
The two boys of the junior class, Dick Everest and Charles Clarke, are participants of the basketball teams.

in third place.





"Aunt Cathie's Cat, the last major production of the year, was cast and directed by Mr. Thetford and student director, Dick Everest.









BASEBALL FORECAST

Our baseball squad should be very strong this season. We should give any team in the county a rough tussle for first place. We tied with Brookings and Port Orford for second place last season, and

hope to come out on top this year.

We lost only three lettermen from last year's squad. They were Norman Holycross, catcher; Kenneth Kreutzer, third base and outfield; and Wylie Hale, outfield. We have eight lettermen returning this year. They are, Bert Britton, outfielder; Darrell Price, first baseman; Charles Clarke, outfielder; Dick Everest, infielder; Bill Storm, pitcher; Noel Martin, outfielder; Lee Hale, outfielder; and Arthur Sypher, infielder. We have several Freshmen who look like very promising players. They are Hal Strain, Joe Edwards, Duke Storm, Darrell Guerin, Clint Caughell, Lewis Stankavich, and Ted Brown. Hal, Joe, and Duke are heavy hitters. Darrell, Duke and Clint can run like deer, and Duke can throw like Joe DiMaggio DiMaggio or Ted Williams. Ted and Lewis are eager to learn and have great possibilities.

We seem to be very strong in most positions. We have a strong infield, our pitching is fair, and our outfield operates very nicely, with several replacements for added strength. 
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
