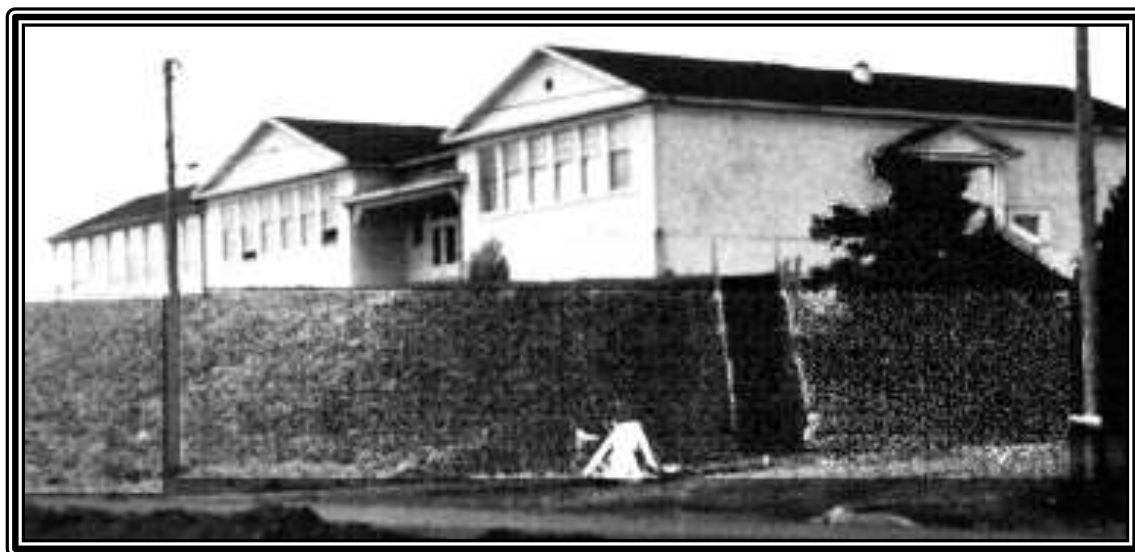

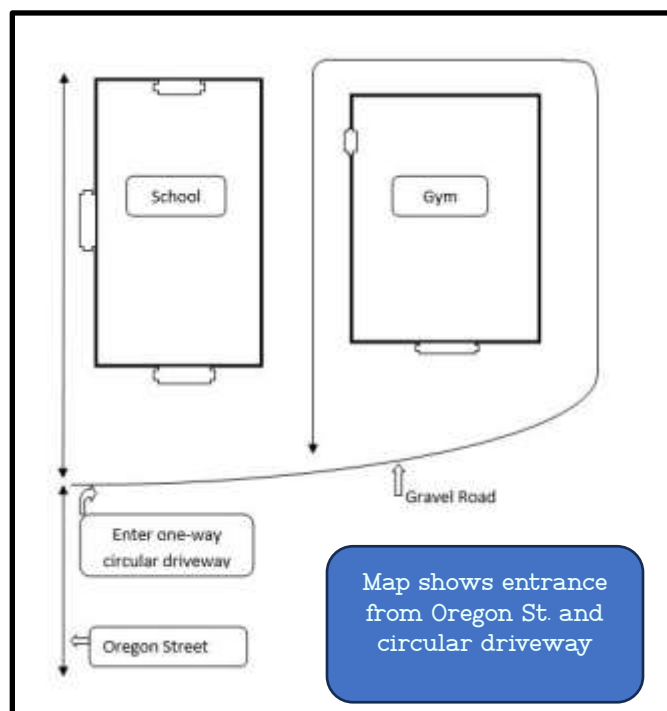

SCHOOL PLANS FOR OPENING ANNOUNCED

Registration. Flag Raising Ceremony to Feature First Day

The back-to-school trek of Port Orford High school and grade school students will begin next Tuesday, September 3, according to announcements yesterday by John Masterson, chairman of the grade school district board, and Dr. L. R. Pugh, chairman of the high school district board.

Opening day of school will feature two things of interest to students and teachers, according to present plans. Registration and assignment of books will be one, and a flag-raising ceremony to be conducted at the Langlois High School in the morning will be the other item of interest.

Students upon entering the high school next Tuesday will find it a changed place in some respects. Facilities for two new classes have been installed for domestic science and manual training students.

IMPROVEMENTS MADE IN BUILDING

One of the rooms formerly used for the typing classes has been made into the home economics room, while a portion of the hall has been made into a typing room.

New showers and toilets have been installed under the stage next to the gymnasium in order to provide facilities for basketball and football players and for the various gym classes.

Improvements at the grade school include the strengthening of supports for beams in the hallways and long rooms of the building. Both busses have been reconditioned and one of them has been overhauled in preparation for the school year.

Teachers will arrive by the end of this week and will start preparations for classes Tuesday.

Teacher changes made this year are as follows: Miss Effie Sweet and Mrs. Donna McKenzie Churchill will be new instructors in the grade school. Mrs. Maloy will teach this year at the high school in place of Mrs. Eleanor Bailey who resigned last spring.

FIRST DAY REGISTRATION TOTALS 211

Open House to be Held Soon to Show Off Recent Improvements

First day registration in the Port Orford public schools was 211, according to announcements of principals. A total of 156 were counted on the first day at the grade school, and 55 appeared on the first day at the high school.

The number will be further increased in a few days when other students are expected from vacations or from the state fair which is in progress this week at Salem.

An unusually large number of freshmen students registered at the high school, according to Miss Ruth Clark, principal. Twenty first year students began their high school studies.

Alice Mulloy, a graduate of the University of Oregon, will have charge of the domestic science class at the high school. This and the manual training class under the direction of Ray Griffith are new this year. Equipment for them was installed this summer.

Bus schedules this year will be about the same as last year, according to the principals.

Open house will be held at the high school at the beginning of the 3rd week of school in order to show townspeople the improvements made last summer in plan and facilities, according to L. A. Pugh, chairman of the board. Full details of the open house will be announced in next week's Post.

Representing Port Orford in the first contest held in many years are Patricia Johnson and Fern Welch.

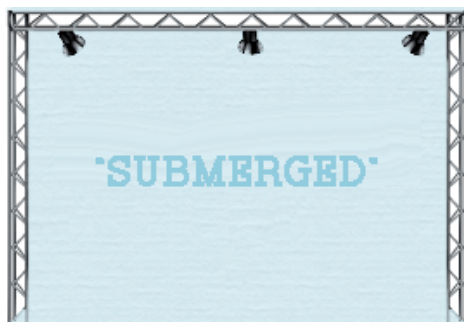

GOLD BEACH WINS FIRST PLACE IN PLAY CONTEST

For the first time in five years the local high school took second instead of first place in the annual high school one-act play contest held this year at Ophir, Friday, April 18.

The Port Orford High School presented "Submerged" which the judges said, apologetically, lacked "oomph", (possibly due to the fact that the six men who had been in the wrecked sunken submarine for three days were in a dazed condition).

First place went to Gold Beach whose production "Marriage Proposal", a Russian farce by Tchekoff, was expertly directed and staged. It was a performance worthy of any Little Theatre or University Dramatic club. It is reported that Mr. Chambreau, dramatic instructor at the Gold Beach Art Center, aided materially in the selection, production and setting of this difficult play. A huge bizarre, emblematic back-drop was used in this play suggestive of the American-Russian home. The dramatic technique was almost perfect and showed weeks of intensive training. The judges' only criticism of this play was that it was difficult to be heard. Three characters made up the cast.

The Langlois High School play, second in order of evening performance, was a light comedy with seven characters.

Ophir High School presented a farce, "Comin' Round the Mountain", which, considering the small enrollment of the high school, was well cast. There were seven in this play.

Brookings High School pleased the audience greatly with their farce, "Nobody Home", which included seven characters.

Clarence Young in presenting the cup, changed the ruling in regard to permanent possession of the cup from three years to two years.

Judges were Wayne Smith, principal of Bandon Grade School; Mrs. Greame of the Bandon Grade School, and Miss Eva Gadwa, physical education instructor at Bandon high school.
