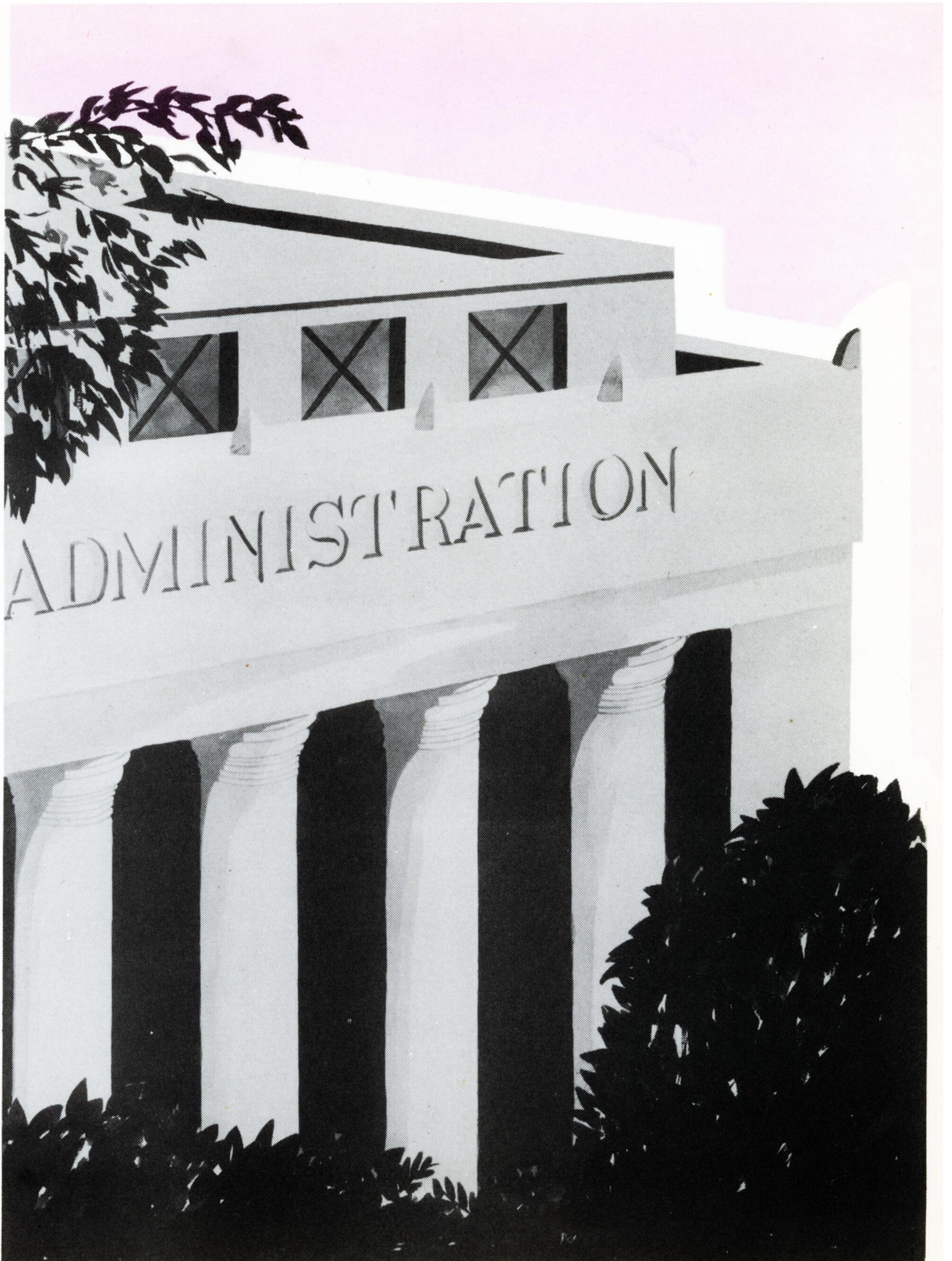




DEDICATION

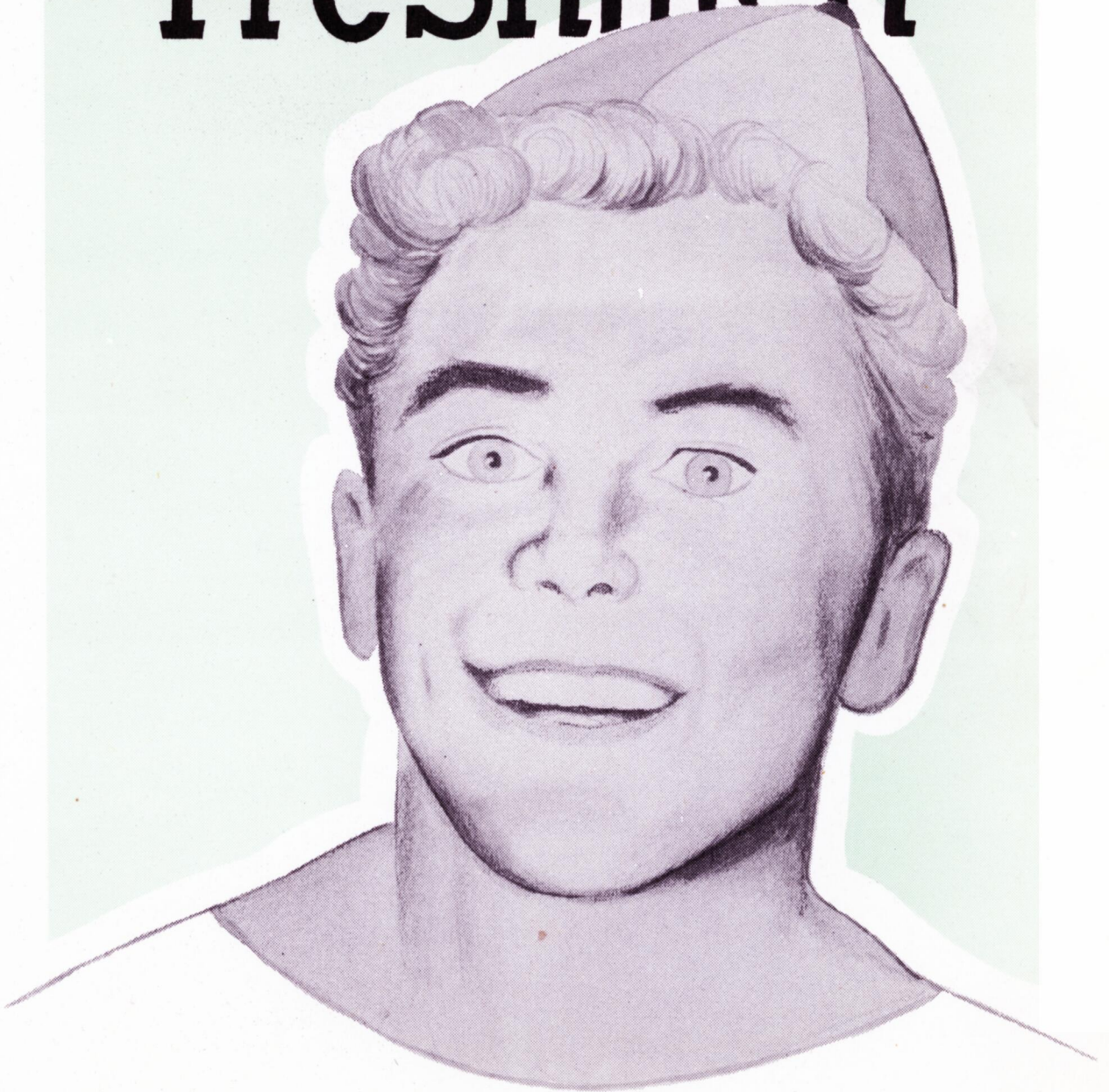
At the beginning of the school year there were nine members in the sophomore class. During the first semester Donna Mitchell transferred to Coos Bay High.

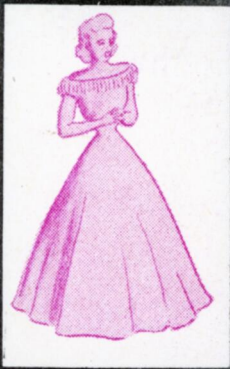
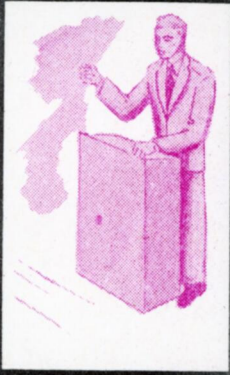
The freshman class began the year with eight students. Five months later Donald Ringheimer moved away leaving only seven.

The freshman class of 1948-49 has enjoyed the school year very much and hope the class taking their place next year have as much fun.

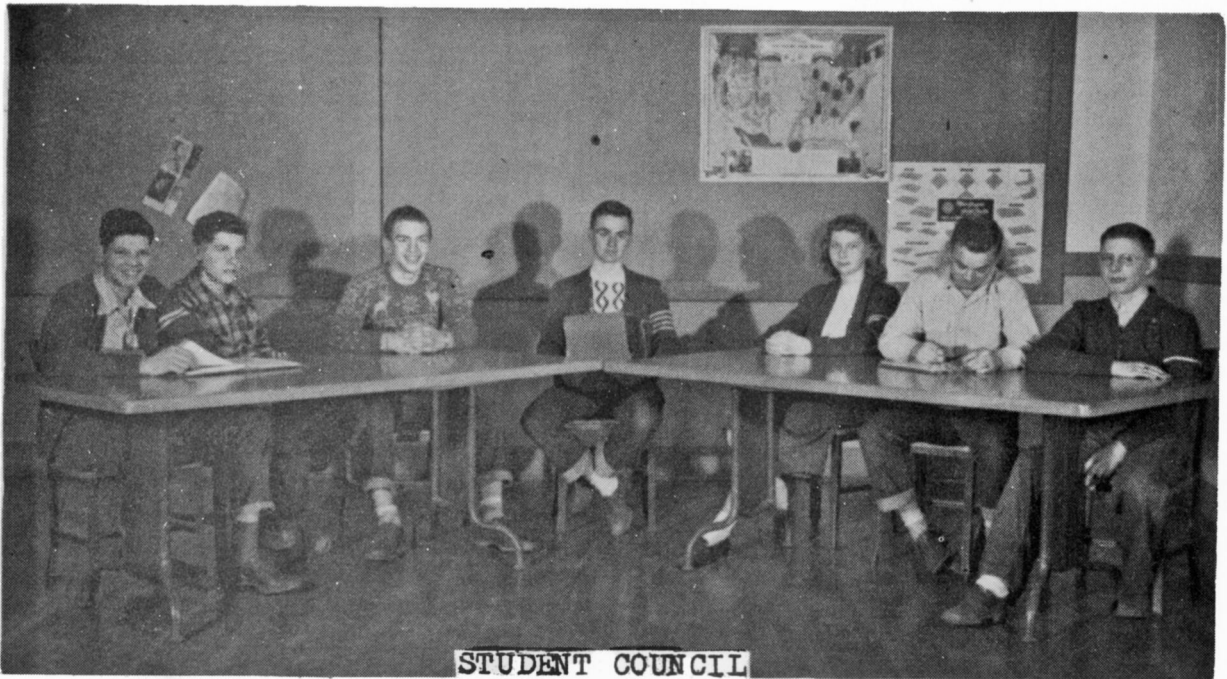

P. S. What happened to the rest of your love-- has someone else got it?

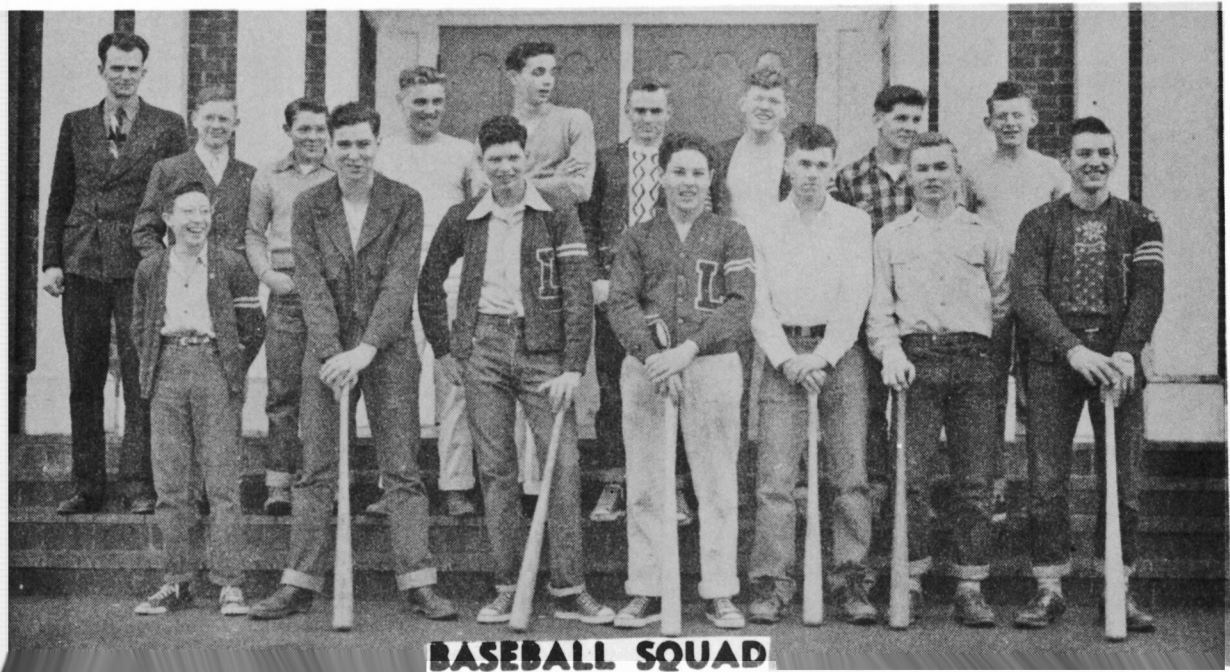
