

The scrap metal salvage contest among Oregon schools for the privilege of naming and sponsoring a liberty ship definitely ended at midnight Sunday with current reports indicating that Langlois high school in Curry county is far ahead of all other schools in the state with a total of 4848 pounds per pupil collected, Claude I. Sersanous state chairman of the salvage committee, annousced in Portland Monday.

The three schools in each state which made the best record during the contest are to nominate students who have been most helpful in the scrap drive as representatives of the school at the christening of the Liberty ship to be named after a distinguished citizen of the state not now living. In addition to Langlois high school. Mapleton high with 2916 pounds of scrap per pupil and the small two-room grade school at Springdale in Multnomah county, with 1903 pounds of metal for each pupil appear to be contest winders.



Coos, Curry Schools Win Scrap Contest

The high schools of Powers in Coos county and Langlois in Curry county, have brought honors to southwestern Oregon, having been judged first and second respectively for schools in a statewide junior salvage contest.

At Portland, judges announced that Powers high school will receive a \$200 war bond for taking first place and that Langlois high will be given a \$100 bond for second.

In the salvage contest, which ended last week, the 45 students of Powers high collected 622,412 lbs. of scrap, or 13,831 lbs. per student.

To win second honors, the 33 students of Langlois high gathered 188,190 lbs. of scrap, or 5703 lbs. per student.






