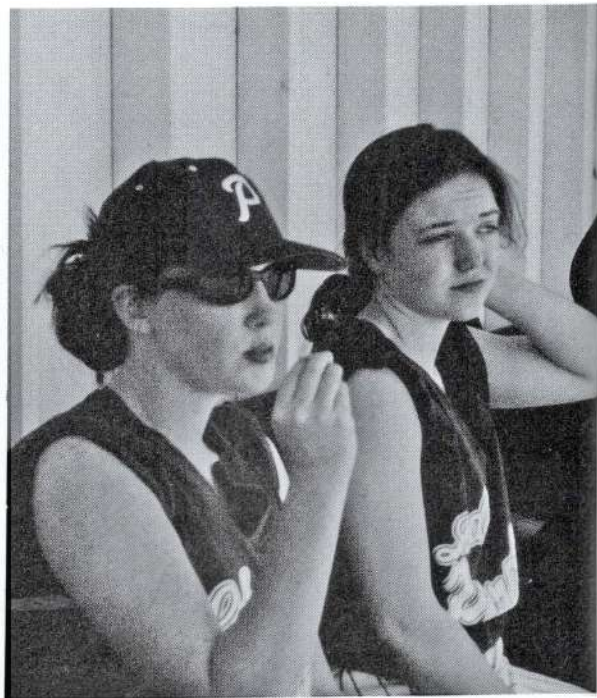

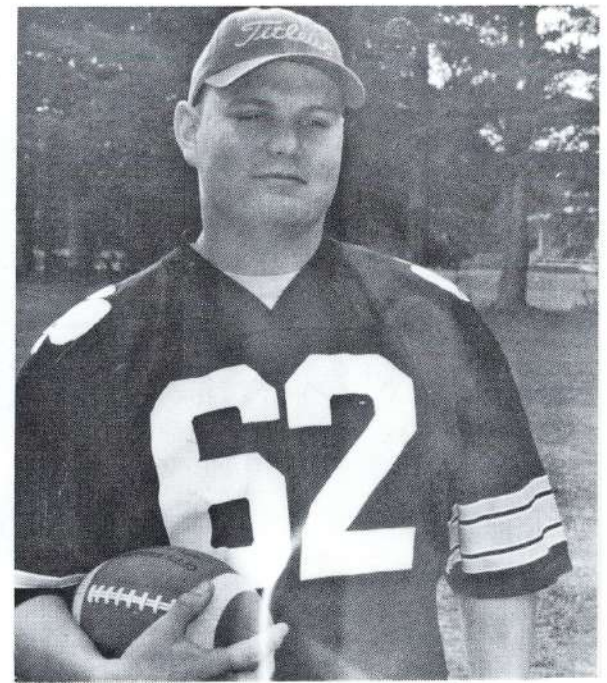

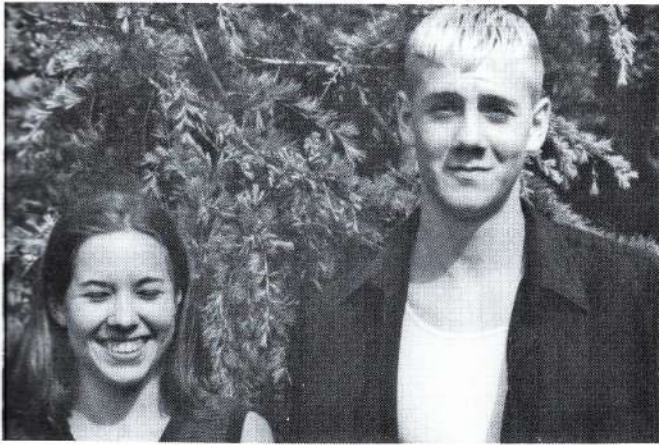

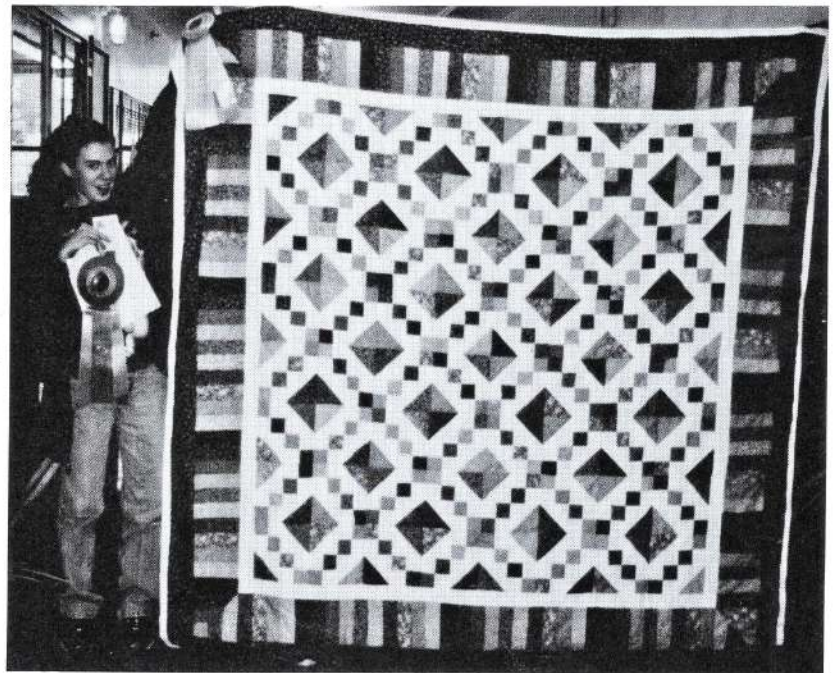

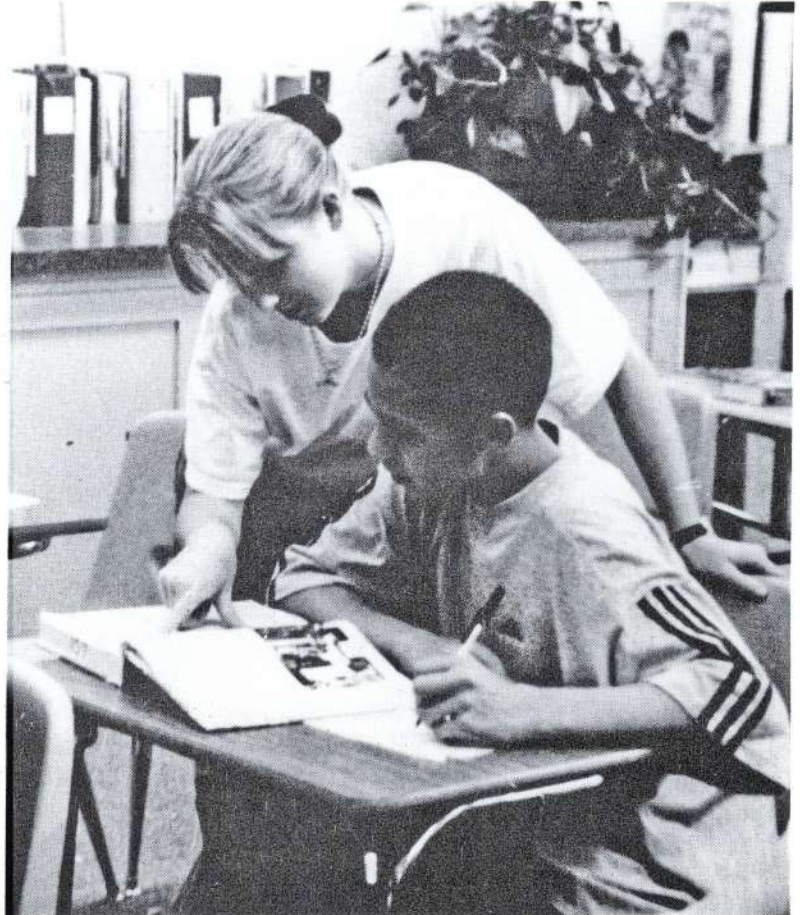

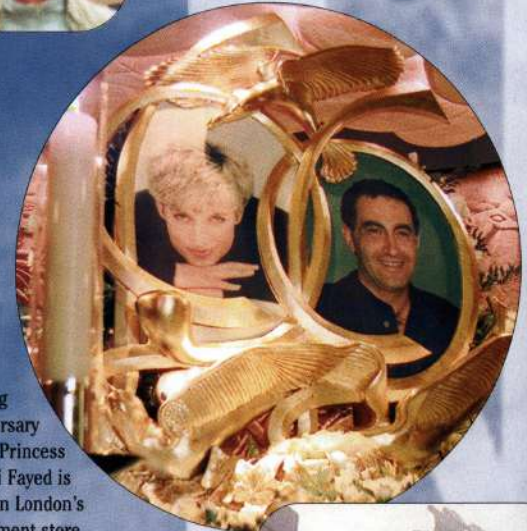

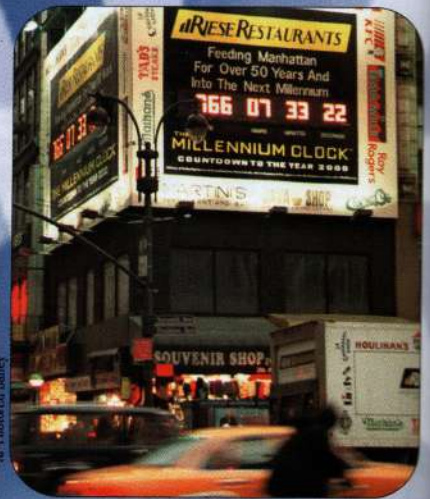

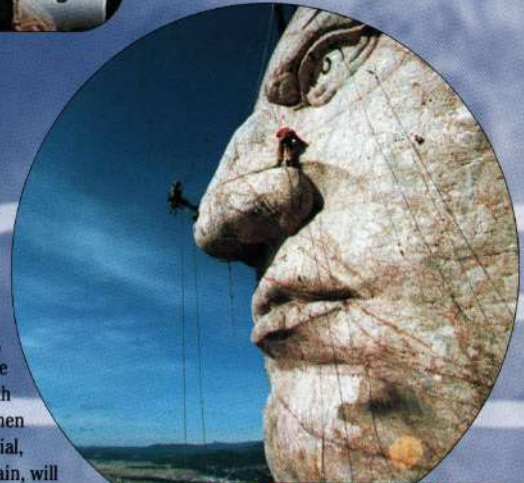

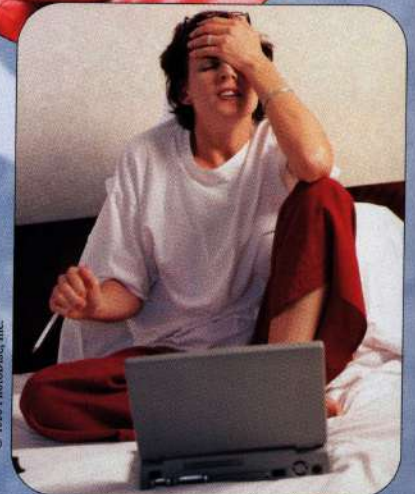

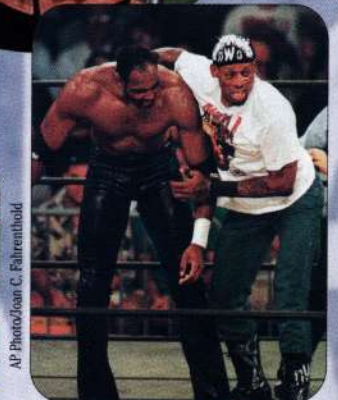

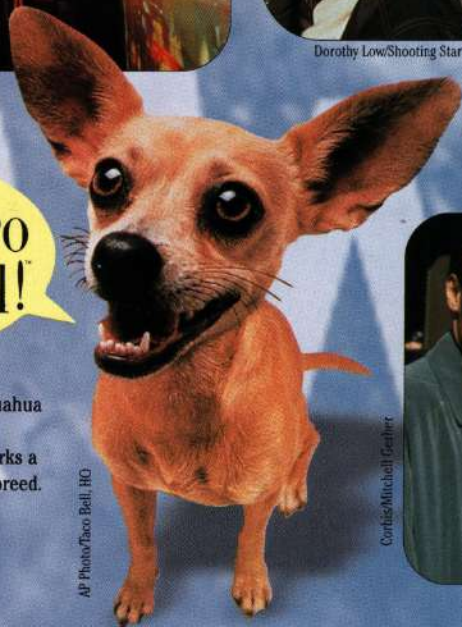

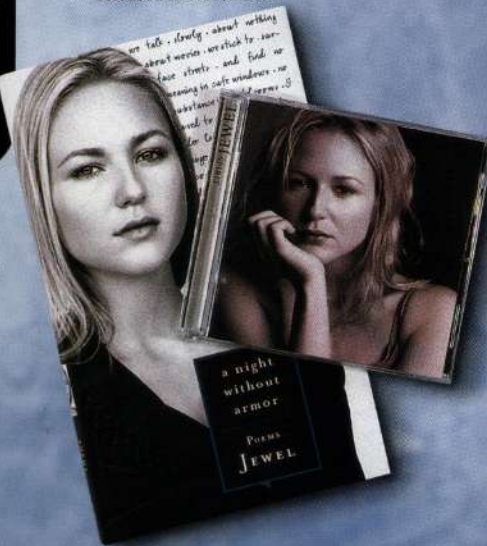

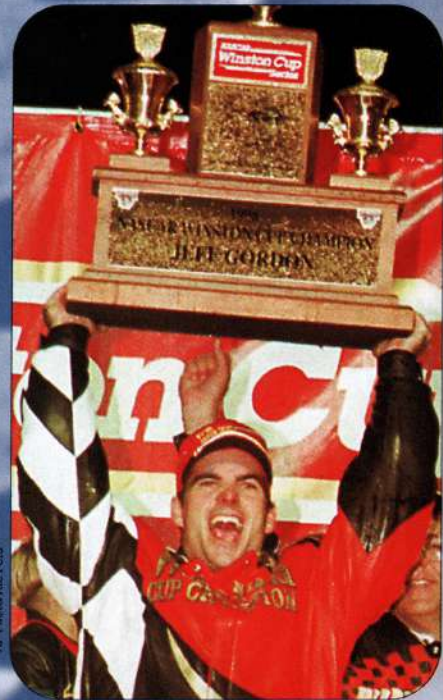

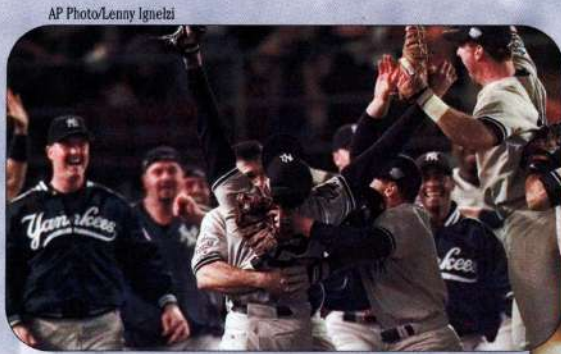

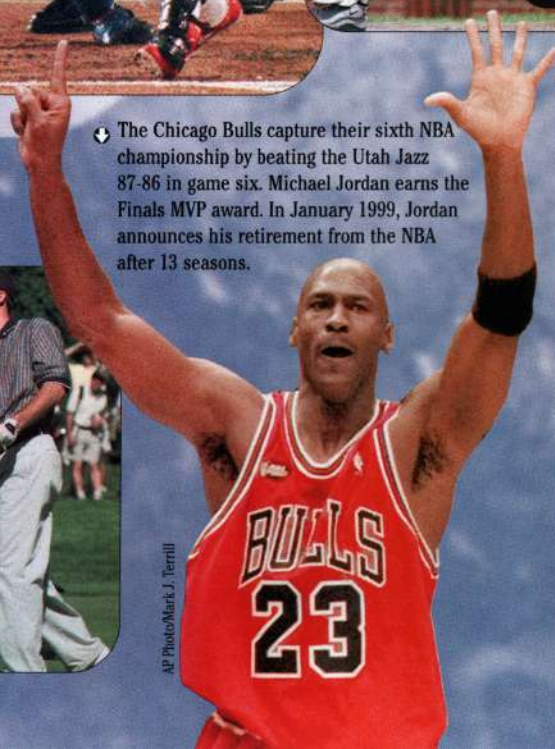
