Langlois School Flag-Raising Is Set for Tuesday

LANGLOIS, Aug. 26.— (Special) Second annual joint flag-raising ceremony of the Langlois High school, in connection with the opening of school for the fall term, will be at 10 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 2 with Dr. Kirby S. Fortune of Marshfield as the main speaker, according to Program Chairman Otto Heckel.

Dr. Fortune was selected by Gov. Charles A. Sprague to be his personal representative at the flag-raising, Heckel said. The governor was invited, but due to the press of other engagements during state fair week, selected Dr. Fortune to represent him and the state of Oregon.

Bandon, Sixes and Port Orford schools have been invited to attend, Heckel said, as well as residents of southwestern Oregon. All Langlois business houses will close for the program. The program is planned for outdoors, but will be held in the gymnasium in case of rain.

Boy Scouts of Langlois will raise the school flag during the ceremony. The school band will play a number of patriotic numbers.
