# NYA WORK MAY BE Increased here

#### Supervisor to Be in County

#### January 8 and 9

Henry J. Lecocq, area supervisor for the NYA will be in Gold Beach Monday, January 8, at the court house and in Port Orford Tuesday, January 9, at the city hall. The purpose of his trip is to register all young people interested in being placed on NYA projects.

The purpose of NYA is to aid the youth while attending school to earn up to \$15 a month. Projects will be set up so that the youth can earn and learn at the same time.

Mr. Lecocq will be glad to consult with any adults who are interested in securing projects in this area. The tools and equipment must be furnished locally but the wage is paid by the federal government. The program prepares those of limited financial means to secure training for future employment.

Some of the projects now in operation in Coos and Curry Counties are sponsored by Curry County agricultural agent, city of Port Orford, the public library at Gold Beach, city engineer's office at Marshfield, Coos County school superintendent, Coos County agricultural agent, home demonstration agent, Bandon public school, WPA adult education, city of North Bend recreation park at North Bend, public library at Myrtle Point, Coos County highway shops and many others. All youth between the ages of 18 and 24 are eligible to register. It is also necessary that they be registered with the Oregon state employment service and there will be a representative of the Marshfield office present on those dates.

# LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL

A seven weeks course in learning to drive an automobile will be offered students of the Port Orford High School beginning Thursday, Jan. 11 it was announced today by Earl Snell, secretary of state who sponsors these schools as a part of his statewide program in traffic safety.

Classes will be held each Thursday afternoon during the seven weeks of the course, students 15 years of age or older being eligible to enroll. Registrations may be left at the Port Orford High School. Pupils must furnish their own cars and driver's licenses are not required. Cars must be driven to and from the school by licensed operators, however.

Instruction is given in the proper methods of starting the motor and use of the clutch, shifting gears, turning and backing, parallel parking, stopping and starting on hills, and driving in traffic. At the first session the instructor discusses rules and regulations pertaining to the operation of motor vehicles in Oregon, but all subsequent classes find the students at the wheels of their cars, actually going through the maneuvers as they are explained.

The instructor is on the grounds at all times during the classes and between sessions students are urged to practice what they were taught at the preceding class. The schools are based on the theory that drivers who learn to operation their cars under the eye of competent instructors become better and therefore safer drivers than those who pick it up by the hit-or-miss manner, Snell declared.

Parents are invited to attend the classes at any time.

During the last quarter, both teams tied at 24-24 and 26-26, but in the closing seconds Port Orford sank a field goal and a free throw to put them ahead 29-26 which was the score at the end of the game.

Miller of Port Orford was high point man as usual with 11 points. Crew, who is Langlois' main threat, was held down to only 9 points, but Casey of the same team got away with 12 tallies.

### PORT ORFORD GOES TO TOWN

A series of celebrations is scheduled for Port Orford this summer, all under the auspices of the city council and there will be no private promoters, and the lion's share of the gate receipts will go as prize money and purses to attract outstanding sporting events, while the balance will pay the advertising costs. Thus, the city will be clear of any expense upon the taxpayers and all the celebrations stand on their own.

Posters have gone up from Eugene to Ashland and from Taft to Crescent City. The radio stations at Marshfield and Eureka are announcing it.

The first big celebration will occur on June first and will include five headline boxing bouts, fighting in an open-air arena with full flood lighting.

Mayor Gable announced vesterday the signing of the headliners who will battle for ten rounds for the featherweight championship of the northwest. The Portland Italian Al Spina is the title holder and will meet one of the toughest little men on the coast today in Mark Diaz of Los Angeles who is well-known as the Filipino Bolo puncher and ring mate of the great Filipino middleweight champion of the world, Cefrino Garcia. Diaz has wanted to meet Spina for vears. The match was in the making in Hollywood but Spina hurt his hand and had to lay off. Diaz has now come North and the match is signed and sealed for Port Orford on June first. "From all advance information," the mayor said, "this will be a battle that will attract fight fans all the way from Portland and will be some battle for ten rounds. It will be the first time for headline professional boxing bouts in Curry County, and southwestern Oregon will go to town on June first in a way that the people will long remember."

The six round semi-final lightweight boxers are Jimmy Davis of Vancouver and Johnny O'Connell of Portland. Jimmy Davis is one of the best prospects developed in years in the Northwest and will have one of the toughest fights in his career in O'Connell.


In addition to the boxing bouts which will start at 8:30 p.m. and at popular prices, there will be log contests and baseball at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon and the dedication of the new Tichenor Park, one of the nicest city parks along the coast. At six o'clock, free clam chowder will be served by the City of Port Orford. Twelve gallons of clams, ten pounds of butter, twelve pounds of bacon, one hundred pounds of potatoes, fifteen pounds of onions and seventy-five gallons of milk will go into this chowder which will be prepared by Otto Heckel of Langlois, famous for clam chowder and a former chef for the Pullman Company.

Mayor Gable has announced that preparations are also being made for a celebration about a month later which will include a jalopy race with all cars 1931 models or older and twelve tentative entrants are already on the books.

The third celebration which will be out around Labor Day will include a midget automobile race on a half mile track which has already been surveyed at Port Orford and five wrestling bouts are also on Port Orford's elaborate summer program.

Mayor Gable has appointed a Boxing Commission to serve for one year and supervise the bouts and the wrestling events. The boxing ring is being constructed in the baseball park on the highway next to the grade school. Port Orford is going to town.






A blue arrow points to Port Orford High School on the hill overlooking the Pacific Ocean.








